



NINE MEN PLACED IN NEW WHO'S WHO

NUMBER INCREASED ONE

Willamette Percentage Larger That That of Whitman as Shown by Report

Nine members of the Willamette University faculty have the distinction of being listed in the latest edition of "Who's Who in America." This is an increase of one over last year, Dean Roy R. Hewitt being the new member.

The current list includes: President Carl Gregg Doney who is the author of "The Throne Room of the Soul," "An Efficient Church," and "God Answers Prayer," George H. Alden who has written "New Government West of the Alleghenies," Frank M. Erickson who was student of archaeology in Athens, Greece, and is now the Dean of the Liberal Arts college; Roy R. Hewitt author of "Oregon Supplement to Our Government" and co-authorment; Selva B. Loughlin who co-edited "Outline of Oregon Government" and occupied the position of English instructor in the Friends Boys' School, Ram Allah, Palestine, and was department head of economics and sociology of Park College, Missouri; Frank G. Franklin author of "Legislative History of Naturalization in the United States," John D. McCormick noted Bible lecturer and author of "Thinking Through the Bible," Charles L. Sherman author of "The Moral Self" and "The Mind—its Nature and Functioning," and Morton E. Peck, who has written "The Book of the Bardens" and is now completing research work in the East for a publication dealing with the classification of Oregon plants.

VIRGINIA EDWARDS FORCED TO LEAVE

Virginia Edwards, prominent member of the Junior class, has left school to be with her mother in Portland on account of the continued illness of her father who is in a critical condition following an operation, the condition of Dr. Edwards, who is pastor of the Sunnyside Methodist church, is expected to change however, before next semester, so that Miss Edwards is planning definitely upon returning at that time to continue her work at Willamette.

Miss Edwards has been very active in campus life of the university ever since her Freshman year, when she wrote the words of the Freshman glee song. In her Sophomore year she took a prominent part in the Theta Alpha Phi Homecoming play, "The Importance of Being Earnest." She also took a lead in "The Boar," a Russian classic also presented by Theta Alpha Phi. This year she played the leading role in the homecoming play. In the recent popularity contest she was honored by being placed in three of the groups.

At the time of leaving the campus Miss Edwards was a pledge to Theta Alpha Phi, a member of the Glee Club, and vice-president of the Delta Phi sorority.

JUNIORS WIN BLUE KEY TROPHY ON SATURDAY

Seniors Rank Second With 39%
While Freshman Are Low
Contest Next Year

The Blue Key sprint trophy was awarded during chapel Tuesday by Ivan White, president of the fraternity, to the Junior class. The number of students attending from each of the classes was not large. The Junior class had 43 members present, or a percentage of .467. The Seniors placed second with 28 members, or a percentage of .394. The classes in the lower division are larger, thus lowering the percentage. The Sophomores had forty-eight members present with a percentage of .333. The Rooks came last on the score with 36 going, making an average of .218.

The cup will become the property of the Junior class until next year when another contest will be headed by the fraternity, and trophy reawarded.

TUESDAY MARKS OPEN- ING INTERCLASS DEBATE

Sophomores and Freshmen to Occu-

Classes to Follow Later

The first of a series of interclass debates will be held in chapel, November 27, between the Freshman and Sophomore men. The question to be debated is "Resolved that the Traditional Policy of Frosh Discipline as evidenced by green caps should be abandoned." The debates are being sponsored by the Tau Kappa Alpha, national forensic fraternity, under the leadership of Margaret Pro who is chairman of Forensic council.

Dr. Doney will act as chairman at the debates which will be judged on the basis of humor, organization and presentation. The points awarded will count for interclass rivalry; there are ten points; five for the winner, three for class placing record, and two for the winner of the consolation series. The first series of debates will be held between the men and this will be followed with interclass debates among the women.

CAMPUS IS HOST TO OREGON CHEMISTS

The Oregon section of the American Chemical society will have its monthly meeting on the campus Saturday night in the Science building.

The program will start at O'Leary's restaurant where dinner will be served, and a general get-together will occupy the forepart of the evening. After the dinner the members will convene in the Science building at 7:45. Here the remainder of the time will be given over to discussion of papers presented by Professor Laemer of Willamette and Mr. Shaeffer who is doing work in the cultivation of peppermint, and in the use of peppermint oils.

Mr. Laemer's topic will be the "Diffraction of the X-rays in Liquids" while that of Mr. Shaeffer will have to do with the "Peppermint Culture and Distillation."

The organization is a part of the American Chemical Society which is the largest chemical order in the United States, as well as being the largest technical society in the world. Its membership comprises some fifteen hundred chemists.

Those in attendance will be professors from Reed college, the University of Oregon, Oregon State college, as well as several chemist who are not connected with any educational institution.

Too Much Pepper

Uncle Joe was a hill man, an Ozark pioneer. When he died a neighbor in discussing him with a stranger who had heard of Uncle Joe's remarkable influence in the rural community where he had been an outstanding figure for many years, said, "He never did like too much pepper in his gravy."

"He never did like too much pepper in his gravy"—a cryptic epitaph, Ozarkian in its terse epigrammatic wording. It was the Ozark's way of saying that Uncle Joe was "slow but sure," solid, steady, not given to hasty extremes of action or thought. A sincere tribute.

We as a group in our actions are prone to agree with the saying. The flashy student who shows marked social grace, having just enough particular talent to get him by, will draw a certain amount of admiration. Another type present is that of the student who is not in accord with conditions surrounding him and who in his ignorance disregards these customs, being unwilling to adapt himself to the background disappearing from the campus.

We admire the former student, we gradually ignore the latter, but the slower quieter Uncle Joe type cannot be overlooked. He forms the backbone of the college.

Posterity Pays Just Homage to Schubert on Centenary of Death

One hundred years ago today, Franz Schubert, the now famous Austrian composer, died in comparative obscurity. The man whose fertility and industry as a composer are unparalleled was practically unknown to his own generation, despite the fact that though he was only thirty-one years old when he died he had already composed some eight hundred songs.

It is these songs for which he is perhaps best known today. Everyone has heard "The Erl King" or Schubert's "Ave Maria" at some time during his life. But the great man did not confine himself to this type of music alone; operas, masses, chamber music, piano sonatas and symphonies are all included in his works. Fate, to the very end, however, played against him, as he died one day too soon to be publicly acclaimed after the performance of his Eighth Symphony.

Genius is rarely recognized in its own day; it takes posterity to discover it. As a result, on this centenary of his death, the musical world pays Schubert homage.

FRESHMEN DISAPPROVE DINING HALL EXPENSE

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Nov. 12. — (PIP)—Disgruntled members of the eating clubs, which board at Euclia Commons—the freshmen dining halls—have threatened a walk-out if better meals are not served for the advanced prices. Charges of inefficient management were hurled at the authorities responsible for the increased board rate of \$1.20 per day, a daily advance of 29 cents.

This is the second outbreak of discontent at the Commons within a week, as the freshmen had previously petitioned for meals seven days a week, instead of but six.

A committee of the exasperated clubmen has been appointed to investigate conditions and to compare prices at other eating places on the campus. Its findings, with suggestions for a solution of the problem, will be presented to the University Comptroller in a few days.

FRESHMAN CAUSE NEAR RIOT ANNUAL PARADE

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Nov. 20.—(PIP)—Pajama-clad freshmen caused a near riot in Palo Alto recently when they descended on the college town after staging their annual pajamero on the campus, and it took the combined efforts of most of the policemen and the diplomacy of the chief of police to disperse revelers who were threatening to raid a girls' school.

After their parade along "Fraternity Row" and by the women's dormitory, the freshmen commanded the local "Toonerville" and descended on Palo Alto, where some succeeded in crashing the gate at the moving picture theaters. 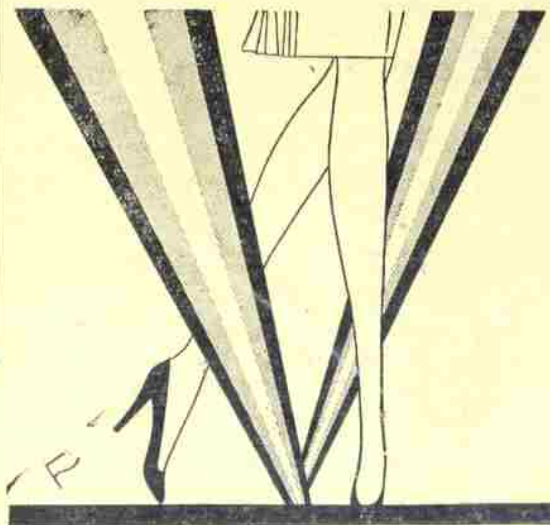
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INDEPENDENTS TO REMAIN FOR GAME

Inasmuch as the girls living in organized houses are required to abide by the same laws as those of Lausanne, a study of Lausanne Hall government will reveal the essential features.

The governing body of the Hall consists of a house council presided over by the president, attended by the Dean of Women, the vice-president, and composed of two representatives from each class. The meetings are held every Monday night. Its duties are to secure the co-operation of the girls, and enforce fines and penalties for infringement of rules. Rooms are inspected by the

In order that the girls may have time to get their lessons, study hours have been arranged. On school days the hours are 7:45 to 1:30 a. m., 1:15 to 4:00 p. m., and 7:30 to 12:00 p. m. On Sunday there is no disturbance between the hours of 3:00 to 5:00 p. m.

The underclass girls may sign out for the library during study nights; upper class girls have one night out during study nights. During school nights and Sunday the doors close at 10:00 p. m. and 11:10 p. m., on Friday and Saturday nights.

They were possessed with the belief that Willamette spirit would carry the team through even if everything else failed; they believed that the team would fight.

But all of the efforts were futile. It was the Coyote-Bearcat game being played before our eyes except that in this instance Willamette had the stronger team. The men showed no spirit, and they refused to fight. No, we will modify this statement, the efforts of the student body were not entirely wasted, one man of the Bearcat eleven fought.

It is not the loss of the game, bad enough as it is, that hurts so much as it is the fact the men on the team did not merit the confidence placed in them by the students.

The student body has been thrown down, and furthermore, every member realizes the fact.

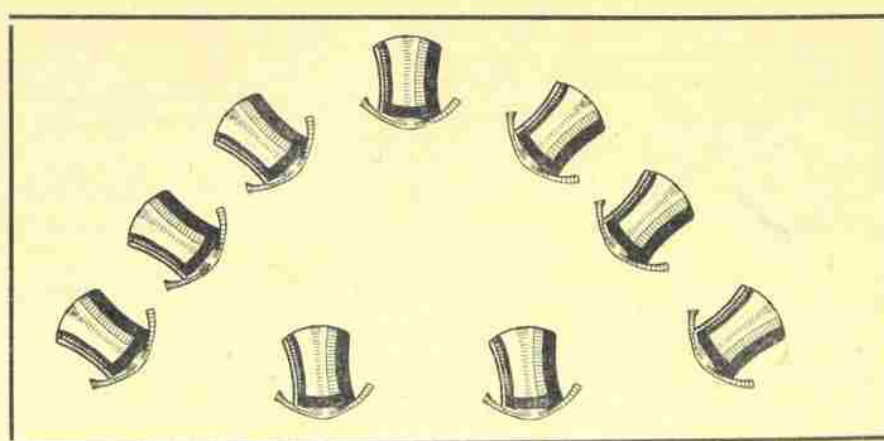
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STUDENT SPECIAL IS WELL ATTENDED

SPEAKER DESCRIBES PRESIDENT'S WORK

"The position of the president of the United States is one of the hardest positions in the world to fill," said Congressman Willis C. Hawley in his address in chapel Thursday.

According to Mr. Hawley, the work of the president "never ceases; questions of national importance are constantly with him and even his social life is a duty. Breakfasting with the president is not an informal opportunity to make friends or to chat lightly of unimportant matters.

Breakfast at the White House is a time for business when numerous policies of state are formed. If the president has an important question upon which to make a decision and is unable to secure all of the information necessary for wise judgment, he invites eleven of the best-informed men he can find to breakfast. At the end of the hour, through a very formal method of questioning the president has the desired information.

When an appointment is made with the president it does not entitle one to spend more than a few minutes with the executive or even (if one is a man) to be seated. "It seems," said Mr. Hawley, "that the president has discovered that a man talks less standing than sitting. However, a lady is

always asked to be seated." The president's valuable time is never taken up with explanations or descriptions, for previous to the interview he studies the question to be discussed and is able to make the conferences very brief.

The president is the only man who speaks with authority concerning what the United States will or will not do, thus with him rests the international policy of the nation.

Mr. Hawley speaks from personal knowledge for in his 22 years in congress he has known five presidents. Congressman Hawley, who is now chairman of the Ways and Means committee of the House, was once president of Willamette University.
