



Requirements for Graduation are as follows: The candidate must be twenty-one years of age, and must present proper testimonials of a good moral character, and satisfactory evidence of having studied medicine three years (lectures included) with a reputable practitioner of medicine. He must have attended two full courses of lectures, the last of which must have been in this Institution. He must pass a satisfactory examination, and must submit to the Faculty an acceptable thesis on some medical subject, in his own handwriting. For an ad eundem degree, a diploma from a regular Medical College and a satisfactory examination in the practical branches and the usual fee.

The fee for a full course of lectures is \$110 00; Matriculation fee (paid but once), \$5 00; Graduation fee, \$30 00; Demonstrator's ticket, \$10 00. Graduates from other Medical Colleges are required to matriculate only.

Good board can be obtained on terms more reasonable than in any other city on the Pacific coast. Students, on arriving in the city, are requested to call on the Dean, who will see that they are provided with accommodations, and will give any further information that they may desire. Letters addressed to the Dean, or any member of the Faculty, will receive prompt attention.

Students will find a good assortment of Medical books in this city. It is recommended that they supply themselves with one or more Text Books in each of the Departments.

The last term of lectures was somewhat embar; assed by the prevalence of an epidemic that prevented as full an attendance as was expected; but the prospect for the coming session is equal to any of the previous anticipations. Enough have already signified their intentions, to make the class for 1871–2 as large, if not larger, than any of those preceding. No effort will be

spared to render the course effective and thorough. The course of Summer instruction has been in operation since the close of the last lectures, and when perfected in details, it will prove a valuable assistance in continuing the studies without intermission for the entire year. No ground is lost, and the season affords an opportunity of making practical exemplification of the duties incident to the treatment of disease.

Pupils of the Normal Class will be drilled thoroughly in the common English Branches, Algebra, History, Criticism, Calisthenics, Map Drawing, and the Theory and Practice of Teaching. At stated times they will be expected to take charge of school-rooms in the University, and conduct recitations. Experienced Teachers will lecture on School Government, Methods of Instruction and kindred subjects.

We take this opportunity of thanking Hon. R. Mallory, Mr. J. K. Gill, S. C. Simpson, Esq., C. H. Allen, A. M., A. J. Anderson, A. M., Rev. W. H. Rogers, A. M., and T. H. Crawford, A. M., for their assistance in this Department during the past year. We hope to receive farther help from these and other gentlemen of culture during our next collegiate year.

Graduates of this Department will receive suitable Diplomas, and, if they wish, First-grade Teacher's Certificates for Marion County.

COURSE OF STUDY.

Commercial Arithmetic, Penmanship, Government of the United States, Commercial Law, Political Economy, Freedley's Legal Adviser, Book Keeping by Single and Double Entry—embracing Farming Accounts, Merchandising, General Commission Business, Domestic and Foreign Shipping, Brokerage and Exchange, Banking and Commercial Correspondence.

We take pleasure in announcing that P. L. WILLIS, Esq., will lecture on Commercial Law, and Mr. J. H. Albert, Carbier of Ladd & Bush's Bank, will give the class practical instruction in Banking. Our thanks are due these gentlemen for their valuable assistance during the past year.

Most Commercial Schools are attended only by young gentlemen, but in this school both sexes will enjoy the same advantages. We invite attention to the following, written by Ira Mayhew, for eight years Superintendent of Public Instruction in Michigan:

"Woman, as well as men, may practice Book-keeping. The wife, the daughter or sister, when not engaged in other more befitting pursuits, may properly keep the books of the husband, the father, or the brother, while he is occupied in more active and laborious employments, with advantage to herself as well as to him. Women thus possessing a knowledge of business, and particularly the business of those they are interested in, (if not dependent upon,) in case of bereavement are less at the mercy of others. They can continue a business for a time, if need be. Or they can close up a business, or settle an estate, or properly take care of any money or propty they may chance to have. And if in straitened circumstances, they possess the means of better providing for their own wants; for they are prepared to earn a support in working for others as book-keepers, as clerks, or as copyists, positions which comparatively few are now prepared to fill."

Suitable Diplomas will be awarded to graduates.

TIME AND CONDITIONS OF EXAMINATION.

The regular examination for admission to the University takes place on the Monday before Commencement, and also on the day of the beginning of the first term.

ADVANCED STANDING.—Candidates for advanced standing will be examined in the studies required for admission to the Freshman Class; also in the studies of the College Course, as far as pursued by the class to which admission is sought. No one will be admitted to the Senior Class after the first term.

AGE.—No one can be admitted to the Freshman Class who has not completed his fourteenth year, nor to advanced standing without a proportionate increase of age.

TESTIMONIALS.—Applicants for admission, if from another College, are required to furnish certificates of dismission in good standing.

PUNCTUAL ATTENDANCE.—Students are required to be punctually present at the beginning of each term. The loss of even a few days is a serious disadvantage, the effects of which are likely to be felt for a considerable time afterward.

REGULATIONS

- 1. Due respect must be observed towards all officers of the Institution.
- 2. A gentlemanly and ladylike deportment is at all times expected.
- 3. Crowding the halls and doors for conversation, wearing hats at improper times and places, running up and down stairs, whistling, boisterous talking or laughing, or making any unnecessary noise on the premises or in the building of the Institution, are violations of good order. Profanity, rude and indecent language, smoking in any of the rooms or halls of the Institution, or upon the premises, drinking intoxicating liquors, frequenting places of gambling or drinking, playing at games of chance, the use of firearms on or about the premises, loitering or idling away time, protracted visiting in each other's rooms, and all other practices calculated to injure the morals or disturb the good order of the School, are totally forbidden.

- 4. Special attention must be paid to cleanliness. Entering the house with dirty feet, spitting on the floors, improper appearance of person or of clothing, are violations of this rule and will be noticed accordingly.
- 5. Any student who, by writing, cutting, or any other means defaces or injures any building or any other thing connected with the institution, shall, for such injury be held strictly accountable.
- 6. All the students are required to answer at the calling of the roll in the morning. No student is allowed to be absent without special leave, except in vacations.
- 7. Students must be at home or in their rooms during the evening and night of each school-day.

The above regulations are published more to indicate the principles which students will be required to observe than to constitute a code of statutes. It is expected that they will yield prompt and cheerful obedience to such additional regulations as the Faculty may from time to time find it expedient to adopt.

SOCIETIES.

Literary Societies, in both the Male and Female Departments, afford excellent opportunities for intellectual culture. A healthful rivalry seems to prevail among them. During the past year they have carpeted their halls with fine Brussels carpets. In our next Catalogue, we propose to give the Societies' officers for the year and such other information as they may desire us to publish.

BOARDING.

No arrangements for boarding students are made by the Institution. Boarding is readily obtained in private families, at as moderate rate as circumstances will allow, and varying, according to the expensiveness of living, from \$4 00 to \$5 00 per week. In many cases, students board themselves. They hire a room suitably furnished, or sometimes furnish it themselves, and in this way frequently reduce the expense of boarding to one dollar per week.

RECITATIONS AND EXAMINATIONS.

An account of every recitation is made and at the middle and close of each term an average is taken. Ten is assumed as a maximum, and indicates an excellence to which students rarely attain. One falling below six cannot advance with the class. In making up the standing, no allowance is made for absences except such as are recorded after Teachers have been duly notified of the sickness of a student.

The classes are examined at the middle and close of each term; and no student who absents himself from the examination or fails to master his studies, will be permitted to proceed with his class.

PUBLIC WORSHIP.

Devotional services are held daily in the University Chapel. All students are required to be present, and each provided with a Bible for reading in concert; and also to attend some place of worship on the Sabbath. Students' Prayer meeting, every Tuesday evening.

PAYMENT OF BILLS.

Tuition is required in advance. Students whose tuition remains unpaid after the Monday next succeeding the presentation of bill, will not be permitted to recite. At the begining of the term bills are made out for the full term. In case of pretracted sickness credit will be given on the following term.
