

"Ricky" Yocom to resign post

In an unattended press conference last Tuesday, Richard A. "Buzz" Yocom announced that he would be resigning his post as Assistant to the President and Registrar. Citing his "desire to move on to something new" as the primary reason behind his resignation, Dean Yocom said he plans to work throughout this academic year, and for as long as is needed until a replacement can be found. Dr. Yocom also claimed that his "oppressively burgeoning income" was push-

ing him into an "unreasonably high tax bracket."

According to university President Jerry Hudson, "there was no pressure on him (Mr. Yocom) to resign, as far as the record is concerned." President Hudson said that he and Mister Yocom had come to a "mutual agreement" after a discussion over the future of the university. Hudson said that Professor Yocom's record at the university, "although sloppy and shameful," had nothing whatsoever to do with his decision to let

Sensei Yocom resign.

President Hudson claimed that Registrar Yocom had had a "distinguished albeit tattered" performance record since he began here sometime this century. Since R.A. "Buzz" Yocom first came to Willamette, he has served as Campus Dog Commissioner (13 years), Dean of Vegetables (9 years), bedcheck Officer (6 months, interim period), Guy Who Buys Retirement Presents (18 years), Assistant Dean of Men (never), Assistant to the

President (23 minutes), Assistant to the Vice-President (2 years), and Registrar (3 years). Hudson pointed out that, since Yocom had been Registrar, the student attrition rate had reached a nationwide high. Hudson also eagerly pointed out that, since "Buzzaround" Yocom had been Assistant to the President, 50% of the university presidents had resigned.

Still, Hudson was quick to point out that Capt. Yocom's record had no bearing on his (Lt. Yocom's) decision to

resign. "Nope. It was clearly Ms. Yocom's decision entirely. He felt ashamed at what he has done to this institution. As I understand it, Sgt. Yocom has already lined up plans with Tommy Lee to open up a surf shop in West Salem."

Alma Harrison, secretary to the President and secret power behind the throne, said she would miss Lt. Col. Yocom, but not "his funny white shoes."

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Collins Center still standing

Despite the big storm last month, the newly renovated E.S. Collins Science Center is still standing. "Not only that," said Plant Supervisor "Sugar Ray" Rabold, "but the damn thing still smells new!"

The new science center, which set the university back over \$4 million, was completed just last August. The building underwent a complete overhaul in the past year, and now houses some of the newest and safest laboratory equipment in all the land. "And you know what?" quizzed a resigning R.A. "Buzz" Yocom, "It's still standing there, big as life."

When asked for a comment, University President Jerry Hudson replied, "Look, we spent a ranchful of C-notes, and all I can say is that it had **better** still be standing."

Senate boos PATHOS

"I'm sick to death of all this whining!" said an exasperated ASWU President Rob McClellan at Wednesday night's Senate meeting. "It's about time we got down to brass tacks on this issue!"

The issue in question was the proposed purchase of new stationery for the ASWU offices. While McClellan supports the proposal, several Senators have opposed the purchase as wasteful and unnecessary.

Financial aid changed

Student tuition rates will be changed for the 1982-83 school year, as has been the case in recent years. However, unlike past cost revisions, the new plan will not be bad news for everybody, according to Financial Aid officer James "Jim" Woodland.

"We'll be changing the financial aid structure at Willamette next year," explained Woodland in an interview with the Collegian. "We'd like to fit in as closely as possible with the Reagan administration's current economic attitudes. In order to accomplish this, we plan to begin giving tuition breaks to those with plenty of money, rather than the traditional method of giving aid to the poorer students. The more money a student's family has, the greater the aid he'll receive."

Asked for examples, Woodland elaborated. "We'll

be cutting back on aid to students whose parents are in the lower income brackets," he said. "Those who earn less than, say, 25 thousand dollars will probably receive no aid. Students with families in the 30 to 50 thousand dollar range will get some aid, and those from 50 to 100 thousand will probably get quite a bit of help, plus the majority of the work-study jobs. And anybody whose parents earn over 150

thousand dollars annually will be allowed to attend free of charge."

"This change will help everyone in the Willamette community," stated Woodland. "We figure that this way, those who have a lot of money will be able to be generous and help out the poorer students. They'll even be able to pick up the tab when the gang sends out for pizza."

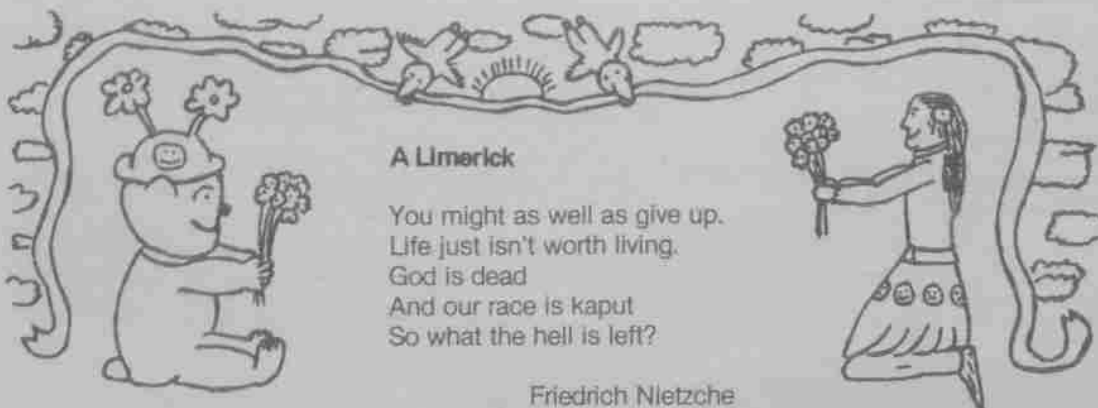

Double feature featured locally

The latest double feature to open at Lancaster Mall is a "must" for all the discriminating movie goers in Salem. It is a fun-filled evening of entertainment that features a new horror classic, **Restroom, Deathroom**, and a comic masterpiece, **Cuter Than Hell**, plus twelve different Three Stooges shorts. There is no way that a line-up like that could ever go wrong, but this reviewer was pleasantly surprised to discover that it was even better than expected.

The show opens at precisely seven o'clock (the management will allow no late-comers to this special event) with four of the three Stooges shorts. These include the unforgettable pair **The Three Stooges Go Shopping** and **The Three Stooges make Dinner**. No old time fan of this trio of zanies will be able to resist their madcap adventures in these two. After the four shorts (plus of course the previews, the ads, and that cute thing they do with a pair of Bic Lighters) the first feature starts, and what a show it is!

The show is the highly acclaimed one-woman film, **Restroom, Deathroom**, starring the darling of the horror circuit, Jamie Lee Curtis. In this new thriller Jamie plays all of the characters, including the

young heroine, the crusty but benign old washwoman, and the psychotic killer. The story concerns a young girl named Penny (Jamie Lee Curtis) who is the new counselor at an all-girls summer camp. There she befriends an old, fat, black washlady who has worked as the janitor at the camp for the last twenty-five years. The washlady, called Mama (Jamie Lee Curtis), tells Penny about the bizarre murders that had taken place there when Mama first arrived. True to form, the murders start recurring. Before the end of the film, every one of the girls at the camp is murdered in very odd ways in the bathroom. The killings are very gruesome and probably are too much for the squeamish. One of the most horrible murders involves a young girl (Jamie Lee Curtis) whose head is flushed until she drowns. Finally, the only ones left are Penny, Mama, and the mysterious camp director, Mrs. Psycho (Jamie Lee Curtis). Penny and Mama are able to kill Mrs. Psycho in an action-packed final confrontation scene involving about 32 gallons of blood. Then, just when you think everything will be alright, Mama is revealed as the real killer. Boy Howdy! Will you ever be shocked by that. Jamie is, as always, absolutely

brilliant in all of the roles.

This is quickly followed by four more Three Stooges shorts that absolutely cannot be missed. This group includes probably the best single short they ever did, **The Three Stooges Bite the Big One**. This is true comedy at its best.

Finally, the second feature rolls around and it will leave you rolling in the aisles! It's a great comedy movie starring Brooke Shields, Gary Coleman, Tatum O'Neal, and in his return screen performance, Mason Reese. Of course, it has to be called **Cuter than Hell**. It's a light-hearted story about four teenagers on a double date (Shields, Coleman, O'Neal, Reese) who get drunk, have a terrible car crash, and go to hell. There they run into Satan (Art Carney) and his henchmen (portrayed brilliantly by that great comedy team, Don Knotts and Tim Conway) and soon the sparks are flying! Those denizens of Hades try to put the foursome through eternal torment, but the kids refuse to lose their fun-loving spirit. Before long, the kids have set the whole place to Roller-boogie-ing. Of course, Satan turns out to have a heart of gold and everything ends on a happy note. Of special interest is a short scene involving a confrontation between Good and

Evil. God (Miles O'Keefe) with the help of his angels (Shields and Yarnell) take on Satan and his crew on their own turf. The teens, however, break it up and talk both sides into giving up the eternal battle in order to open up a Roller-disco. Excellent performances are given by everyone involved, but of course Brooke Shields dominates the screen with her wit, talent and Mother. This comedy is sure to outshine the Marx Brothers at their very best madcap style.

Finally, just when you think you've laughed yourself to vomiting, four more Three Stooges shorts are shot at you. And they've saved the best for last. These are the famous war shorts made towards the end of World War II. They are (in order): **The Three Stooges Get Their Physical**, **The Three Stooges Kiss MacArthur's Butt**, **The Three Stooges Kill Gooks**, and **The Three Stooges Die in Buchenwald**. 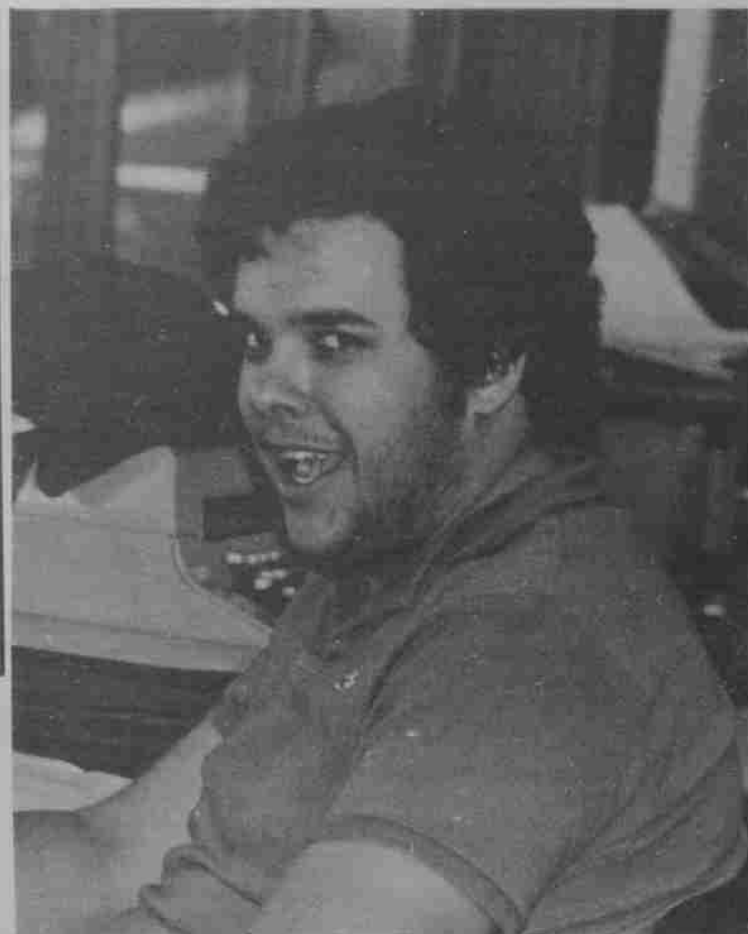

Revisions proposed

In accordance with the ASWU constitution, the following by-law revision proposals are submitted for examination by the students. The new by-laws shall read as follows:

ARTICLE II PUBLICATIONS

SEC. 1. Voting members of the Publications Board shall consist only of white, anglo-saxon protestant males between the ages of 19 and 22 years.

SEC. 3. Duties.

- a. The Publications Board shall have no control whatsoever over the contents or policies of the *Collegian*, the *Jason*, or the other thing.
- b. Appeals from the decisions of the board shall be referred to a perpetual line of dead-ends. Those appealing the decisions of the board will be told to "go to Hell."
- c. The Publications Board will nominate friends and/or relatives of the Board for the various positions under its authority, and those people will be promptly placed in those positions.
- d. The Publications shall receive a carte-blanche budget, with the understanding that they will not exceed the total ASWU budget.

f. Salaries for the editors of the student publications will comprise a minimum of 58% of the entire budget to insure comfortable living conditions.

m. The *Collegian* staff members may use any name in the world for whatever purposes necessary. The university shall be responsible for any libel suits brought against the student newspaper.

SEC. 4. Editorial Code of Ethics and Statement of Editorial policy.

- a. Student publications are a valuable aid in establishing an atmosphere of free and so-called responsible discussion and of intellectual exploration on campus, and a necessary vehicle for the staff members to get revenge on people they don't like. They are a means of bringing student concerns to the attention of the faculty and the institutional authorities, and of swaying public opinion.
- b. Freedom of the press is not only necessary for the life of the democratic society, it is fun.
- c. It is the role of the student press to drink heavily in times of inordinate stress, and to see to it that at least somebody (preferably Scott Greenwood) is offended by every publication.
