Peacetime Enrollment Swells

March Influx May Add 100 New Students

An anticipated increase of from 75 to 100 new students for the new spring semester in March is expected to swell Willamette's growing peacetime enrollment close to the 700 mark. Enrollment for the present semester is 597 including 30 special students.

Former service men will constitute the great majority of the new spring semester students, joining the 108 men and two women veterans now on the campus. Shortage of housing will restrict the number of new students that can be accommodated, although the university administration is making every effort to provide suitable living quarters.

Alpha hall, formerly the Alpha Psi Delta house, will be opened as a dormitory for men in March. The building had been used as a women's dormitory while the Navy V-12 unit occupied Lausanne. The university is negotiating with the government for veterans' housing units, particularly for married veterans, and it is hoped that some of the accommodations can be available for the new semester.

In the meantime progress is being made toward early start of construction of the proposed men's dormitory on the campus in order to have it ready for occupancy when the fall semester begins.

Composition of the student body still reflects the wartime lack of symmetry in the size of the classes. Freshmen make up more than half the enrollment in the college of liberal arts, sophomores more than a quarter. Full-time liberal arts students number 273 freshmen, 134 sophomores, 60 juniors and 46 seniors. The college of music has 33 majors in addition to numerous other students enrolled in music courses. Law students total 21.

Among veterans on the campus, 35 are returning to Willamette after interruption of their studies. Fifty-one of the veterans are married.

Fraternities Revive at WU

Fraternities at Willamette, dormant during the war, have revived and pledged up to a maximum of 20 new members each during the fall semester.

Still without housing quarters, the fraternities nevertheless hold weekly meetings. One house, formerly owned by Kappa Gamma Rho, has been sold for use by the new national sorority, Chi Omega. The Sigma Tau house is now in possession of a private owner. The Alpha Psi Delta house is to be opened as a men's dormitory by the university next semester. It had been used to house women when the Navy was occupying Lausanne hall.

Collegian Wins Fifth Straight National Pacemaker Award

For the fifth successive semester the Willamette Collegian has rated among the small handful of the nation's best college newspapers and won the coveted Pacemaker award.

The latest award was for the issues published during the past spring semester and marks the third achieved under the editorship of Catharine Thomas, '45. Five papers in the country won the distinction.

The Collegian is the only paper to lay claim to five Pacemaker awards in a row and represents the smallest college ever to produce a Pacemaker. The first two Pacemaker awards

were won during the editorship of Nadene Mathews, '44.

Ratings of college papers from all over the country are determined by the Associated Collegiate Press, with headquarters at the University of Minnesota. The papers are judged first according to classes which are based on enrollment and frequency of publication.

Highest honor within each class is All-American, an award which the Collegian has won since the spring of 1941. Outstanding All-Americans in each class are then nominated to compete regardless of class for the coveted distinction of Pacemaker.

Marion Sanders, '41, guided the Collegian to its first All-American honor. Hale Tabor, '42, and the late Dix Moser, '44, each succeeded in winning the honor twice. Then Nadene Mathews edited another All-American in the summer of 1943 and followed with the first two Pacemakers.

Two-Semester School Year Returns Again

Resumption of the normal two-semester school calendar is planned for the 1946-47 year at Willamette. The fall semester will start in September for the first time since 1942, after three years of crowding three full semesters in each year.

The present school year is continuing on the calendar adopted in July, 1943, when the Navy V-12 unit was established at Willamette. Because the V-12 program continued through last summer, the normal schedule could not be adopted until after next summer's vacation.

Although the summer semester will be discontinued, an eight-week summer session will be offered in response to student demands. The session will begin July 8 and close August 31.

Registration for the fall will open September 29. In subsequent years the fall semester will probably start a week or two earlier. Later starting was deemed advisable for next year because of the late close of school this spring, with commencement set for June 30.

4th Sorority Goes National

In stallation of the fourth Willamette chapter in women's national sororities took place this semester as Delta Phi became the Beta Pi chapter of Delta Gamma.

Other nationals on the campus include Pi Beta Phi, the former Beta Chi; Alpha Chi Omega, the former Alpha Phi Alpha; and Chi Omega, which colonized a new chapter.

Veteran Coach Leaves to Go Into Business

Roy S. (Spec) Keene, for 17 years head coach and director of athletics at Willamette, has resigned to go into private business. He has formed a partnership with Howard Maple, former Willamette basketball coach, in Maple's local sporting goods store.

A lieutenant commander in the navy and in charge of the physical education program for the 12th naval district since August, 1942, Keene returned to civilian life in November. It had been expected that he would be returning to Willamette to resume his pre-war work.

No mention has been made of a successor to the tall and sprightly coach, who in his 17 years at WU herded his Bearcats to the top of the Northwest conference so many times. Prof. Lestle J. Sparks has been acting director of athletics and head coach in Keene's absence, and has been directing the annual Willamette-sponsored state high school basketball tournament, which was another Keene job.

The 52-year-old mentor, second only to R. V. "Nig" Borleske of Whitman college as the NW conference coaching dean—Borleske is in his 28th year at Whitman—came to Willamette in 1926 replacing Guy Rathbun. Keene had previously coached at Corvallis high and for the Oregon State college frosh after graduating from OSC.

During his coaching days at OSC, Keene coached his partner-to-be Maple, who later became an All-American nominee as fullback for the Staters. Maple coached the Beaver frosh before coming to Willamette as basketball coach from 1938 to 1942, a job that Keene had from 1931 to 1936.

During his stay at Willamette Spec's football teams won a total of 82 games while losing 51 and tying six. His biggest year came in 1934 when the 'Cats won eight and lost but one, that being to a powerful Oregon State eleven. Other big seasons came in 1936 and 1941 when the WU gridders won seven and lost two each year. The 1941 grid campaign was climaxed with a trip to Hawaii and a game with the University of Hawaii, which was finished only a few hours before the attack on Pearl Harbor.

wars since its inception in 1909, promises to be one of the most spirited in the long history of the contest.

Naval uniforms, conspicuous at the past two Glee's, will be absent this year. Veterans of the services, however, will constitute the great bulk of the male contestants, and many of them are returning students who have participated in former Glee's.

Class rivalry has been spurred by early bet making and by the introduction of a beard growing contest which will end just before the Glee. Since women are to judge the winners, the men students have trimmed their first straggly growths to mustaches, sideburns, goatees and other tailored effects.

Theme for the Glee this year is the fight song. Words and music, written by members of each competing class, are to be judged before the performance and the results tallied in with the judges' decisions on the rendition.

Contract for construction of a new platform for the performance has been let to replace the old one which is no longer considered safe.

Oliver to Edit Melville Book

Dr. Egbert S. Oliver, Willamette professor of English, has been invited to join with the foremost Melville scholars in editing the first complete edition of the works of Herman Melville. The invitation was extended by the general editor of the project, Howard P. Vincent of Illinois Institute of Technology.

The edition will consist of 16 volumes. Oliver will edit the volume containing "The Piazza Tales," for which he will carry on further research in addition to much that he has already done. His task entails a trip east to confer with his publishers and associates and to examine original manuscripts. Leaving January 25, he will be gone for six weeks.

Numerous articles by Oliver on Melville have appeared recently in scholarly magazines as a result of his research. One of the most recent was an article in College English on "Bartleby," one of the "Piazza Tales."

What the Alumni of Willamette are Doing

1889

W. T. Rigby, '89, died unexpectedly in Pendleton in November. Mr. Rigby at one time served on the board of trustees of the university. He had been in the stock raising business in Pendleton and owned wheat land in Canada.

1916

Beryl Holt, '16, attended the Washington State board meeting of the American Association of University Women in Everett, Wash., in September. Miss Holt is the fellowship chairman of the North Pacific region of the AAUW. She is head of the mathematics department of Salem high school.

1917

James L. Mott, LLB '17, republican representative for the first district of Oregon in congress, died at the U. S. naval hospital in Bethesda, Maryland, where he recently was operated on for removal of an intestinal obstruction. Rep. Mott died November 12, which was also his 62rd birthday. He was ranking republican on the house naval affairs committee and on the committee on public lands. His career in active politics began with his graduation from law school and his admission to the bar. He immediately opened a law office in Astoria, closed it to enter the navy, returning in 1919. He served as city attorney then three terms as state representative, until he was named state corporation commissioner. He entered congress in 1934 and been reelected repeatedly since. He is survived by his wife and three daughters.

Keith Lyman, '21, died suddenly at his home in Bremerton on July 18, at the age of 46. He was a member of Bremerton high school faculty, and had been on leave of absence for the past year. Alumni Constitution

Proposed Amendments

to the CONSTITUTION OF THE WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

Article I (No Change)
The name of this organization shall be the Willamette University Alumni Association.

Article II (As Amended)
Membership
The active membership of this association shall consist of the persons who hold one or more degrees from Willamette University or its affiliated colleges. Only active members of this association shall be eligible to be officers of this association.

The non-graduate members of this association shall consist of students who have completed two or more years in the College of Liberal Arts, but they shall not be eligible to hold office or serve as an alumni trustee. The president, professors and teachers of Willamette University and its affiliated colleges shall be honorary members of the association by virtue of their offices.

Article III (No Change)
Purpose
The object and purpose of this association shall be to foster good will among its members, promote the general welfare of Willamette University and its affiliated colleges, and cooperate with the administration of said institution in attaining worthy objectives.

Article IV (As Amended)
Officers
Section 1
The officers of this association shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, and three members of the Executive Committee hereafter provided.

The President and Vice-President shall each be elected for a term of two years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, provided however, that the Vice-President shall be elected for a term of one year at the annual meeting of the association in June 1946, and in June 1947, and every second year thereafter the Vice-President shall be elected for a term of two years. Should a vacancy occur in any elective office, other than the office of President, the President shall have the power to appoint a successor to fill such vacancy. In case of the death, resignation or other inability of the President to serve as such, the Vice-President shall perform the duties of that office until a successor has been elected and qualified.

At the annual election of the association in 1946, one member of the Executive Committee shall be elected for the term of three years and thereafter at each succeeding annual election one member of the Executive Committee shall be elected for a term of three years. The members of the executive committee heretofore elected shall continue to serve until their respective terms of office expire and likewise members of the executive committee hereafter elected shall continue to serve until their respective successors are elected and qualified.

Section 2 (As Amended)
The President of said association shall perform the usual functions of presiding at all meetings of the association and perform other duties usually devolving upon a president of an association of this character. He shall furthermore appoint, not later than March 15th, of each year, a nomination committee of five members who shall, as hereafter provided, nominate and place upon the ballot the names of not less than two members nor more than five members as candidates for each elective office to be filed at the next regular election to be held as hereinafter set forth in Section 7 of Article IV of this Constitution.

Section 3 (As Amended)
At the annual election as provided for in Section 7 of Article IV of this Constitution two members shall be elected to the Board of Trustees of Willamette University, each to serve for a term of three years or until a successor shall be elected and qualified. Should a vacancy occur at any time among the members of the Board of Trustees elected by the Alumni Association, it shall be filled at the next regular election of the association.

Section 4 (As Amended)
The Vice-President shall perform the special duties assigned to him by the Executive Committee and he shall also be chairman of the social functions of the association.

Section 5 (No Change)
The President of the Association shall appoint the following standing committees: Budget, Program, Nominating and Auditing. The chairman of each committee shall be a member, ex-officio, of the Executive Committee of this organization.

Section 6 (No Change)
The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep a record of the proceedings of each meeting and have charge of all books and records belonging to the association, conduct its correspondence, and have charge of all funds, paying out money upon requisition of the Executive Committee and making a full report of the financial conditions of the association at the annual business meeting in June of

each year, and at such other times as may be directed by the executive committee.

It shall furthermore be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer to collect the dues of \$1.50 per annum from every member of the association and also such charges as may be made for the banquet at any of the association meetings, except that \$2.00 per annum shall be the dues for husband and wife when both are members of the association. In the event any member desires to subscribe to the Collegian, the cost thereof shall be the sum fifty cents per year in addition to the foregoing dues.

Section 7 (As Amended)
Election of Officers to be by mail.
The election of officers shall be conducted as follows: Not later than March 15th, of each year, the secretary shall mail to all members of the association a list of all members whose dues are paid for the current year and who are thus eligible for nomination as officers of the association. The names of the nominees shall be returned to the secretary not later than April 5th, following, and delivered by the secretary to the nominating committee who shall then place upon the ballot the names of not less than two nor more than five persons as candidates for each of the respective offices to be filled, at least three of whom shall be selected as nominees for each office from the names submitted by the alumni members as nominees for each such office. The secretary shall then prepare the official ballots and mail one ballot to each member whose dues are paid for the current year or who shall enclose dues for the next academic year, provided, that any member who has contributed one or more units of \$5.00 each to the Loyalty Fund of Willamette University during the current year or the year immediately preceding shall be entitled to vote at said election.

In case a member entitled to vote has not for any reason received his ballot or when such ballot has been lost or destroyed, another ballot shall be supplied him by the secretary upon receipt of satisfactory proof of such non-receipt, loss or destruction. All ballots shall be marked, signed and returned to the secretary by the voters not later than May 10th, following receipt of the ballot and the secretary shall then deliver said ballots to the canvassing board consisting of the secretary and three other alumni members appointed by the Executive Committee. Any member of the alumni shall be permitted to be present during the canvassing of the ballots.

Promptly upon the conclusion of the canvassing, the secretary shall announce the result of the canvass by posting upon the bulletin board in Eaton Hall of Willamette University a statement of the votes received by each candidate. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes for each respective office shall be declared elected and the secretary shall notify each candidate by mail as to whether he is or is not elected. The canvassing board shall safely keep said ballots until their final disposition shall have been ordered by the Executive Committee.

Article V (No Change)
Amendments

This constitution may be amended by two-thirds vote of members present at any regular meeting of the association, provided the proposed amendment is stated in writing at the previous regular meeting and received due notice given for at least six weeks prior to the submission of said proposed amendment by posting the same on the bulletin board of said institution and publishing the same in at least one issue of the Collegian.

Article VI
There shall be at least two regular business meetings each year, the exact time and place of said meetings to be determined by the executive committee and the election of officers of the association shall be conducted and held in accordance with the provisions of Section 7 of Article IV of this Constitution as last amended.
