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GRAVES TELLS
OF FRISCO TRIP

"The library should be a dynamic part of the community", might be said to be the theme of the sixty-sixth annual conference of the American Library Ass'n which met last week in San Francisco. This was stated by Dan Graves, librarian for Willamette U. yesterday, after returning from the annual conference.

Mr. Graves reports the discussions were interesting with numerous speakers heard during the convention. However, some felt that many speakers were taking a negative approach toward library service in that the work to be done was emphasized rather than what had been done.

Mr. Graves further reports that the control of atomic energy came into discussion and the consensus was that it could not be kept a secret since the atom is nature's secret rather than man's.

Among the many interesting subjects brought forward at the convention was audio-visual education and books projection for veterans' hospital beds.

The convention held most of its meetings in the city auditorium, and numerous tours were conducted for the benefit of those attending, Graves said.
