Extract from the Constitution.

Article II.—Object.

The object of this Association shall be to promote growth in grace and Christian fellowship among its members, and aggressive Christian work, especially by and for students; to train them to devote their lives to Jesus Christ, not only in distinctively religious callings, but also in secular pursuits.

Article III.—Membership.

Sec. 1. The active membership of the Association shall consist of men,

either students or members of the faculty of this institution, who are members in good standing of some evangelical church, and have been elected by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any meeting. Only active members shall vote and hold office.

Sec. 2. Any man of good moral character, either student or member of the faculty of this institution, may become an associate member by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any meeting.

The membership fee shall be \$1.00 per year, payable at the opening of the college year.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of each member to co-operate heartily in carrying out the objects of the Association in Article II., according to the policy determined by the Association or Executive Committee.

Statement.

The Young Men's Christian Association of Willamette University stands for the best there is in college life. It is the strongest organization in college, including among its members the strongest men, both in athletics and scholarship. A cordial invitation is extended to every man in the University to ally himself with the Association either as an active or associate member.

Bible Study.

The systematic study of the Bible is being recognized more and more as a necessary part in a well-rounded education. This need is met by the Association Bible Study Classes. The importance of the Morning Watch is also emphasized by this department. The following courses will be offered, with strong men as leaders:

Studies in the Life of Christ (Sharman).

Studies in the Acts and Epistles (Bosworth).

Studies in Old Testament Characters (White).

Studies in the Teachings of Jesus and His Apostles (Bosworth).

Missions.

The Association endeavors to stimulate an intelligent interest in the Missionary movement by means of its Mission Study Classes. One or more courses will be offered this year.

Meetings.

On Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock is held the regular Association meeting. This meeting is given up chiefly to talks and addresses on topics of concern to thoughtful college men. A weekly prayer meeting is held every Wednesday noon, 11:55 to 12:10. Every noon at 11:55 a few men gather

for a few minutes in the Noon-day Prayer Circle. You are cordially invited to each of these meetings.

Conventions.

The Oregon-Idaho State Convention is held each year at one of the City Association or College towns, and is a source of inspiration and help to all who can attend. The greatest event, however, in a Y. M. C. A. man's life, is the Gearhart Conference, lasting ten days, held at Gearhart Park, Oregon. We want ten men to go next Spring. Be one.

Room.

Room 11 at the head of the stairs on the second floor is known as the Association Room. Here you will find the

Employment and Information Bureau with lists of rooms, boarding places, and places to work. Make this room your headquarters for the first few days. Don't hesitate to ask questions.

Social.

Every man, especially if he is new, is urged to be present at the "Stag Social" Saturday night, Sept. 29, in the Gym. The Joint Reception, the second week, given by the two Associations, is the big event of the opening weeks. Don't miss it.

Purpose.

The Young Women's Christian Association is an organization aiming at the development of strong Christian womanhood. During the past year we have had a membership of about sixty.

At the beginning of the college year the new students will be met at the trains and welcomed by Association members, who are also glad to be of any assistance in finding boarding places or to give information about registering.

A cordial invitation is extended to all girls to identify themselves with the Young Women's Christian Association and to join Bible and Mission Study classes. Membership dues are (\$1) one dollar per year. Upon payment of this any member of an evangelical church becomes an active member; while associate membership is composed of those who are not church members.

Meetings.

The devotional meetings are held each Sunday at 3 p. m. in the Philodorian Hall, on the third floor. A series of five-minute prayer meetings is conducted daily at 11:55 in one of the regular session rooms. These meetings are led by the various members of the Association and prove a source of great inspiration to all who attend.

Bible Study.

Systematic Bible study is carried on under the leadership of able leaders. Classes will be offered in Sharman's "Life of Christ," Posworth's "Acts and Epistles," and White's "Old Testament." During the past year a special lecture course was given by Miss Fricky, a former student of the Moody Bible Institute.

Mission Study.

A rare privilege was enjoyed last winter by those interest in the study of missionary work, in a half hour class conducted by Miss Frickey, a returned missionary.

Though it will probably not be possible to offer a similar course this year, other courses will be conducted in which the students may learn the problems and achievements of the modern missionary enterprise.

The colleges of the Pacific Coast have placed Miss Morrison, secretary for the Young Women's Christian Association, in Tokio, Japan, toward whose support our department pays \$15 annually.

Employment Bureau.

The Fall Campaign committee will have charge of a list of places for the employment of girls during the winter. Any girl desiring to work for her board or wishing employment dur-

ing the holidays, etc., should not hesitate to consult the chairman of the committee in Room 11.

Social.

Among the first and most interesting social affairs of the college year are those provided for by the Christian Associations. On Saturday afternoon of the first week the Y. W. C. A. entertain, informally, the new girls, and later during the winter various social functions are presented, some jointly with the young men, and others for the girls.

We invite, most cordially, all girls to be present at the opening receptions, as social intercourse makes up so much of college enjoyment that we are anxious to do our part in making your acquaintance and assisting you to begin your college course among pleasant friends.

Gearhart Park.

The Gearhart Park Conference is the Northwest Conference of the Associations of the various colleges of Washington, Oregon and Idaho. The privileges and delights of Gearhart can only be told by a former delegate. Willamette was represented by five girls this Summer.

The young women meet annually for the purpose of gaining strength in their own Christian life and efficiency

in serving others; but especially in working for the increased usefulness of the Association.

COLLEGE ORGANIZATIONS.

The Student Body

is the organization of the students of all departments of the University, having for its object the controlling of the student enterprises. A fee of \$3, payable with the tuition, is charged each student for defraying the expenses of the Student Body.

Girls' Student Association.

The girls of the University are organized into the Girls' Student Association. To them falls the task of arranging the social functions of the Student Body.

The Young Men's and Young Women's

Christian Associations

are organizations for promoting the religious welfare of the students and aiming at the development of noble Christian character.

The Philodorian Society

is the oldest literary society in the University, having for its object the promotion of oratory, debate and general literary work. Their sister society,

The Philodosian Society,

serves the same purpose among the girls.

The Websterian Society

is a new and strong society with the same object, while especially emphasizing debates.

The Oratorical Association

is an organization of all college students, aiming at the development of oratory in the University. The local association sends a representative, chosen in a local contest, to the annual state contest.

The Annual Inter-Literary Society Contest

is held at the end of each college year, at which time representatives from each society compete for the Silver Cup.

Debates.

Debating at Willamette is under the supervision of a Debate Council, which arranges for the Intercollegiate Debates.

The Campus Tennis Club,

a body of students interested in tennis, keeps in order two courts on the campus for local games and arranges Intercollegiate tournaments.

PUBLICATIONS.

The Willamette Collegian,

the college paper, is published weekly by a staff elected by the Student Body. This is a newsy and interesting paper; every student should subscribe.

Wallulah.

In 1903 and 1905, the first and second editions of the Wallulah, the college annual, were published by the Student Body. Copies of the 1905 edition may be secured from the Treasurer.

This little book in your hand is the

Students' Handbook,

published annually by the Christian Associations.

ATHLETICS.

Athletics at Willamette have a very bright outlook for the future. The Gymnasium and classes are to be under the supervision of a competent physical director. Intercollegiate games will be played in football, basket ball baseball, tennis, and on the track. Some excellent records were made in the sports last year and the prospects for the coming year are very bright.
