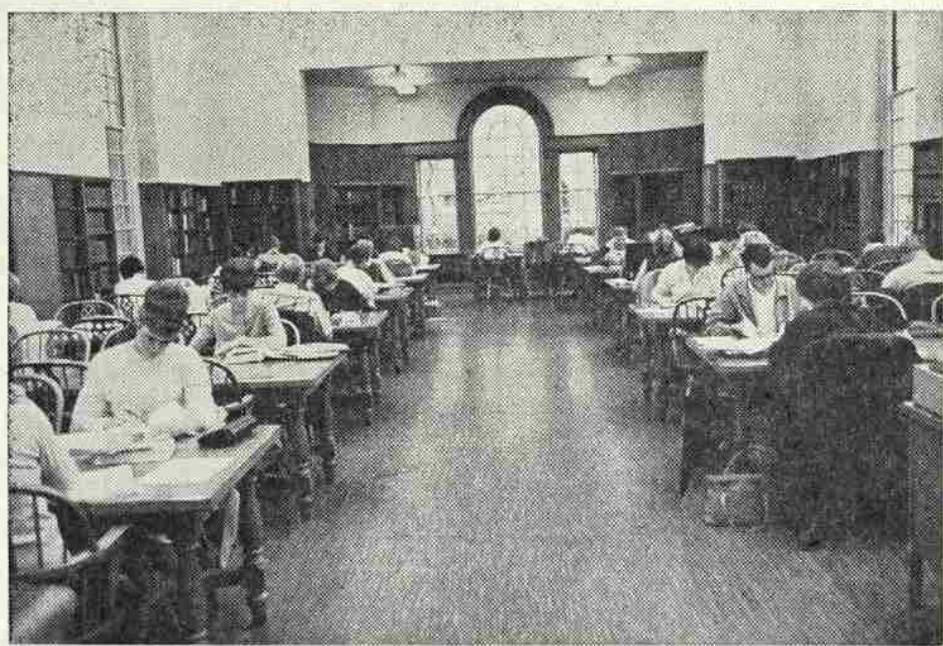
**In Memoriam**

### To All WU Faculty Members

- 3. The **REGULAR** University schedule prevails for Friday, November 26, 1965.

All members of the faculty will be expected to meet their scheduled classes regularly at the hours scheduled on Friday, November 26. In the case of professional meetings which demand the absence of faculty members from the campus, suitable arrangements should be made for other members of the fac-

ulty in their departments to hold the classes as scheduled on Friday, November 26 and these arrangements be reported to the appropriate Dean.

I'm sure all members of the faculty will recognize the necessity of cooperation in this matter. Since the calendar was established and reaffirmed by faculty vote, there is every reason to request complete cooperation with the schedule so adopted.

Rep. Green, Sec. Wirtz To Give WU Campus D.C. Air Next Week

Two important government figures will speak in Tuesday and Thursday convos next week. On Tuesday Congresswoman Edith Green will present her views on "Higher Education and the 88th Congress." Mrs. Green, Democrat

from Portland's congressional district, has been mentioned as a possible nominee for the Senate, probably running against Governor Hatfield. Mrs. Green was a student at Willamette for two years, but took

her degree at the University of Oregon. She also studied at Stanford University before launching a varied career in radio, publicity, teaching and politics. She has now served in Congress for five terms and is especially well-known for her work on the education and labor committees of the House.

The United States Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz will speak Thursday on a topic yet to be announced. His appearance at Willamette is sponsored by the Atkinson Fund as a part of the Willamette University Lecture Series.

Secretary Wirtz was undersecretary to Arthur J. Goldberg in 1961 before succeeding Mr. Goldberg in the Secretary's job. As the Labor Department becomes more involved in and important to the national economy, Mr. Wirtz' responsibilities increase. Now his worries include automation, apprentice training and equal opportunity employment.

Mr. Wirtz is a graduate of Harvard Law School and practiced law as a partner of the late Adlai Stevenson. He has also taught at the University of Iowa and Northwestern University. He has a long public service record, having been appointed to many Presidential committees and also having acted as a labor management arbitrator before he took up his Cabinet post.

Effort to Change Vacation Off

Student leaders and faculty who object to the present one-day vacation for Thanksgiving will try to introduce a changed policy for Thanksgiving vacation next year. As far as this week is concerned, the decision has already been made and re-affirmed by faculty vote. Thus objectors will have to focus their attention on discussions of next year's calendar to be held later this year.

The faculty vote was 28 no and 26 yes on whether to skip classes Friday and allow them to be made

up on Saturday, December 4. Once it was decided that classes could not be made up, the vote was heavy to hold them as usual on Friday.

Efforts at calling a special faculty meeting to reconsider this week's calendar have failed. The Administration has requested cooperation from faculty in treating Friday like any other school day, though individual profs may decide whether or not to give special penalties such as double cuts. Some professors have polled their classes and report that up to two-thirds may be absent.

Kings And Queens To Spin On Stage

Willamette's stage will come alive with kings and queens, a love struck prince, and a black and blue princess next weekend, December 3rd and 4th.

"Once Upon A Mattress," starring Bill Gaynor as Prince Dauntless and Carol Schmidt as the Princess, was written for comedienne Carol Burnett.

The musical is a delightful modern version of the Princess and the Pea fairytale.

Princess Winnifred must pass a test administered by the Queen, Debbie Gordon, before she can marry the Prince.

Gene Frickey, as the mute King, expresses himself through pantomime. This is amusing when he explains the facts of life to the Prince and when he has to tell the Jester that Lady Larkin is expecting.

Sir Harry, Dick Horner, and Lady Larkin, Ginny Hawkins, can not get married until the Prince does. The bossy Queen has declared that "throughout the land no one may wed 'til Dauntless shares his marriage bed." Sir Harry scours the

countryside for a suitable Princess and comes up with Winnifred. She excels in swimming moats, having lived in a swamp kingdom.

The lovable, helpless Prince constantly asks his mother if he can get married to the Princess. Dauntless surprisingly changes his meek attitude toward the Queen at the end of the play.

Other leads in the play are Larry Brown as the Jester and Chuck Olsen who plays the minstrel.

The entire show has been choreographed by Carol Rae, who operates a school of dance in East Salem. The chorus will do both singing and dancing.

A unique revolving stage setting has been built for the production under the leadership of Tom Smith. The set was designed by Mike Bennett.

Admission to the musical is free, but a student body card is necessary to obtain tickets for the seats. Tickets may be picked up before the musical in the student body office. Tickets should be picked as soon as possible since all seats are reserved.

Tipoff Tourney To Open BB Season

The Northwest Conference basketball season will be tipped-off at the seventh annual NAIA District Two Tip-Off tournament next Thursday, December 2-4.

The tournament is NAIA-sponsored and thusly the spectator will have to pay 50 cents for admission.

As has been tradition, Willamette will host four of the eight participating teams on Thursday and Lewis and Clark will entertain the remainder.

Starting at 7 p.m. on Thursday, participants in the first round of action at Willamette will be Oregon College vs. Linfield and Oregon Tech vs. Willamette. At LC, Eastern Oregon is pitted against Pacific and George Fox is up against Lewis and Clark.

EOC and LC have been regarded as the favorites at LC, and Willamette and defending champ Linfield have received the nod at WU.

Looking back on previous tournament play, Willamette holds the edge with a record of 15-3, while winning three championships. Lewis and Clark has won the title twice and owns a 13-5 record. Linfield brings a 12-6 mark into the tourney and one crown.

On the basis of the Cats' past record, Coach John Lewis states that "We have always done well in the tournament and we sure hope we can continue to keep this reputation up."

In trimming his team for the tourney, Lewis states that at the forward position, two lettermen Larry Potts and Pete Slabaugh along with freshmen John Barker and Larry Stuart are all battling it out for a starting spot.

At the post or center spot, Dennis Kauhi and Charlie Roberts, are eligible for the important slot.

The guard position is well-stocked with Jay Brack, Spike Moore, Mike Alley, Mick Hoffman, and Domingo Marcelino. All are hopeful aspirants for the two starting berths.

"The team has been holding daily workouts and the team is improving every day," enthuses Lewis. He hopes to trim the squad down to 12 or 13 in the near future. As of now the squad has been plucked to 15.

The post position seems to be the crucial spot on the team, since most of the Bearcats' offense operates with the use of the post. If the team can develop a good post man, the coach thinks that Willamette basketball fans will have a successful season to look forward to.

Linfield to Playoffs

Last Saturday's meeting of the NAIA officials voted Linfield College to represent the western division in the national NAIA playoffs. Linfield will play Sul Ross State of Texas on State's home field. The game, at this writing, has been scheduled for Saturday November 27th.

Rally Offers Homecoming Changes; General Extends Military Thanks

To the Editor:

Now that football and its related activities have officially come to a close, we would like to make some suggestions as to the operations and traditions of Willamette.

To be brief, we are sure that Homecoming was one of the greatest ever in WU history and we extend our congratulations to the Frosh and the Homecoming Committee on a great job. In asking why it was such a success, the answer appears relatively simple. The proximity of the fire, and the fact that it was not destroyed before hand encouraged a great many people to attend the Rally.

For this reason we suggest the following changes in tradition: 1) The Sophomore class tradition of trying to find the bonfire be discontinued; 2) The Frosh attempt each year to build a higher bonfire than the year before; 3) The fire be announced Thursday of Homecoming week so the entire class could work on getting wood for it; 4) It be close enough that the parade (which should be tradition itself) can end there.

We do not feel that the present tradition is conducive to a Homecoming bonfire, since in order to hide the bonfire, the Frosh tend to build it on the outskirts of town in some muddy field that doesn't even tempt their own classmates to come out and participate.

An additional suggestion is that Willamette in some way establish a voluntary pep band. Apparently, the feeling now is that it isn't necessary to have a band at most of

our athletic contests. The band turnout for our championship game last week was a trumpet and a clarinet. The excuse was scheduling and seating. With the pep band we could be assured of some musical participation at every game, and wouldn't have to deal with the indifference we face now. Some musically inclined people share this view, therefore it shouldn't be hard to organize.

We present these ideas with the hope that some action might be taken on them. Willamette has shown definite improvement in the spirit of her Student Body these last few years, and we feel that these suggestions would help her take one more step along that road.
