Commencement Number

On Friday evening, May 23, the School of Law and the School of Medicine united in commencement exercises in the First M. E. Church. The address of the evening was given by the Reverend Benjamin Young, D.D., of Portland. The charge to the eleven graduates in medicine was given by J. C. Griffith, M.D., while the charge to the thirty-seven graduates in law was given by Judge George H. Burnett. Vocal selections were rendered by Mrs. Carleton Smith and R. B. Walsh.

On the evening of June 11 occurred the commencement recital of the School of Music, when Miss Nettie Snyder, a graduate in voice, delighted the audience with several vocal selections.

At 8:00 P. M., June 13, the commencement address of the School of Theology was delivered by Bishop Edwin H. Hughes, D.D. The stress that he laid upon thorough preparation and honest toil was enough to make a toiler out of every preacher that heard him.

On Sunday morning, June 15, at 10:30 A. M., the Baccalaureate sermon was preached by the President, Fletcher Homan. He also conducted the farewell meeting of the Christian Associations in the afternoon of the same day. The testimony of the students at this meeting as to the blessings and benefits of Willamette University was a splendid indication of the great good that they derive from the association in this school. On Sunday evening Dr. W. H. Fry of the Sunnyside Church, Portland, Oregon, preached a masterful and effective sermon to the Christian Associations at the First Church.

On Monday afternoon at 2:30 P. M., memorial exercises were held in the Chapel in honor of Jason Lee, under the auspices of the Girls Willamette Club. After these exercises a pilgrimage was made to the Jason Lee Mission Cemetery, and the graves of the early missionaries were beautifully decorated with flowers. A movement was started by the grave of Jason Lee to secure funds to erect a flagstaff upon the sacred missionary square.

From this staff it is planned there shall float continually the flag of the United States, in honor of Jason Lee and the other missionaries who did so much to save Oregon to the Union. At 8:00 P. M. the Inter-Society Oratorical Contest between the four college literary societies was held in the Chapel. Mr. Glen J. McCaddam, representing the Philodorian Literary Society, was the victorious orator. As a result the large silver cup will carry Mr. McCaddam's name engraved thereon, for it is customary to engrave the name of the successful orator on the cup each year under the name of the literary society to which the orator belongs.

On Tuesday, June 17, at 10:00 A. M., the Board of Trustees gathered for their annual meeting. The work was well organized; different committees were partially prepared to make their reports, and as a result, after brief conferences, all reports were ready in the afternoon. This meeting of the Board was most important, and yet by 7:00 P. M., under the splendid management of the Chairman of the Board, T. S. McDaniel, and the active cooperation of all the committees and of all members of the Board, the business of the day was finished. It was a day of jubilee and triumph, for this year marks the closing of the Hill campaign and the closing of the R. A. Booth campaign likewise. Old Willamette stands now with an accepted \$500,000 Endowment and \$50,000 in the Building Fund. Much important business was transacted during the day. Additional faculty members were secured, as a department of History and a department of English and Public Speaking were provided for. Faculty salaries were advanced. The Medical School was merged with that of the University of Oregon at Portland, by a vote of the Trustees. The Law School is to be continued another year, by agreement of the special committee, giving opportunity for the present class to complete the course. Judge C. L. McNary has consented to continue as Dean.

Plans were made to improve every department of the University as rapidly as possible. The Academy is to be separate from the College of Liberal Arts hereafter. A teacher is to be secured for the work in Science, another for Latin and English, while Miss Reynolds will have History and Mathematics. Twelve professors giving all their time to work in the College next year will mean much for the broadening and strengthening of the courses. Additional courses will be offered in History, in English and in the Physical and Biological Sciences. Music is to be a department of the College of Liberal Arts, a maximum of ten credits (in theoretical subjects) in the 120 required for the degree, Bachelor of Arts, being allowed.

Additional room for classes will be required, and as the building formerly used for the School of Medicine is to be fitted up for a Science Hall, the removal of the laboratories from Eaton Hall will leave sufficient room in this building for present needs.

The matter of a girls' dormitory was thoroughly discussed, and it was the general conviction that it must soon be forthcoming. All in all, it was a great day for the Trustees and a great day for Willamette. In all her history the old school has never been under such inspiration or looked into the future with such encouragement. From every standpoint the school is standardized and the future progress is destined to be greater and more rapid than at any time in her past history.

During the day the Senior Class entertained all visitors and friends. At 10:00 A. M. they had a program upon the Campus, when two concrete seats were presented to the University by the Seniors; at 11:00 A. M. a baseball game engrossed the attention of the spectators; at 2:00 P. M. the class parade, unique and effective, attracted many visitors. At 8:00 P. M. the Endowment Jubilee address was delivered to a packed house in the Methodist Church by Bishop Edwin H. Hughes of San Francisco. With great fervor he pictured the relations of the success of Willamette University to almost every phase of life in the state of Oregon and in the Pacific Northwest. At 8:45 P. M. the Senior play, "The Mill Stream Court," was given in one of those matchless, beautiful spots on the Campus of Willamette University amidst the great trees. It was the most successful effort of the kind ever made in the institution. Many hundreds of people gathered at that late hour of the evening, and remained until ten o'clock viewing the play which was picturesque and very beautiful in the lights and shadows among the trees. The Senior class set a standard that it will be hard for coming classes to maintain.

On June 18, at 10:00 A. M., the Methodist Church was filled to overflowing to hear the Reverend John Lamond, A.M., B.D., of Edinburgh, Scotland. Mr. Lamond delivered a most inspirational and well wrought out address on "The World Outlook." The Trustees occupied the rear of the choir gallery, in front of them sat the Faculty of the College of Liberal Arts, and in front of them sat the candidates for Master's degree, and the graduates of the College of Liberal Arts. Following Reverend Lamond, President Homan gave a brief address to the candidates for degrees. Mrs. W. H. Fry then rendered two very appropriate solos, receiving an encore from the audience. Dean Gaylard H. Patterson presented the candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Arts. The diplomas were delivered to them, and hoods were placed upon them by President Homan with words appropriate to the ceremony. Miss Edna Krenning then presented Miss Margaret Gittins and Miss Margaret Graham as candidates for the degree of Master of Arts from the department of English Literature. The diplomas were presented to them and the Master's hoods placed upon them. Professor M. E. Peck presented Mrs. Hattie Beckley Bellinger for the degree of Master of Arts in the department of Biology and she received her diploma and hood. Professor Patterson presented the Reverend D. Lester Fields of Dallas, Oregon, from the department of Social Science, and he was granted his diploma and appropriately decorated with his hood.

The *morning* exercises were satisfactory, and filled with a charm begotten of the security and serenity now felt concerning Willamette University. The closing of the \$500,000 campaign, the morning exercises, the appropriate address of Dr. Lamond, the splendid condition of the institution at the present time, all contributed to making June 18 the most delightful of Commencement days. Trustees and friends know that the institution is growing and all looks bright for the future of Old Willamette.

The Alumni business meeting occurred at 2:30 on June 18, and was full of interest from start to finish. From 3:30 to 5:30 President and Mrs. Homan held a reception at their home, which was beautifully decorated. The occasion was a very pleasant affair. President and Mrs. Homan, Vice President and Mrs. Todd, Dean and Mrs. G. H. Patterson and the Senior Class were in the receiving line.

At 6:30 the Alumni banquet was held in the Hotel Marion. It was largely attended. Fitting toasts were the order of the evening, and thus closed perhaps the best year in the history of Willamette University.
