Many people have made inquiries as to the origin of our Annual, *The Wallulah*. Those of you familiar with the Indian Legends of Oregon particularly with F.H. Balch's, "The Bridge of the Gods," will at once appreciate the significance of the name, and its peculiar relation to the name of the University. According to our history books Wallulah was an Indian maiden, the daughter of old Murnomah, the powerful Chief of the Wallamets (the original spelling of the name), the tribe which occupied this area of the Pacific Northwest, and which held many other tribes under subjection. This was during the days when the fabled Bridge of the Gods spanned the Columbia at the place known as the Cascades. An ancient prophecy said that the power of the Wallamets would remain unbroken as long as this bridge stood.

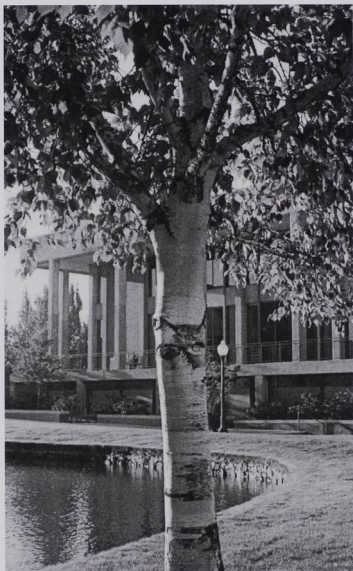
Wallulah was not much like her Great father, she was more like her Asiatic mother. She was gentle, and didn't appreciate the warrior ways of her heritage. She knew that her father was soon going to choose a husband for her, and to her surprise it turned out to be the Indian, Snoqualmie, a mighty Chief from another tribe that she had taken a liking to. Cecil Grey, a white man, came from the East as a missionary. He was kind hearted and Wallulah soon fell in love with him, and he with her. However, he felt he could not be true to his mission or to her, so he decided it would not work out between them. At this time troubles began to arise for the Wallamets, there were great volcanic disturbances, it was at this time that the great bridge fell. This was taken as a sign from the gods, and the power of the Wallamets was broken.

Snoqualmie had witnessed one of their many meetings, and since Cecil's work was stirring up such animosity it was easy for this Chief to get him condemned to death. However, the Great Spirit took Cecil before the ordeal. Wallulah was forced to marry Snoqualmie, and was unaware of the true reason behind her lover's disappearance. Her new husband forced her to leave her home the same day of the wedding. It was while they were traveling that he made it known that Cecil was dead, and that he had killed him. Her hatred for Snoqualmie grew stronger and it became apparent to him. He chose to place her in another canoe for awhile. When the canoes approached the newly formed rapids at the Cascades Wallulah's canoe was one that capsized and the unhappy Wallulah was drowned. 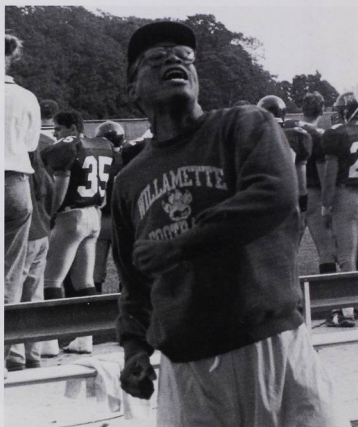

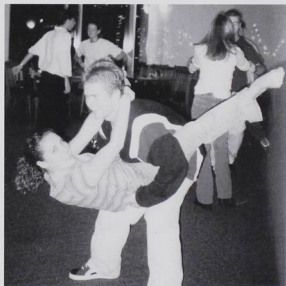

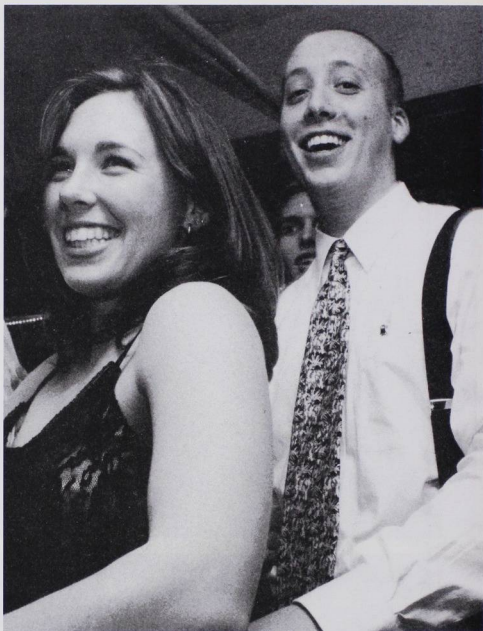

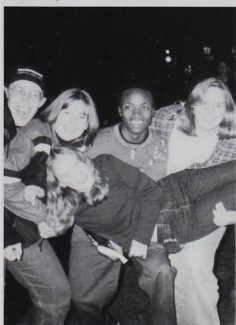

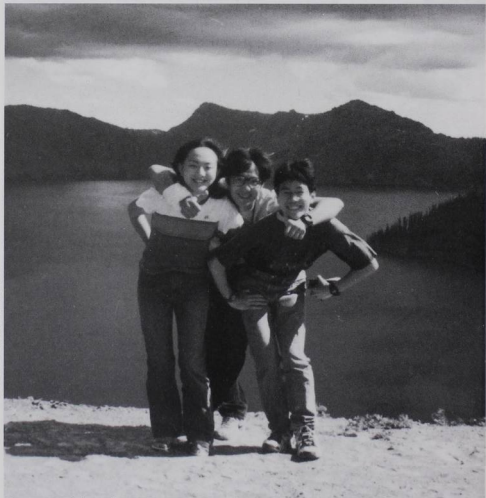

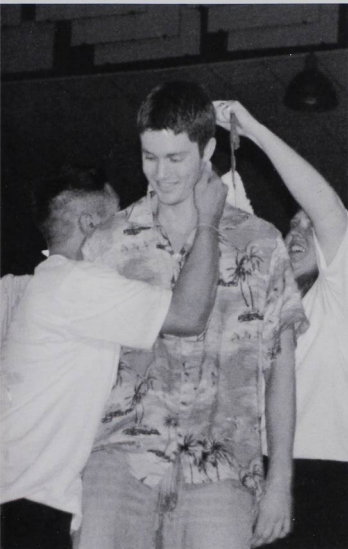

The Theatre Department held six performances this academic year: five plays and one dance concert. All of the productions were well received and entertained a diverse subject matter; from Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet* to *Oleana*, a two person show that focused on sexual harrassment in the world of academia.

One of the most beautiful plays in its entirety, was Tom Stoppard's *Arcadia*. Alternating between the Romantic ideal of the early 19th Century and contemporary scholarship on the beliefs and happenings of those times, the production featured characters in an interplay of scientific theory and the magical, unexplainable world of art and poetry. The production's comment on human existence was particularly poignant: characters from both worlds made unappealing empirical discoveries, yet found hope and happiness in love and a waltz.

In the spring, the department produced two plays and the dance concert. *Suburbia*, the first of the openings, was an insightful look at adolescence in the suburbs, set of the popular hangout spot: a local quickmart. The dance concert, *Body Eclectic*, followed and was student coreographed by eight students and featured thirty dancers. *A Flea in Her Ear* was the last production--a hilarious French farse in which the question of fidelity erupts into a complicated chain of comical events. Inaugural Galla

It is not every year that the Black Tie formal coincides with an inauguration of a President. This year was one of those exceptional years. Black Tie, put on by ASWU, was also the Inaugural Ball for President M. Lee Pelton on February 19, 1999 lasting from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.

The dance was held in the Rotunda of the Capitol Building, another change from most years. Usually the dance is held somewhere in Portland, but the Capitol was chosen for the setting of this special event.

The dance trend this year seems to be set by swing dancing, and Black Tie was

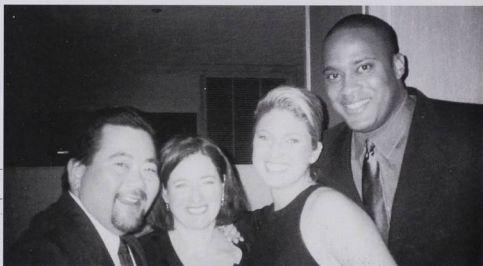

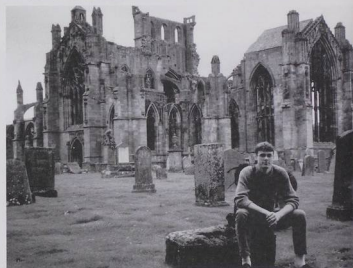

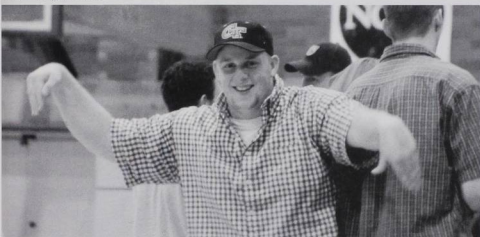

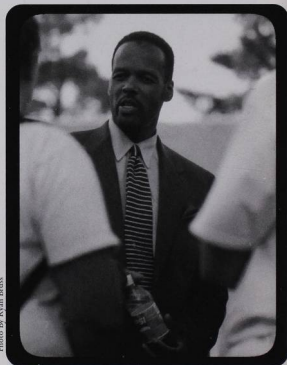

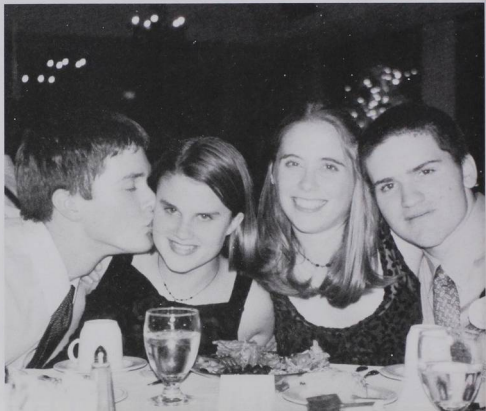

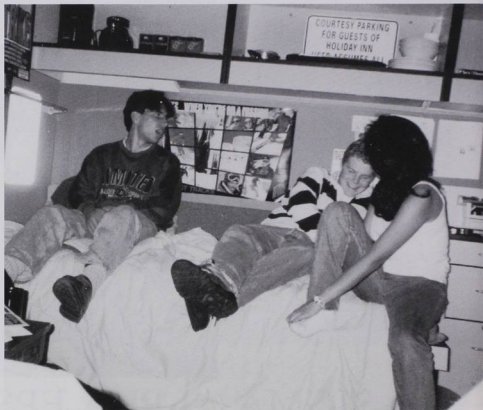

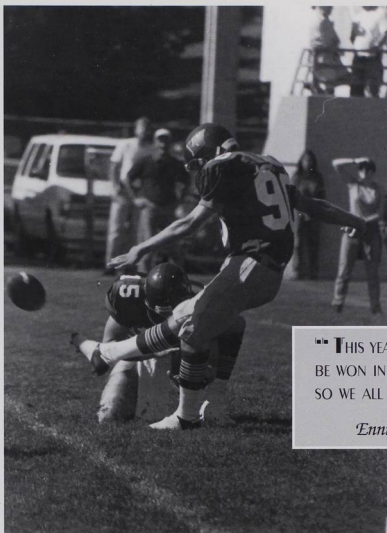

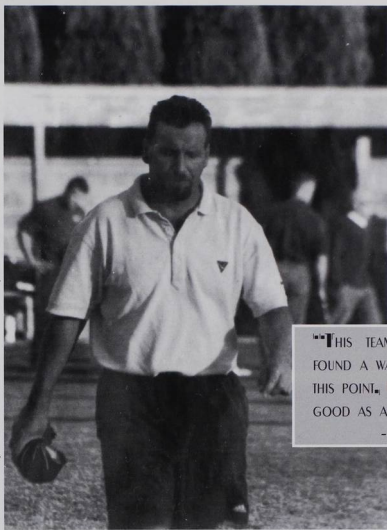

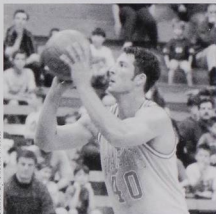

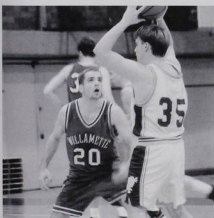

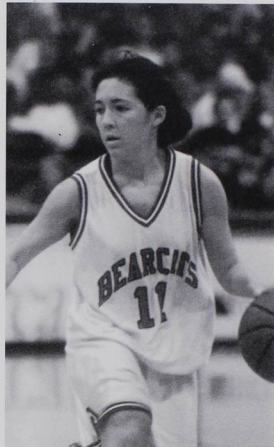

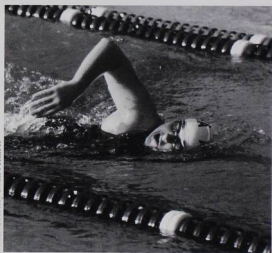

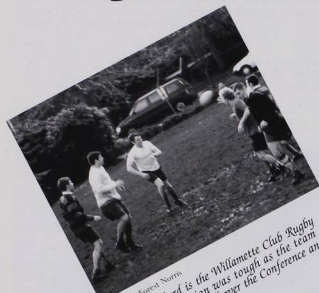

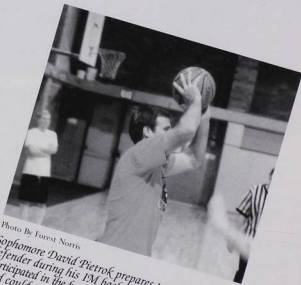

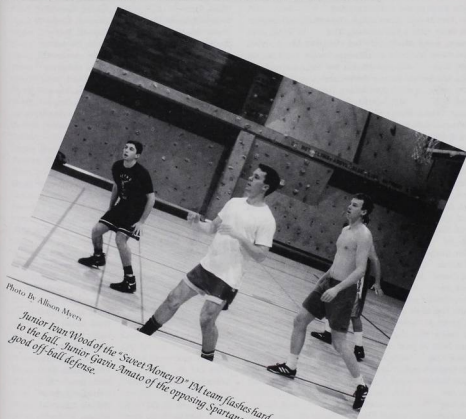

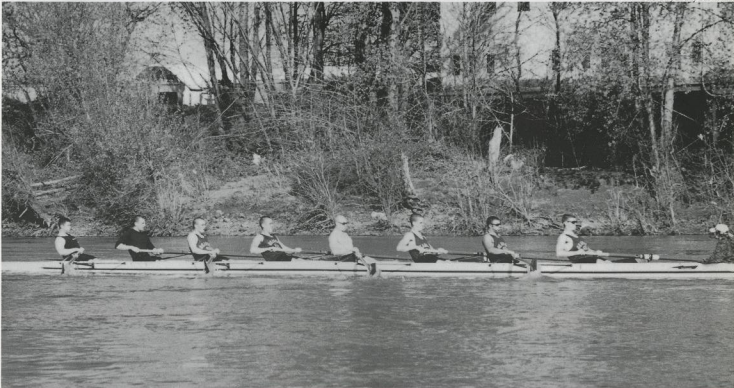

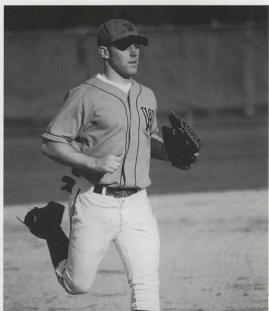

New and Old Faces

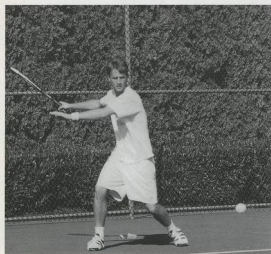

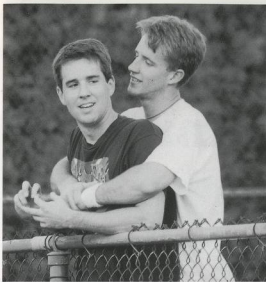
