[Extract from the Constitution.] Article II—Object.

The object of this Association shall be to promote growth in grace and Christian fellowship among its members, and aggressive Christian work, especially by and for students, to train them to devote their lives to Jesus Christ, not only in distinctively religious callings, but also in secular pursuits.

Article III-Membership.

Sec. 1. The active membership of the Association shall consist of men, either students or members of the faculty, of this institution, who are members in good standing of some evangelical church, and have been elected by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any meeting. Only active members

shall vote and hold office.

Sec. 2. Any man of good moral character, either student or member of the faculty of this institution, may become an associate member by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any meeting.

The membership fee shall be \$1 per year, payable at the opening of the col-

lege vear.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of each member to co-operate heartily in carrying out the objects of the Association in Article II, according to the policy determined by the Association or Executive Committee.

Statement.

The Young Men's Christian Association of Willamette University stands for the best there is in college life. It is the strongest organization in college, including among its members the strongest men, both in athletics and scholarship. A cordial invitation is extended to every man in the University to ally himself with the Association, either as an active or associate member.

DEVOTIONAL.

BIBLE STUDY COMMITTEE.

MARIE SCHMIDT '11, CHAIRMAN.

In fact, it is considered an essential part of a student's education. The Christian Associations premote Bible study by offering courses, and securing leaders and enrollment for the classes. The Y. W. C. A. hopes to enroll every young woman student in this institution into one or the other of the three courses chosen for the ensuing year: "The Life of Christ," "Teachings of

Jesus and His Apostles," by E. T. Bucworth; and "Leaders of Israel," by Robinson. Come girls, put Bible study at the head of your course of study. The pleasure and profit will be all yours.

DEVOTIONAL COMMITTEE. CLARA A. DIMOND '13, CHAIRMAN.

Our aim is to strengthen the spiritual life of the members of the Association through the religious meetings, to lead non-Christian girls to Christ, and to develop Christian workers in the Association. We hope to make the meetings simple, but helpful to the girls. Our rule is to have student leaders, but occasionally to have outside speakers to lead the meetings. Besides the weekly devotional meetings we will provide for all the special meetings that are under the auspices of the Y. W. C. A.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE.

All young women of Willamette University are eligible to membership; those who are members of evangelical churches become active members, others are sssociate. Our aim is to help new students in every way, so don't be afraid to ask questions, for every Y. W. C. A. girl is your friend.

MISSIONARY COMMITTEE.

The aim of the Missionary Committee is to create and strengthen among the students of Willamette University an intelligent and sympathetic interest in the less favored classes and nations of the world. To this end monthly missionary meetings will be held in the Association, efforts made to acquire a library of information along the line of missionary activities and mission study classes organized. The latter ought to prove of great value, especially if the students give their hearty cooperation.

COLLEGE ORGANIZATIONS.

THE STUDENT BODY

Is the organization of all the students of the University. This organization, under the supervision of the President and Faculty, has control of general student affairs, such as athletics, the business management of the Collegian, inter-collegiate debates, and oratorical contests.

The Girls' Student Association is composed of members of the Colleges and Academy. Its purpose is to foster social life.

The Young Men's and Young Womens' Christian Associations are organizations for promoting the religious welfare of the students and aiming at the development of noble Christian character.

ORATORICAL ASSOCIATION

Is an organization of all college students aiming at the development of oratory in the University. The local association sends a representative, chosen in a local contest, to the Annual State Contest, which is held the second Friday of March of each year, the place alternating among the different colleges represented. The successful contestant receives a beautiful gold medal for the material reward of his labors. A year

ago last Spring Clark Russel Belknap won the honors for old Willamette.

DEBATES.

Debating at Willamette is under the supervision of a Debate Council, which arranges for the intercollegiate debates. Last year Willamette University Law School debated with, and won the debate from University of Oregon Law School.

THE ANNUAL INTER-LITERARY SOCIETY CONTEST

Is held at the end of each college year, at which time representatives from each society compete for the silver cup.

THE STUDENT VOLUNTEER BAND.

This is an organization of such students who have declared their purpose to become foreign missionaries. The first Annual State Convention of student volunteers, which was held here last Spring, was a source of great inspiration to the Band. Five new members have been enrolled since that time, making a total of twelve members. During the past year the Band held reviews in the local churches and at Chemawa. The policy for this year is to concentrate efforts on Bible study at the Chemawa Indian School.

ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION.

At the beginning of last year athletic prospects were very low, but with the coming of the new coach, Dr. J. G.

Sweetland, the old order of things was overturned and things have been on the up-grade ever since. Out of a green squad, largely Freshmen, Dr. Sweetland formed a football team which was doubtless the best non-conference team in the Northwest. The basket ball was second only to O. A. C., and as every man will be back in school, we should have the fastest team in Oregon this year. In base ball a good foundation was laid for a winning team in 1911.

If athletics at Willamette are given the hearty support which they deserve from the whole student body, with the aid of an experienced and hard working coach, her teams are going to be able to rank well up among the colleges of

the Northwest.

TENNIS ASSOCIATION.

Willamette has a beautiful tennis court in a very attractive spot of the campus. We also have some good players, and expect to have inter-collegiate meets this year.

The Prohibition Association

is an active body of students who meet twice each month, for the study of various phases of the liquor problem. The annual inter-collegiate contest gives an ideal opportunity for any one interested in oratorical work to obtain the best training, as well as a twenty or forty dollar cash prize.

Choral Society.

One of the most important organizations in the University is the Choral Society. Its object is to form an acquaintance with the best choral numbers, to develop the æsthetic nature and a love for good music, as well as the valuable training which is to be gained. No student who has any musical talent can afford to miss this rare opportunity of development. The Society is under the able and efficient direction of Dean Mendenhall, of the College of Music. During the May Festival of 1910 the Society, composed of 100 voices, rendered a most successful program at the Grand Opera House.

The University Glee Club.

This organization, under the direction of Dean F. S. Mendenhall, of the C. M. is doing a very high grade of work. Last year the Club made a tour through Eastern Washington and Idaho, and was reported everywhere to have made a hit with the people. This report was confirmed when they appeared in the May Festival in connection with the Ladies' Glee and the Choral Society at the home opera.

The Ladies' Glee Club.

This organization too, is but in its infancy, and under the direction of Dean Mendenhall has made remarkable pro-

gress. Last year it appeared before the public several times with marked success, also playing an important part in the May Festival, as mentioned above. It is composed of young ladies from all departments of the University, so let every girl who sings try out for membership in this organization.

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


