Campus CAPSULES

RECORD ENROLLMENT in the College of Law carried Willamette's total Fall enrollment to 1,507 students, equaling last Fall's record high. Some 295 students registered at the new Truman Wesley Collins Legal Center, 56 more than last year. Liberal Arts enrollment dropped off 50 to 1,125, while 46 registered at the College of Music and 41 were classified as special (part-time) or graduate students. Men outnumbered women 961 to 546, while within the colleges the respective totals were: College of Liberal Arts, 632 to 493; College of Law, 290 to 5; and College of Music, 22 to 24. Freshman registration was 405; 221 men and 184 women.

FALL RUSH ended with 186 students pledging; 96 men accepting bids to the six national fraternities and 90 women pledging the five national sororities. Beta Theta Pi led the fraternity total with 22, followed by Sigma Alpha Epsilon, 21; Kappa Sigma, 19; Delta Tau Delta, 13; Phi Delta Theta, 11; and Sigma Chi, 10. Pi Beta Phi had the highest total for sororities with 22, followed by Alpha Chi Omega, 21; Delta Gamma, 20; Alpha Phi, 17; and Chi Omega, 10.

DELTA ZETA chapter of Sigma Chi Fraternity has been asked by its national organization to "show cause" within a one-year period why it should remain an active chapter. Declining membership was one of the factors in the action, as only 20 Sigma Chis returned to the chapter house this Fall. This total is under the 22 man limit set by the Board of Trustees as necessary to retain exclusive house privileges. As a result, the living unit has been renamed "Chresto Hall," with independent students living on the lower floor and the Sigma Chis on the upper floor. When Sigma Chi membership rises above 22, the unit will again carry the fraternity's name. An alumni advisory committee is working with the chapter and there is every indication that the chapter will solve its problems and remain active on campus.

DRAMA director Robert Putnam has announced this year's theatre schedule, which started Oct. 27-28 with three one-act plays by Edward Albee. Other productions are Shakespeare's "All's Well that Ends Well," Nov. 16 and 18; "Let's Get a Divorce" by Victorien Sardou and Emile de Najac, Feb. 28-29 and March 1-2; and "Take Her, She's Mine" by Phoebe and Henry Ephron, April 19-20.

FORTY upperclass students comprised a Student Advisory Board initiated by Student Body President Douglas Bosco to work with faculty advisers in counseling new students. The Board members helped freshmen work out class schedules, and answered questions concerning curriculum and campus life. (See pages 4 and 5 for a speech delivered by Bosco to new students).

MARY LEE PICKETT, formerly Mary Lee Jones, of the class of 1964, has been appointed alumni secretary. One of her first major tasks is to coordinate the INFO 67 meetings this coming Fall. She received her bachelor of arts degree in political science and earned a master's degree on a graduate assistantship in government at the University of Nevada. She worked in the alumni and publicity offices at Linfield for a year. Her husband Michael is a first year law student at Willamette.

WILLAMETTE law students once again topped the three law schools in the state on percentage of graduates passing the annual state bar examination. Willamette students edged the University of Oregon graduates, 79.5% to 79%, while Lewis & Clark-Northwestern achieved 57.5%. Willamette's percentage represents 39 new attorneys.

DEAN SEWARD REESE's statistics this year show that the 295 College of Law students took their pre-law study in 175 colleges and universities that are located in 37 states and 9 foreign countries. Single students outnumber married students 152 to 143. Average age of the students is 24.65, with a low of 21 and a high of 47. Forty-five of the married students have children. The students are residents of 24 states and three foreign countries. Willamette's College of Liberal Arts produced the most students from a single university, 46.

A **MOCK** Republican convention has tentatively been set by the students for the last week in April. The last mock convention, also Republican, was held in 1964 with 800 delegates attending from colleges throughout Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

RESIDENTS of Belknap Hall, the upperclass independent men's dormitory, returned this Fall to find a remodeled and refurnished basement. The room has a new ceiling, painted walls, tiled floors and new furniture. The residents petitioned the administration last year to make some improvements in the facilities.

SOCCER has "caught on" at Willamette, as earth science instructor Al Berglund has organized a team and arranged some games with other college soccer teams in the state. Over 40 students turned out, many of whom played the sport in high school. Last Spring the team played and lost two matches against Oregon State and Reed, but Coach Berglund, a former varsity player at the University of Redlands, expects to hit the win column sometime this year in matches with Reed, Oregon State, University of Oregon, University of Portland and Lewis & Clark.

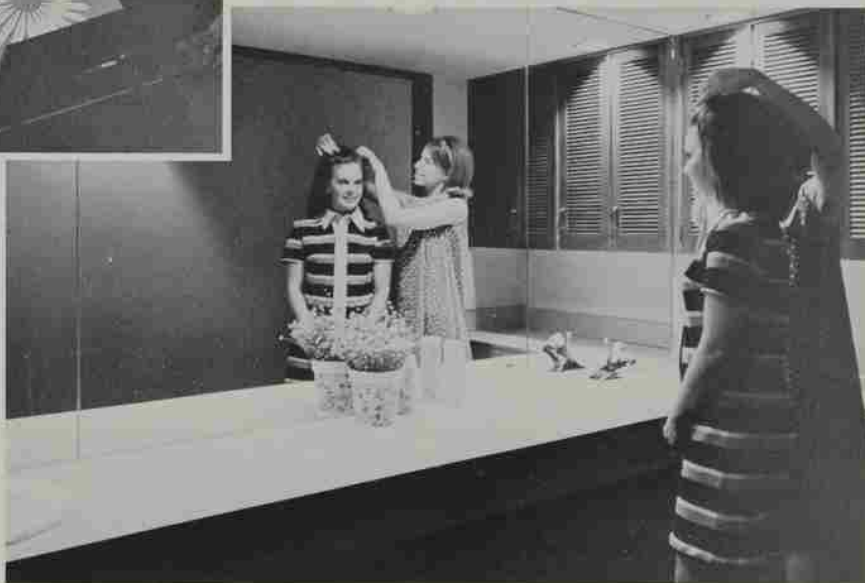

“WELCOME TO THE CLASS OF 1971”

Perhaps it will interest you to know that I have certain psychic powers which enable me to know exactly what you will be saying and thinking within the next few weeks and months. I am told that this is one of the most outstanding classes that has hit Willamette yet—of course my class was one of the most outstanding too as is every class, but that makes no difference—it should make you feel good anyway. Being outstanding as you are, I think you deserve to hear some of the stories and lines that circulate at Willamette from the beginning so that you can start right off using them and not have to wait until you pick them up yourselves. So here's a few right from the horse's mouth (and incidently this is the last time you will hear me referred to as a horse—normally it's something more along the line of the biblical name given to a donkey, or worse).

It reminds me—last year I gave a speech which infuriated one individual who came up afterwards and said that he wouldn't tell me right then and there what he thought of me (because there were people around) but he hoped that when I got home my mother would jump out from under the porch and bite me.

Administration Doesn't Wear Black Hat

But to get back to giving you some of the old lines. First, it is important for you to know that I share the stage with Public Enemy Number One—the college President. Known affectionately as G. Herb, he stays up late into the night in his mansion in the fashionable Fairmont Hill district of Salem thinking of new and exciting ways to harass the students. Everything that goes wrong on campus—from meals being served late to the squirrels leaving has been carefully planned by Dr. Smith. Should there be any underground activities such as panty raids or drinking—neither of which ever occur, of course—the president will mete out punishments which make the Spanish Inquisition look like a Sunday School picnic. Of course you will hear more stories, and in time may become proficient at starting a few yourself. You will find that they are always believed.

You must realize that President Smith is not the only bad guy in the group. There is, of course, the rest of the administration, and you may want to choose your own personal administrator to spread stories about. Beware, though—unlike the Westerns on TV, they don't all wear black hats—except Dean Doenges who sometimes does.

Another line which is popular and fits in anytime is to mention how conservative Willamette, Salem and perhaps the whole state of Oregon are. This will immediately make you seem suave and worldly. I have never quite figured out what distinguishes a conservative school from a liberal one. On

a trip back East this summer I travelled with the Vice President of Berkeley's student body who said that Berkeley was also too conservative—so I imagine it is a universal complaint.

Disillusionment Will Vanish

Sometime within the next few months each of you in one way or another will become disillusioned and decide that you want to transfer. You will find it helpful to know that our library contains a full set of catalogs from other schools across the nation for your use. They will help you make the choice you probably will never make because soon after that you will have finally adjusted and begin to realize that Willamette isn't that bad after all.

The fact is, my friends, that I am telling you these things not to be humorous or smart or all-knowing or cynical—but because I want you to adjust now. I want you to realize that President Smith and other members of the administration and faculty are dedicated men and women who occasionally make errors as we do, but who have dedicated their lives to giving YOU an opportunity to be educated. Schools like Willamette do not just pop up out of the ground, but take millions of dollars, and people who are willing to put forth endless hours of time and hard work. It has been my experience that the administration and members of the faculty are deeply concerned with our problems as students, and we must realize as students that we are all in the same boat working toward the same goal, and not at cross purposes with each other.

It Is Fashionable to Criticize

I also want you to realize that Willamette is no more liberal or conservative—or anything else—than you are, and that we as students are no different than students anywhere. The fact is, there are always so many more who would complain, who would criticize, who would be character assassins, who would destroy than there are those who would understand, who would give credit, who would build and lead. The novels and plays and songs of our time tell us that life has lost meaning—that this is the time of the nowhere man, living in his nowhere land, making all his nowhere plans for nobody, of the leaden eyes, of the tract houses and tract minds. And it is that way not because these times are any different or more difficult than any other times (after all it was 200 years ago that Paine wrote THESE are the times that try men's souls), it is that way because people as individuals have let it get that way. Because it is fashionable to criticize the President, the school board, the war in Vietnam and the Mayor, but unfashionable to help in building and understanding and reaching toward the hopes and dreams that we all share.

Long ago—before Lincoln was President, or the '49'ers sought gold in California—long before Stanford, or Berkeley or the University of Oregon or any other school was started in the West—when the American dream of expanding across a continent was still very much a dream, some foresighted men and women decided that the culture and education of the East must somehow be spread into the wilderness. Near the place where you are now sitting they built their crude buildings and founded Willamette University. These people were not the aristocrats of St. Louis or New York, they weren't intellectuals and they weren't even on Medicare or Social Security. They were far from civilization and they were alone. Yet they realized that man can not be alone unto himself—that he is born with a need to give to and receive from others—and that an education helps him to fulfill that need—to understand, to fit in. Those people began fulfilling the promise and destiny of the West.

We Are Not Alone

As students of the oldest institution of higher learning west of the Missouri River we are the recipients of a great heritage, one which has encompassed the hopes and dreams and ambitions of thousands of students who have walked her halls for 125 years. The spirit of those people is much needed today, and it is reflected in the simple motto of Willamette University, "Not alone unto ourselves are we born." For if we are to live as educated people, if we are to build and add to what we have received, if we are to find a place for the nowhere man, then we must dedicate ourselves to the proposition that *we are not alone unto ourselves*, that we all have the same basic needs and desires, and that it is our responsibility—especially as students in a small school—to see that whatever we say or do has constructive value.

If the spirit you all have — if your freshness and energy and enthusiasm will be put toward making this a better school for having had you as a student, for making your friends better people for having had you as a friend — then I know you will feel welcome and happy here.

It is in the realization that we are not alone unto ourselves, and in the rising above the petty complaints and gossip of the day, and in dedicated work for the betterment of that which we have received, that we must all put our hearts, our hopes, and our destinies.

PLY and REPLY

Alumni ask questions on occasion. Some of the answers may be of general interest, so The Alumnus Magazine provides this question and answer column to find out what alumni want to know about their University. Send your questions to Editor, Willamette Alumnus, Willamette University, Salem, Oregon 97301. The questions should be signed, but names will be withheld upon request.

I will be leaving the Peace Corps in about six months, then my two year stint will be over. Is there any way the Placement Office at Willamette could help me in securing a new job since my college records would be readily available to any employer?

If you are interested in teaching, the Teacher's Placement secretary in the Registrar's Office can put your name on a mailing list to receive notice of open positions and she can see that your name is recorded for prospective employers. There is no other formal placement office for alumni. The Dean of Men and Dean of Women maintain lists of prospective employers and also schedule various interviews with employers throughout the year. With nearly 65% of Willamette's graduates now going on to graduate school, the need for a full time placement office doesn't appear to be necessary.

There are three good prospects for Willamette in our nearby high school. I know that your regular admissions personnel can't visit our area regularly, but I remember reading something about Willamette having alumni serving as admissions counselors. Have their names ever been published?

Yes. In this issue (page 9). You'll find the names of 60 Alumni now serving as area admissions counselors. If you or other alumni would like to serve in this capacity, the Admissions Office would like to hear from you.

I read with interest your Winter '67 issue that told about the increase in library facilities. I would be interested to know what the current library holdings are and how much they can be expanded?

The University Library, because of the new stack space, has room for 300,000 volumes. Current holdings are 111,270 with an annual projected rate of increase of about 5,000 volumes. In addition, there are 12,790 bound periodicals, 465 periodical subscriptions, 14 newspaper subscriptions, 510 microfilm reels, 4,200 volumes in the Northwest History Collection, and extensive holdings in the Methodist Collection. The Collins Hall Science Library contains 773 volumes and 338 bound periodicals. The College of Law library has a capacity of 100,000 volumes with current holdings of 32,098, bound periodicals of 3,004, and 216 periodical subscriptions. The College of Music has 6,000 phono discs, several hundred tapes, and a large amount of musical literature and sheet music.

Is Willamette communicating so well with Alumni that they don't have any questions about the University as it is today? — The Editor

We doubt it. But the response to this column hasn't resulted in a wild deluge of questions . . . or even a trickle for that matter. FACULTY SALARIES SHOW SIZEABLE GAIN

Many alumni have expressed an interest in faculty salaries at Willamette. The following article reveals the current status of faculty compensation. Questions on the general subject of faculty recruitment are answered by the three academic deans on the next page.

A few years ago a high school counselor was reviewing the merits of the small colleges in the Northwest to a searching senior. When she came to the end of the alphabetical list, she exclaimed, "Well, if you choose Willamette University you'll find a dedicated faculty because they don't get paid very well!"

This senior is now an alumnus of Willamette and one of many who has indicated an interest in faculty salaries and quality instruction. He found a dedicated faculty during his four years, but he also discovered that his high school counselor might have to alter her conclusion in recommending Willamette University.

The most current figures from the University's business office show that Willamette has made considerable advances in faculty salaries and fringe benefits. Twenty-five years ago, the 38 full time teaching faculty members received an average cash salary of \$2,425, with a range from \$950 to \$3,200. Fringe benefits offered by the University at this time (1941-42) averaged a meager \$48. By 1957-58, the faculty had increased to 63 with an average cash salary of \$5,482 (range \$3,000 to \$8,000) and fringe benefits of \$612.

Today, 93 full time teaching faculty members are averaging \$9,871 on a nine-month contract, with fringe benefits totaling an average of \$1,200, or an average total of all compensation of \$11,071. Salary range is from a low of \$6,000 to a high of \$15,500.

During the 25-year period, the cost of living index rose from 56.8 to 113.0, an increase of approximately two times, while at the same time cash salaries have increased 3.8 times and fringe benefits 4.25 times.

In comparison with other colleges of similar size, Willamette is very much in line with average faculty salaries. A sampling of 16 small regional colleges across the country shows average salaries of \$9,657. Compared to three smaller state colleges in Oregon, Oregon College, Southern Oregon College and Eastern Oregon College, Willamette's average salary of \$9,871 is higher by over \$600. A sampling of 12 larger universities across the country shows average salaries of \$11,086, and for Oregon State University and the University of Oregon, \$10,019.

The average figure given is slightly weighted at the top, since it is based upon 27 full professors, 21 associate professors, 23 assistant professors and 22 instructors. The recent increases in faculty compensation have kept the University competitive in the teacher market with colleges of the same size and prestige. This fact is brought out in the interview with the three College deans on the next page.

The following questions were asked of the three academic deans, Dean Byron Doenges of the College of Liberal Arts; Dean Seward Reese of the College of Law; and Dean Charles Bestor of the College of Music.

What criteria are used in the selection of Willamette faculty members?

DEAN DOENGES—Evidence of professional competence as indicated by graduate school transcripts and the recommendations from major professors; a conviction about the integration of all knowledge; sympathy for the liberal arts ideal; and, a forceful and friendly personality.

DEAN REESE—Scholarship, desire to teach philosophy of legal education and sincerity of purpose.

DEAN BESTOR—Members of the Willamette Music Faculty are selected on the basis of their educational background and practical musical experience and upon their ability to utilize these in the teaching of their students. In addition, since music is a performing discipline and since the Willamette College of Music is a performing school, their playing ability is also taken into account.

In general, how are the supply and demand for college professors?

DEAN DOENGES—The areas that are roughest to fill are mathematics and sociology. Other areas such as economics, European history, certain specialized literature fields, chemistry and physics enjoy sellers' market competition. Faculty members for art, education, theatre, religion, American history and foreign languages are fairly easy to find.

DEAN REESE—There is sufficient supply to meet the need in law as people can come from practice into teaching. The percentage of those who are trained for practice, who are interested in teaching, is sufficient to fill the need and there are also some who are outstanding scholars who want to go directly from law school into teaching.

DEAN BESTOR—The supply of young performer-teachers seems to be almost unlimited. However, older established musicians on the faculties of larger schools are simply not available to Willamette at its present salary scales. Since Willamette's aim during the past few years has been to attract young and professionally oriented faculty members the current supply and demand situation has worked very much to our advantage.

Does the University receive a considerable number of applications for each vacancy?

DEAN DOENGES—We try to compile at least six strong applications for each vacancy.

DEAN REESE—Yes.

DEAN BESTOR—The College of Music has received an average of over a hundred qualified applicants for every position being filled, which is an astounding ratio.

What does Willamette stress in talking with applicants about a vacancy?

DEAN DOENGES—We stress the nature of our academic program. We are proud of our liberal arts curriculum, the strong reputation which Willamette enjoys.

DEAN REESE—It depends upon the desire of the applicant. Rather than taking the initiative in talking about the school, usually we just answer questions.

DEAN BESTOR—We have stressed the performance orientation of the College of Music and the fact that a young-

er member of a small faculty is in a good deal better position to establish himself professionally than is a junior member of a large faculty.

How does Willamette compete with colleges of the same size and prestige?

DEAN DOENGES—The Willamette salary scale is competitive with the salary scales of other private institutions of the same size and prestige in the Northwest (with one exception). We have a very favorable location and a strong reputation.

DEAN REESE—Willamette competes very well with other law schools of the same size and prestige.

DEAN BESTOR—Essentially we do not, since there are not very many colleges of Willamette's size with a full professional music program who are looking for the kind of faculty members that we are.

Does the University expect a faculty member who is hired without a doctorate to earn one within a few years after his appointment?

DEAN DOENGES—We tell a faculty member who is planning to go up the ladder in rank that at Ph.D. is absolutely required for an appointment to a full professorship, and that chances of being appointed to an associate professorship may be limited without the Ph.D.

DEAN REESE—Many of our teachers have J.D. (Doctor of Jurisprudence) degrees and those who do not will have the LL.B. exchanged for a J.D. within the near future. Advanced work beyond one law degree is not necessary for law teaching although in certain fields it is highly desirable.

DEAN BESTOR—Not necessarily.

What is Willamette's position on requiring faculty members to publish?

DEAN DOENGES—We have no "publish or perish" policy. We are pleased if faculty members are successful in publishing. We hope that faculty members will be encouraged to write articles. Our faculty organization is designed to encourage dialogue between members of the faculty in the different departments.

DEAN REESE—The College of Law does not have a "publish or perish" philosophy. However, in the field of law, most teachers want to publish because legal scholars have a desire to write books or articles.

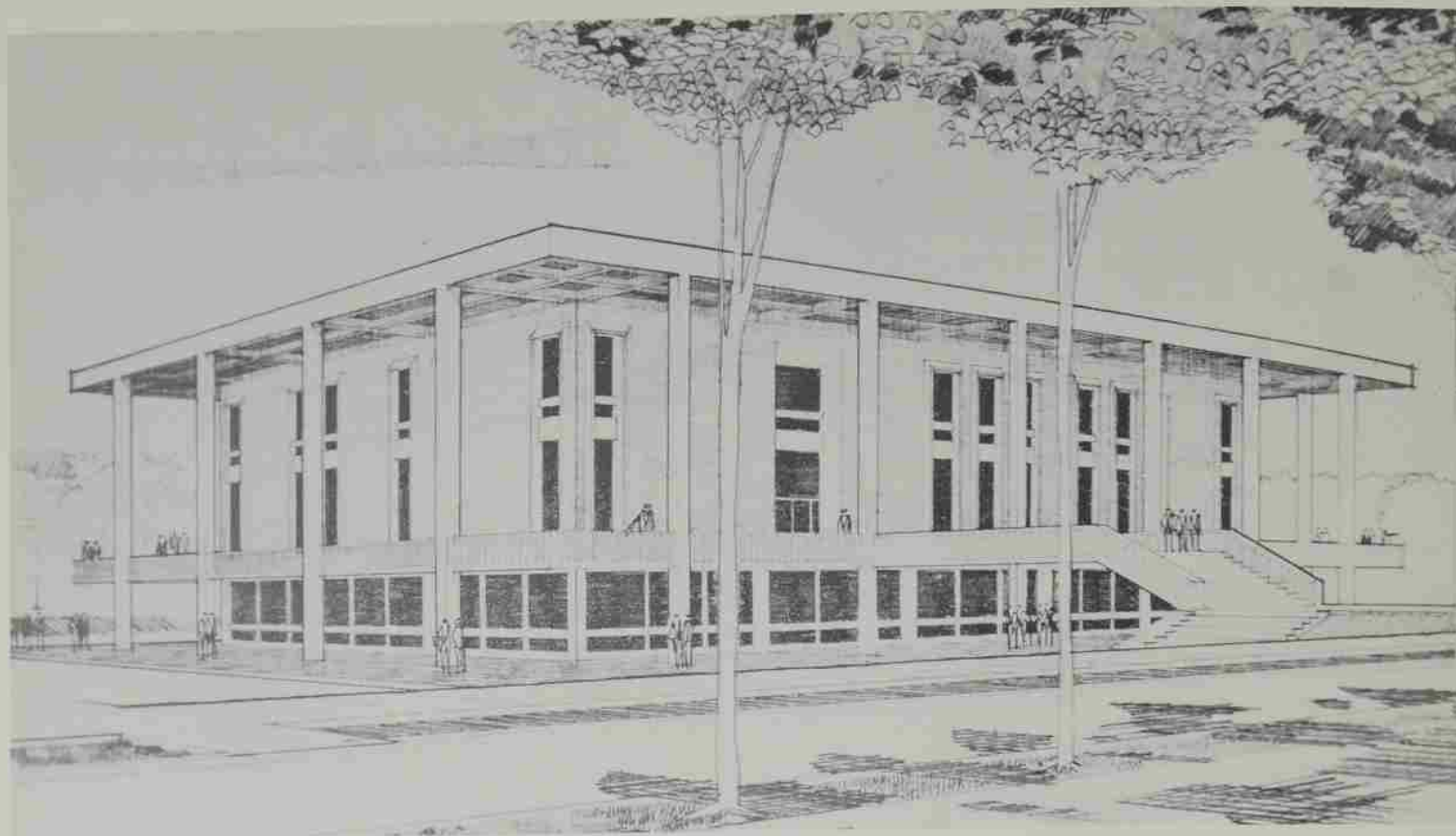
DEAN BESTOR—Performance in music is the equivalent of publication in the scholarly fields. The College of Music expects its faculty to perform actively, and in fact, the College goes to considerable lengths to advance its faculty members' performing careers.

How much voice does the faculty carry in policy formation at the University?

DEAN DOENGES—The faculty has taken on increasing responsibility for the direction the University is taking. The curriculum change and the faculty responsibility for the change in the curriculum has given impetus for increased faculty participation and direction of all aspects of the University.

DEAN REESE—The law faculty has the responsibility in the formation of College of Law policy.

DEAN BESTOR—The formation of educational policy is the essential purview of the faculty of any mature institution. It is one of the principle functions of the University administration to see that the faculty assumes this responsibility and to focus its activities in this direction.



Campus Awaits University Center

"Cokes on the campus; Juke box for the local jerks! Seeing one of the most startling innovations in years from the social point of view, students today are getting acquainted with the new student union coke center on the ground floor of Waller Hall."

So read the Sept. 21, 1942, edition of *The Collegian* in welcome to the University's first student center which was later named "Bearcat Cavern." The Cavern started as a one-room "Coke Shop" to serve the needs of the student body during the War years. It survived the scarcity of ice cream and other confections and in 1944 expanded to an adjoining room to serve the "campus-locked" sailor-students of the V-12 years.

Crowded Conditions

The tight confines of the Cavern were recognized by the students and the administration, and in 1953 a new student union was mentioned in long range development plans (along with the Fine Arts Auditorium, women's residence, health center, worship chapel, classroom building, and swimming pool addition to the gymnasium). The Auditorium, Doney Hall and Bishop Memorial Health Center became the immediate concerns and soon became realities.

It wasn't until 1964 that the 'Cat Cavern completely outgrew Waller and moved to more spacious, but temporary, quarters in the basement of Matthews Hall, a men's dormitory.

Approaching Reality

Now, the Bearcat Cavern, student union, student center or whatever name given to a gathering place for students, is approaching reality under the name University Center. The University Center has been approved as the next building

project, and University Alumni and friends can share in its establishment.

A \$375,000 challenge gift from an anonymous donor in 1966 was received to be matched by Dec. 31, 1968, for a total of \$750,000. Since then, advance and special gifts of \$75,000 were received, leaving a total of \$300,000 to answer the challenge. Operation Midpoint, the next phase in the \$12.5 million Fund for Educational Excellence (FEE 125) was announced with a goal of completing the challenge as soon as possible so construction can start. If alumni and friends contribute \$275,000, the Kresge Foundation of Detroit will provide the remaining \$25,000.

Community Service

Tentative plans for the Center include a large student lounge, recreation area, coffee shop, book store, music listening area, conference and meeting rooms, and offices for the personnel deans, financial aid director, student body officers, and publications.

Service to the Salem community has also been an important factor in planning. The University Center will provide enough room to host special conferences and educational meetings, particularly during the summer months. Currently the various offices and departments that will be brought under one roof are scattered around the campus. The book store still is cramped in the basement of Waller Hall, along with the student body offices; the financial aid director is in Eaton, the personnel deans in Waller and the publications offices in a small building south of Doney Hall. There are currently no large conference rooms.

The need for a University Center is clear and the Board of Trustees approved the architect's elevation drawing at the Board meeting October 20.



1967 Report of Gifts

Willamette University received a record \$1,446,027.00 in gifts during 1966-67, the 125th anniversary year, and we are thrilled by this evidence of continued faith in the future of the University.

We recall with deep gratitude the individual gifts which have made possible William S. Walton Hall for the study of languages, an addition to Doney Hall residence for women, and the Truman Wesley Collins Legal Center, and have thereby provided memorials for honored friends and colleagues.

We are grateful also for gifts to enlarge the Library, to improve Faculty salaries, to provide student scholarships, to start a fund for the proposed University Center, and to support many other projects and activities which help the University accomplish its educational objectives.

Someone who knew better recently remarked facetiously, that we ought to relax and "coast" a little since so many projects of the Fund For Educational Excellence had been completed in the 125th anniversary year. Even a cursory examination of the facts of life for Willamette University, and all of higher education, preclude such a thought being taken seriously even if so intended. Willamette University thrives today because friends have refused to "coast."

We know from experience, furthermore, both personal and institutional, that as long as we are capable

of adding to our resources we have a consequent need to share them in causes vital to the advancement of human beings and the improvement of life.

There is no hesitancy in calling to your attention, then, Operation Midpoint, the next phase of the Fund For Educational Excellence, 1965-1972 (FEE 125). As we approach the midpoint in time for FEE 125 we also are approaching the midpoint in resources with \$5.7 million in gifts and pledges in hand against a goal of \$12,500,000.

Operation Midpoint is intended to move FEE 125 past the midpoint in resources by the midpoint in time, December, 1968. Our goal is \$1,250,000 including \$300,000 to complete the \$1,852,600 fund for the Collins Legal Center and Endowment, \$300,000 to complete the fund for the proposed University Center, \$300,000 in additional scholarship endowment, \$210,000 to complete our current program of campus expansion, and a three year total of \$140,000 which Alumni will be asked to contribute to the Loyalty Fund to continue improvement of Faculty salaries.

We have had several occasions lately to say that the past is prologue. We thank you for the past and invite you to continue with us an incredibly exciting venture in educational excellence.

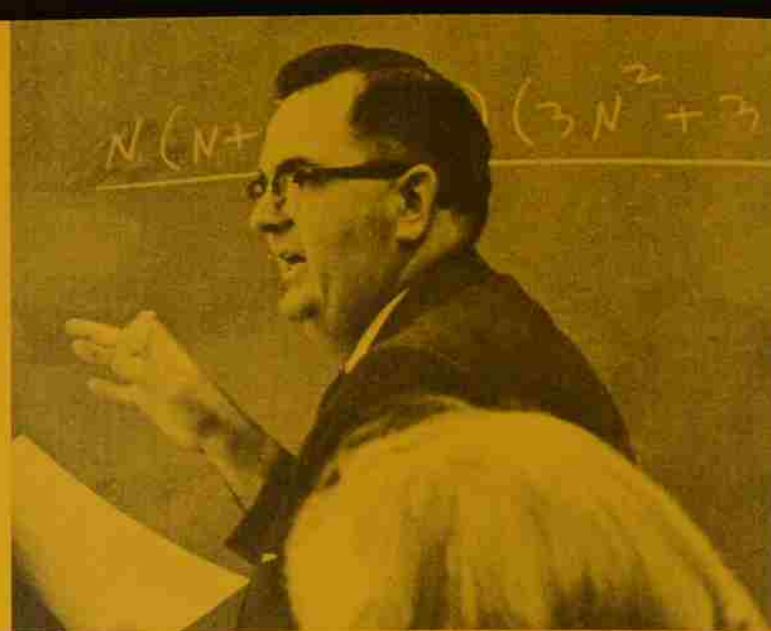

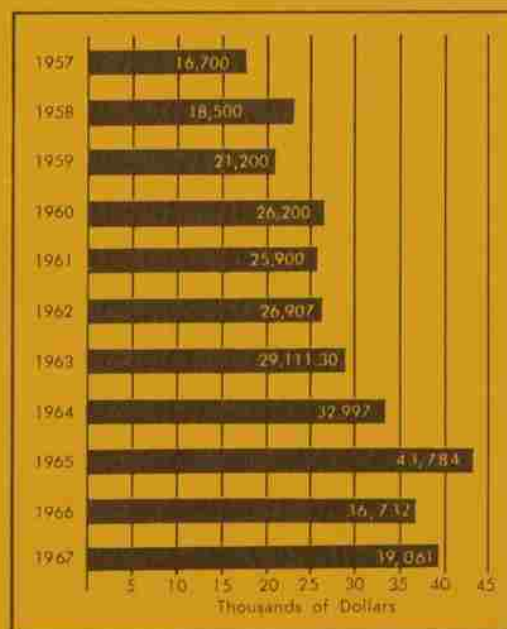

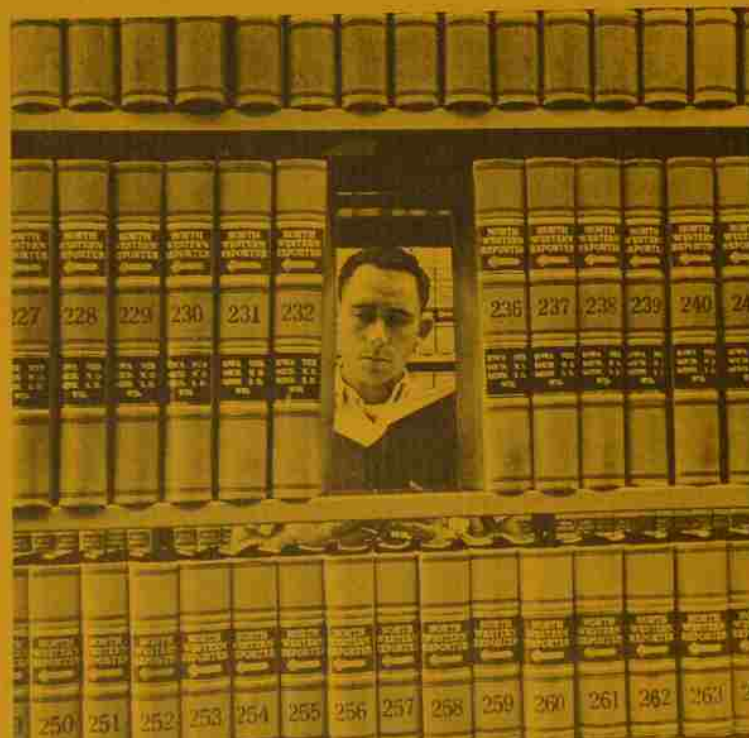

A Dean Retires

When a Dean retires from the University there are many testimonials, and somewhere along the way an old cliché is dusted off to the effect that "Dean's never retire, they just lose their faculties."

An exception exists at Willamette, and an exceptional person he is. He has been a Dean for 70 years, and he is nowhere near losing his faculties. It is by his own choosing that he is advancing to the second stage of retirement, and even then the University isn't letting him get away completely.

The Dean we're talking about is always quick to assert, upon first introduction, that he is a Dean by birth and not by decree. But nonetheless, Dean Pollock has rightfully earned the respect and esteem that accompanies the title "Dean."

For five years, since his first retirement as partner in the Gerber Advertising Agency in Portland, Dean Pollock has been editor of publications at Willamette, his alma mater. His association with the University dates back to 1918 when he enrolled, following duty in World War I. After graduation in 1922, he enrolled in the Chicago Academy of Fine Arts in preparation for a career as a commercial artist.

From the start, he had a deep understanding of what a liberal education is, and his answer to fellow commercial art students who claimed that he had wasted time in college was "Possibly I did, if an art education means no more than acquiring technique." He maintained then, and now, that "a mind must be singularly inactive and incurious not to desire some insight into the forces that mold us—regardless of the chosen vocation."

His vocation developed gradually from commercial art in Chicago for 12 years into advertising and eventually to serving the Gerber Agency for 26 years. Along with his expression in art and design, he developed a rare use of words, a combination suited to his work at Willamette which included *The Alumnus*, the last two University catalogs, and

special brochures of one kind and another for nearly every phase of the University.

A book that he wrote and illustrated on "Joseph, Chief of the Nez Perce" for young people is included in school libraries throughout the U.S. His most recent literary achievement is the design and layout of the University catalog, a complete revision from the old catalog and one that has drawn considerable favorable comment from faculty and students.

"Few men," said President Smith, "have given more devoted service to their Alma Mater than has Dean Pollock. We have been particularly fortunate to have his remarkable and artistic talents available at a time when we have been involved in so many activities that have called for the very best in planning for our publications."

Vice-president Jerry Whipple, who worked closely with Dean on numerous publications, said that "Dean recognizes the strengths of the University and understands the weaknesses. He has been concerned with Willamette tomorrow rather than looking to the past through rose tinted glasses."

Dean will continue to offer his talents to Willamette for tomorrow, as President Smith has asked him to be available "to assist the University in counsel and the planning of special projects." And if his special talents aren't enough, two of his most recent contributions have been son-in-law Al Fedje, Director of Admissions, and his daughter, Mrs. Al (Polly) Fedje, part-time secretary in the office of the personnel deans.

A statement made by Dean in 1956 probably continues to hold true for him: "Without college I would have missed some of the greatest motivations in my life, and surely its greatest satisfaction." Dean Pollock can add to that satisfaction the knowledge that he has performed a valuable service to Willamette University and that he has been a great inspiration to those of us who have worked with him.

University Dedicates New Legal Center

A new era in legal education at Willamette University was officially ushered in with the dedication of the Truman Wesley Collins Legal Center Sept. 9, 1967.

Nearly 3,000 friends of the University gathered for the dedication convocation which was to be highlighted by the first public appearance of The Honorable Thurgood Marshall, newest Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. Justice Marshall wired his regrets four hours before the ceremony that he was under doctor's care with a high fever.

Earl F. Morris, President of the American Bar Association, who was the keynote speaker that evening at the 20th annual Law Kickoff Banquet, and Senator Mark Hatfield shared the platform in Justice Marshall's absence, and the ceremonies continued as planned.

Dean Seward Reese of the College of Law preceded the two speakers with a speech of gratitude for the new facilities "which will meet the growing demand for legal training."

Former Oregon Governor Charles A. Sprague, chairman of the building committee of the Board of Trustees, made the formal presentation of the building, while George H. Atkinson, President of the Board of Trustees, accepted the building on behalf of the Board. Responses were heard from Orval Hager, president of the Law Alumni; William G. Sheridan, Jr., President of the Student Bar Association; and James L. Malone, dean-elect of the College of Law.

Members of the Collins family participated in the ceremonies at the Center. Miss Cherida Lynn Collins, daughter of the late Truman Collins, cut the ribbon at the main entry to the building, while Mrs. Collins unveiled the oil portrait of Mr. Collins that is placed on the back wall of the expansive lobby.

Robert C. Notson, Executive Editor of *The Oregonian* and vice-president of the Board of Trustees, delivered a tribute to Truman Collins (see below), while the Rev. Raymond E. Balcomb, minister of the First Methodist Church in Portland, spoke the prayer of dedication (see opposite page).

We are met here to open and put into active service this magnificently handsome and functional building, and to dedicate it to the memory of a loyal son and great benefactor of this university.

When he was taken from us at an untimely age, Truman had high aspirations and plans for Willamette. Among those was a new legal center. His family has carried on his purpose and, with the help of yourselves and many others, this center has been established.

Today Willamette College of Law enters upon a new course. We are launching more than a new law school building. We are founding a legal center—a center dedicated to the proposition that the spiritual and the legal must go hand in hand, that men of the law will also be men of integrity and honor.

Prayer of Dedication

Almighty God, whose universal law extends from the farthest star to the nearest particle of the atom, and from the macro-physical to the micro-moral, whose image in men is revealed in our efforts, however halting, to build a society of laws, accept now our praise and thanksgiving for the Truman Wesley Collins Legal Center at Willamette University.

We are grateful for him for whom it is named—grateful for what he learned as a student in this University and what he did as a Trustee, grateful for his keen business judgment and faithful Christian stewardship, grateful for his vision and for his unremitting labor, grateful for the mother who bore him, the father who reared him, the wife who encouraged him, the family which surrounded him, the children who succeed him. Pour upon them and upon us, we ask, a double share of his spirit!

Hear our prayer, O God, for all those who shall gather here as a community of scholars; by your spirit inspire those who shall jointly teach and learn, those who shall carry on that research which will bless and enrich human society and those who shall inspire new generations to be better lawyers, better politicians, better civil servants, better administrators, better citizens than their fathers were. Save them from satisfaction simply with the law as it is; imbue them with the conviction that the law should grow like a living thing to serve living human needs. And make them ever zealous for that justice in which is righteousness.

Graciously accept, O God, our dedication of this building, and by your continuing inspiration and presence make it a place where wisdom and justice issue in the love and service of humanity, as they did in Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

It was my privilege to have known and worked closely with Truman Collins for many years. The sentiments I have just expressed would be the precepts of the man whom we honor today.

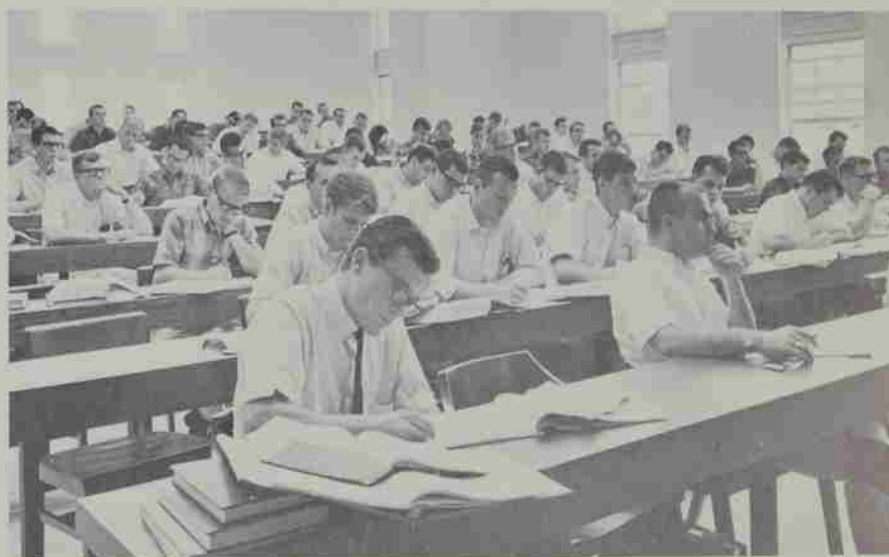
