A CLOSER BOND OF FRIENDSHIP

One of the greatest needs of Willamette University is a closer bond of friendship between the students. After arriving on the campus one of the first things anyone hears is about certain fraternities and sororities.

Friendships are formed at the first of the term and after rushing season is over many are broken because of differences in pledging. The non-sorority or fraternity students are in many instances dropped. This is a great mistake.

The fraternity or sorority is, in reality, a grouping together of men or women of similar tastes and ideas united by the common ideal to know and understand each other better. This association should increase the adaptability of the student but in many cases seem to tend for narrow mindedness.

We are all here for the same purpose. We all want Willamette to be a unified school—"The Best in the West." And only through a closer bond of friendship can our common ideal be realized.

CUB ENFORCEMENT

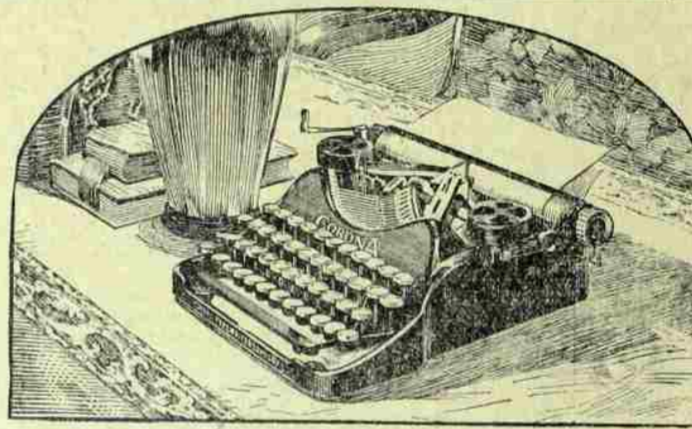

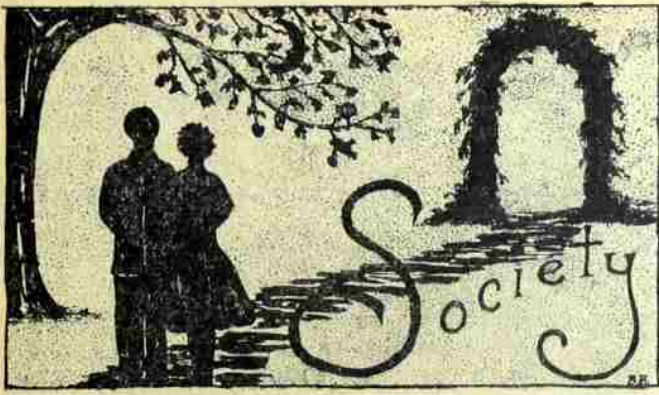
