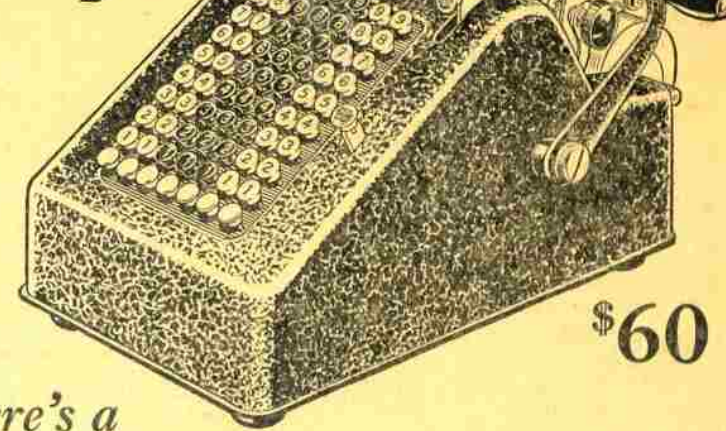
BUILDINGS in Which You Take Pride
