# What the Trustees Said:



Willamette's Board of Trustees saw not only the past and present but far into the future, and so it voted thoughtfully and unanimously to ask the people of Oregon for \$1,250,000.00 for Oregon's own school.

The official action follows:

**BE IT RESOLVED:** 1. That the President of the University be instructed to acknowledge the communication of the General Education Board announcing a conditional gift of \$350,000 to Willamette University for endowment.

2. To notify the General Education Board of the acceptance of its offer and to pledge that the conditions will be met.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:** 1. That in view of the offer of the General Education Board, the Board of Trustees undertake to raise \$1,000,000 (including the \$350,000 of the General Education Board) for endowment, and \$250,000 for a new gymnasium and for the needs of the University pending the payment of the pledges.

# The Conference Spoke:



Willamette has done great things for the Christian Ministry in its eighty years of service. The Oregon Conference knew the value of this school, and so it voted unanimously to back the Trustees in their asking for \$1,250,000.00. The formal action

was as follows:

"We heartily endorse the Movement to add \$1,000,000 to the Endowment Fund of the University and \$250,000 for other purposes, and pledge our loyal and enthusiastic support.

"We welcome as a piece of wise statesmanship, the recent action of the Board of Trustees launching a development for \$1,250,000. We urge every Pastor and Official Board in the Oregon Conference to give a prominent place to Willamette University in their programs for this year."

The Laymen's Association of the Oregon Conference gave this action its enthusiastic approval in a vote taken at the Annual Conference of 1922.
