### Shaw Reports Ticket Sale Gain For Second Concert in 'Series'

With ticket sales "brisker" than expected, Stu Shaw, Distinguished Artist Series manager, expressed optimistic concern today for the Isaac Stern concert which will be presented in the Salem high auditorium Thursday night at 8.

Shaw again warned students that only 100 student tickets have been made available. These tickets, priced at \$1.80, are on sale in the student body office, or can be purchased from the various living organization salesmen. Season tickets for the remaining three concerts—Isaac Stern, the Vienna String Symphony, and the First Piano Quartet—have been marked down to \$3.50.

A more-extensive newspaper coverage of the Salem area and the fact that the concert will serve as a "relaxer" after final week to Willamette students might indicate the reason for the "slightly higher" than expected sales returns.

#### Back From Europe

Stern, the second artist in the 1953-54 Distinguished Artist Series, just completed his eleventh consecutive U.S.-Canadian tour last week after playing more than 40 concerts

in a three-month tour of England, France, Italy, the Netherlands and Scandinavia. In November, after Stern's performance with the Royal Philharmonic orchestra conducted by Sir Thomas Beecham, the London Times reported: "A player in the front rank of violinists has dawned on our horizon."

Last spring, at the conclusion of his 55-concert North American tour, Stern went before the Hollywood cameras to play the role of the violinist, Eugene Ysaye, in the 20th Century-Fox movie, "Tonight We Sing," which played in Salem during the Christmas holidays.

Stern, who will perform here on his priceless 250-year-old Guarnerius, began his globe-circling tours in the summer of 1947, when he visited Australia and New Zealand. The following year he made his European debut and in 1949 bowed in South America and Israel.

Student Challenge Fund donations shot over the \$2500 mark this week and a renewed effort got underway to reach \$5,000 by Feb. 10, reported Kent Holmes, manager. The over-all student goal is \$10,000 by May.

The present donations will be added to the \$250 which was collected by the Challenge night activity program to make a grand total of \$2,750 collected to date.

The concerted effort to reach \$5,000 by mid-February is being made, said Holmes, because at that time the board of trustees is to meet and decide whether or not bids will be called to begin construction on the first stages of the building program this spring. Student support of the program may go a long way toward influencing the decision of the trustees to give the go-ahead on construction, said Holmes.

### AF Honor Awarded To Maj. Thompson

Maj. John W. Thompson, assistant professor of air science, has been awarded the commendation ribbon for service in the south Pacific during World War II, according to a Department of the Air Force announcement last week.

The award came as the result of a special flying mission in May, 1945. Thompson was a first lieutenant at the time. The award may be recommended only by an officer of general's rank.

Previously, the AFOTC instructor had received the campaign and service for humane action medal, a special citation for participation in the Berlin Airlift. Maj. Thompson piloted a transport carrying supplies from Germany to Berlin during the Russian blockade of the western zone. Thompson also had a part in "Operation Crossroads" at the atomic test grounds on Kwajalein island just after the last war.

A veteran of eleven years service in the air force, Maj. Thompson holds the Bronze Star and the Air medal with oak leaf cluster.

He attended Colorado State, Central Washington and San Jose State colleges. His air force training has been at USAF Academic Instructor School, Alabama; USAF Instrument School, Missouri; and USAF Airline Transport School, Florida.

Deadline for Glee words and music was set for Wednesday, March 3, and the point system was revised to give half as many points to words and music as presentation at Glee executive meeting Tuesday.

Wheat announced last week that Glee night parodies would be cut to two per class and that entertainment would be limited to 20 minutes.

Other offices to be filled include first and second vice presidents, secretary, treasurer, and junior, sophomore and freshman representatives. Members interested in one of the posts should contact present cabinet members, Miss Campbell said.

Nominations may be made from the floor during a general meeting scheduled Feb. 3 at 12:30 in the Lausanne lounge.

The new president and either three or four elected delegates will attend the AWS regional convention at the University of Arizona during spring vacation.

### By-Laws to Include Orientation Manager

The following revision to ASWU by-laws designates the term and duties of the orientation manager appointed by student council.

#### Art XII. Orientation Manager

Sec. 1. The Freshman Orientation Manager shall be appointed by the student body council in the spring semester to serve for the ensuing school year.

Sec. 2. His duties shall be:  
1. To conduct an orientation program at the beginning of each semester for entering freshmen and transfer students.

2. He shall advise the freshman class of Freshman Glee traditions and rules.

3. He shall serve as a general student advisor to the freshman class and shall coordinate relations between the freshman, other classes, and the faculty.

From there they swung some old Dixie favorites including "Maryland, My Maryland," "Yellow Dog Rag," "Snag It," and the old "Jelly Roll" Morton tune, "Wolverine Blues." The closing number was

the swingiest thing, as the whole ensemble kicked "Muskrat Ramble" around. It was by far the best solo for the clarinetist, who up to that point had been having a little trouble expressing himself. The trumpeter, also had some really brilliant moments.

About half way through the concert, Monte let the students pick a couple of requests. "Green River" and "Sister Kate" were called for. Following these the group played a number, in order to show off the drummer, entitled "Hindustan by Chinastan." Using the old jazz trick, the entire group left the set, with only the drummer remaining to beat out his solo.



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## Student Hurt in Saturday Crash; Similar Collision Involves Dean

Neal Wineman, University senior from San Mateo, Calif., who was injured in a head-on automobile collision early Saturday morning, will probably be back on campus from his home at the start of the new semester. This was the report received by Mrs. Madeline Dyer, Phi Delta Theta house-mother, from Wineman's mother on Sunday.

The accident, in which Wineman was "badly hurt," occurred north of Salem about the same time that Willamette's dean of students, Mark Hatfield, was involved in a similar head-on smash-up. Dean Hatfield received a small cut on the head.

The accident in which Wineman was involved took place shortly after midnight Friday night between Chemawa and

Brooks in the midst of a swirling snowstorm. He was driving a three-weeks old Ford which was a total loss. The car was completely covered by insurance.

Wineman was headed south about 25 miles per hour, returning from Portland, when a car approached from the opposite direction and in the same traffic lane. He feared to turn into the oncoming lane because of traffic, and the two cars collided.

He was thrown against the steering wheel and received a cut on his chin which required eight stitches, had three teeth knocked out, was injured in his chest by the impact of the wheel and received a bad cut on the knee.

He left for home the next day by train for a convalescent period. The family doctor reported that he "would be all right." His mother reported that he was very stiff and nervous and had difficulty in getting around.

The accident in which Dean Hatfield was involved occurred closer to Salem, near Hayesville. He was returning from Portland with Travis Cross, Willamette's former director of information, now connected with the State Board of Education, when their car was hit head-on by an automobile approaching in the same lane. Hatfield's car was the only injury. He was treated at Salem Memorial hospital.

President Eisenhower's speech for pooling of atomic materials was cited as the highlight of the session by Mrs. Lord. She also had praise for US delegates James Byrnes and Charles Mayo.

## Pyramid Fad Violates Oregon Lottery Statute, Reports Dean

Students were warned against participation in the pyramid letter-type sales as violations of the Oregon lottery statute by Dean of Students Mark Hatfield at Convocation Tuesday.

After hearing that University students were allegedly taking part in an innovation of the once wide-spread pyramid letter fad, Dean Hatfield consulted state Attorney General Robert Thorton and was informed that all elements in the letter-exchange were in contradiction to the law and those participating would be liable for prosecution.

Word of the letter promotion first became known early in the week when it was reported that several students were receiving money in three

dollar amounts through taking part. According to information, the letters work on the proposition that each participant passes on three letters, containing a list of six names, his on the bottom. Each recipient of a letter, crosses the top name on the list and sends three dollars to that person, placing his own name on the bottom. He then makes three copies and the cycle is completed. According to a reliable campus math major, the larger the pyramid spreads, the less chance there becomes to "cash in" on the game.

Against common opponents Pacific lost to College of Idaho twice to the tune of 66-57 and 56-39 and lost to Whitman once 66-53. Willamette defeated Whitman twice 65-62 and 80-75 and whipped College of Idaho 100-79.

Norm "The Hawk" Hubert is the Badger to watch, along with 6 foot 6 inch center Clint Agee and driving guard Danny French. These three have done almost all the Badger scoring, with the flashy forward, Hubert, getting 31 in the second Lewis and Clark game and 26 against C. of I. in the first contest.

The Bearcats are still showing improvement, and the fast break coaching of John Lewis is showing strongly on points. Lefty Shield, who started out the season in slow form, is beginning to show the kind of ball playing which gave him a second all-star rating in conference play last year. The other four starters for Willamette are still pouring in the points which give them a sizeable lead over the rest of the team. Pete Reed leads the entire team with 186 points.

Next home action for the Bearcats comes Friday, February 5, when they open a home-and-home series with Lewis and Clark.

The Willamette Bearkittens defeated the Woodburn All-Stars 74-55 last Tuesday at Woodburn for their sixth win of the season.

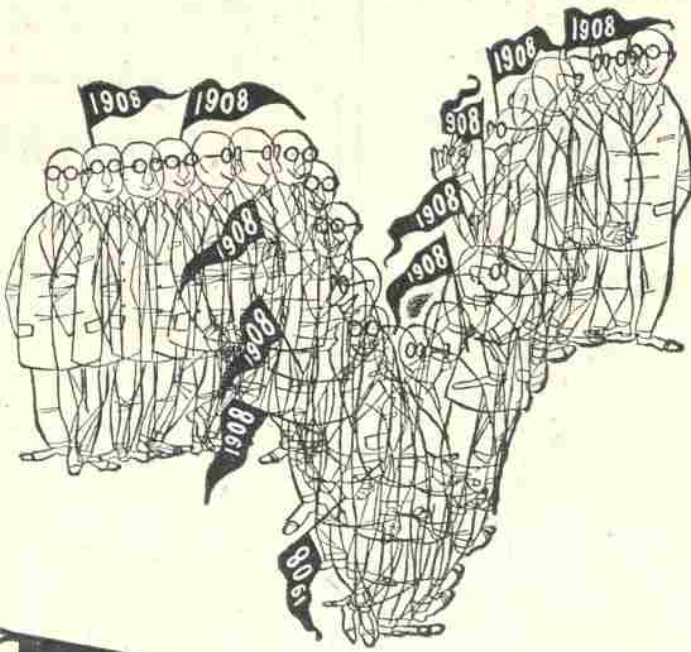
Last Saturday night, the Linfield freshman gave the Bearkittens their first loss of the year by a 67-64 count.

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
