WILLAMETTE'S HONOR CODE**Article X**

Section 1. For the purpose of perpetuating the spirit and practice of honor which Willamette University has always cherished as her ideal, the Associated Student Body hereby adopts the following standard of action to be considered as its tradition of honor: Dishonesty in examination, unfair work on notebooks and essays, improper use of library books and materials as well as property of other persons, and the employment of all illegitimate methods not herein specified, shall be deemed opposed to Willamette's standards, and students guilty of such action shall be guilty of flagrant violation of the sacred traditions of the University.

Section 2. To stress the importance of the honor code, a committee of five, composed of two seniors, one to act as a chairman, and a member from each of the other three classes, shall be appointed yearly by the president of the Student Body at the last annual meeting; the same committee to have as its duties the carrying out of one public honor code rally within three weeks after the opening of each semester; the publication of the honor code in the first and last issues of The Collegian each semester; and in any other manner deemed advisable to give widespread publicity to this code.

THE ASSOCIATED STUDENT BODY

The members of the Associated Student Body are the students of the University. The payment of the Student Body fee entitles each member to a copy of The Willamette Collegian, admission to athletic games, and to a ballot in the annual and special elections.

Meetings, regularly, are bi-monthly. To attend is important, is expected. The students, so organized, control directly all collegiate and intercollegiate activities, such as athletics, forensics, general social events, and the business management of the Collegian.

The Executive Committee, which functions regularly to the interests of all students, is composed of the officers of the Student Body, the editor of the Collegian, a member of the faculty, and four members elected at large from the student body. These four members are elected at the beginning of each school year, and together with the other members of the committee, function throughout the same.

Certain standing committees, appointed by the Student Body president, facilitate the efficient management of Student Body affairs.

Forming an executive council that faithfully functions throughout the University year, the cabinets of the two organizations look unceasingly to the development of the whole man and the whole woman. The student literary societies, which are nine in number—five for women and four for men—promote the cultural interests of the members. The meetings are weekly, and programs relative to art, music, history, travels, drama, current events, literature, and parliamentary practise are informingly presented.

Women's Inter-Society Rules

The five young women's societies have adopted the following rules:

Rule I.—That each society shall hold its reception and each new woman shall have an opportunity to attend each society at least once, and not more than twice, before the second Saturday before Thanksgiving.

Rule II.—That no woman shall be invited to join a society, either by verbal or written invitation, before the second Saturday before Thanksgiving.

Rule III.—That each woman answer in writing.

Rule IV.—That an inter-society council be established to consist of two members from each society to be appointed by the presidents of the respective societies at the last business meeting of the school year.

Rule V.—That there shall be an additional member of the council, a faculty lady, elected by the council.

Rule VI.—That the duty of the council shall be to decide all inter-society matters. Its decision shall be final.

Rule VII.—That these rules shall be published in the Handbook and in the first issue of the Collegian.

CLUBS

Women's Willamette Club

All the young women of Willamette University make up the membership of this club, whose three-fold purpose is: to promote the growth of future Willamette; to uphold the ideals of present Willamette; and to reverence past Willamette.

"W" CLUB

The "W" Club membership is made up of those who have won the official University athletic award. The Award Day ceremonies are equivalent to formal initiation into the most honored organization on the campus.

Bar "W"

The Bar "W", a pin, is a coveted forensic award. This award indicates those individuals who have represented the University in either intercollegiate debate or oratory. It is customary for the wearers of the Bar "W", as well as for the members of the "W" Club, to hold a banquet date.

Washingtonian Club

All "some-time" residents of the state of Washington are entitled to membership in this club. Their aim is to boost Willamette in Washington. On the 22d of February, the student body is annually the banquet-guest of this organization.

Lausanne Hall Club

"Lausanne is more than a building; it is an ideal." Those girls who meet under this spacious roof-tree, in an atmosphere of culture and refinement, unite to form a significant campus club with Willamette traditions as its ideal.

Discussion Club

The liveliest men on the campus organized this club; and the liveliest college men will always be its members. Consistency demands it. The members meet each Thursday noon in Science Hall for a session of discussion relative to some topic of current interest. Lunch is customarily served by the members, in alphabetical turn, at a nominal price.

The Student Volunteer Band

The Student Volunteer Band is a consecrated organization. Its members are those who, "God willing," propose to devote their lives to Christian work in a foreign field. The meetings are weekly, and give occasion for stimulative study and devotion.

The Missionary Committee

The Missionary Committee includes the members of the Student Volunteer Band, three students from the Y. W. C. A. and three students from the Y. M. C. A. Its purpose is to rouse students to take an interest in and to support missionary activities. The most vital medium of influence is the large bulletin board in Eaton Hall.

The dean of music is the club's competent director. Besides numerous short trips, the club annually makes a successful tour through Washington.

The Varsity Band has been organized but three years. It includes the best instrumental talent on the campus, and becomes a regular "pep"-box at rallies and athletic contests.

FORENSICS

Debate

Debate in any university signifies fearless intellectual prowess. At Willamette, debate—men's debate, at least—means intercollegiate triumph. During the past season the Willamette men won four contests and lost none. The most significant decisions were those won over the University of Redlands and the University of Denver. The question for both debates was: "Resolved: that the union shop should prevail in American industry." Willamette both times creditably upheld the affirmative side of the question. For these contests, debate squads of three were substituted for the usual two-team.

Women's debate as well as men's incites a decided rise in school spirit with the opening of the forensic season.

Inter-class debates offer stimulative practise for aspiring Varsity debaters. No one who has already received the Bar-W, however, may participate in these local contests.

Oratory

Besides the inter-class oratorical contest held each spring, there is the state contest in which Willamette customarily takes part. A representative is chosen by the popular try-out method. The contest is held at one of the institutions participating. The 1922 session of the Association was held at Newberg.

ATHLETICS

Men's

At Willamette, as elsewhere, the major sports of football, basketball, baseball, track, and tennis claim the active interest of the majority of the University men. Willamette's admission to the Northwest Conference has been a matter of no little import. With such a tirelessly working coach as Coach Bohler, and with plans for a well-equipped new gymnasium under way, the athletic outlook is outstandingly heartening.

Athletic participants who have fully adhered to the required conditions for the obtainance of such an honor, receive from the Student Body at the award day following the term of athletic participation, an official Varsity sweater and "W". For the second and third years of athletic participation, certificates are awarded. Service for four years in any one branch of the major sports entitles the athlete to the "W" blanket, the University's most highly coveted athletic prize.

Local athletic contests are spirited inter-class rivalry determiners, and bring forth considerable school support.

CONSTITUTION

Preamble

We, the women students of Willamette University, who are interested in women's athletics, do hereby organize under the following Constitution and By-laws:

Article I. Name.

The name of the organization shall be Women's Athletic Association of Willamette University.

Article II. Purpose.

The purpose of this Association shall be cooperation with the department of Physical Education for Women in promoting interest in gymnastics and athletic activities.

Article III. Colors.

The colors of the organization shall be Cardinal and Gold.

Article IV.

Membership in this organization shall be open to all undergraduate women interested in athletics.

Article V.

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Collegian Reporter.

Sec. 2. The Executive Board shall consist of President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and the Director of Physical Education.

Sec. 3. Duties of Officers.

(a) It shall be the duty of the President to appoint the time and place of meetings, to preside at the same, to appoint a temporary substitute for any

vacancy in office, to appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered, to enforce all regulations and by-laws, to act as chairman of the Executive Board, and perform other duties usually incident to this office.

(b) It shall be the duty of the Vice President to perform the duties of the President in case of the inability of the latter to perform such duties.

(c) It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct all correspondence of the Association and to record all proceedings of the Association.

(d) It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to collect and care for the dues of the Association.

(e) It shall be the duty of the Collegian Reporter to post notices of meetings and to reprot all inter-class activities.

Article V. Elections.

Section 1. The election and the installation of officers of this Association shall take place the last meeting of the school year.

Sec. 2. The President shall be elected from the incoming Senior class, the Vice President and the Secretary, the Treasurer and the Collegian Reporter shall be elected at large.

Sec. 3. Nominations for these officers shall be made by a nomination committee of five, appointed by the President, and by additional nominations from the floor.

Sec. 4. Nominations shall be posted at least one week before election.

Sec. 5. Election shall be by ballot, a plurality of votes being necessary to elect. In case of a tie, decision shall be made by lot.

Article VI. Quorum.

Sec. 1. One-fourth of total membership constitute a quorum for constitutional amendment.

Women's (Continued)

Sec. 2. For ordinary business a one-fourth vote of those present at any meeting, notice of which shall be posted beforehand, shall constitute a quorum.

Article VII. Dues.

All active members of the Association shall be required to pay fifty cents per semester.

Article VIII.

Sec. 1. A notice of any proposed amendment to the constitution shall be given in writing to the Secretary, who shall present it at a meeting two weeks prior to the time at which it is to be voted upon.

By-Laws of the Association

Sec. 1. Rules of Order. All questions shall be decided by Roberts' Rules of Order.

Sec. 2. Meetings.

(a) Notices of meetings shall be posted.

(b) Meetings shall be held once a month.

Sec. 3. Point System. Points shall be awarded to women of the college according to the following:

(a) Varsity teams, 100 points each. (Subs., 80.)

(1) Field and track

(2) Hockey

(3) Basketball

(5) Tennis

(6) Baseball

(b) Archery—Hiking, 50.

(c) Interclass—number of points each designated:

(1) Major Sports, first team, 60; sub, 35; second team, 35; sub, 20—

Basketball

Baseball

Swimming

Tennis.

Winning first team, 35 points additional.

Winning second team, 20 points additional.

Sub., winning first team, 20 points additional.

Sub., winning second team, 10 points additional.

To obtain the numeral, 650 points total.

Suggested Amendments:

(a) To obtain numeral for class of 1923 (tentatively), 350 points.

(b) For other classes, a reduction from 650 to 550 points.

FRESHMAN GLEE RULES**Section I.**

Article I. The time for the Freshman Glee shall be on the second Friday in March.

Article II. The freshman class shall issue the challenge to the other classes at least six weeks before the time of the Glee.

Article III. The management shall be in the hands of the freshman class and under the supervision of an upperclass committee of three. The manager shall be elected by the freshman class, and the committee appointed at least one week before the challenge is issued.

Article IV. The freshman class shall award a pennant to the winning class.

Section II.

Article I. Words and music shall be original within the class and shall be submitted at least two weeks before the date of the Glee.

Article II. Every member of the class shall take part in rendition. Affiliated members are eligible to participate.

Article III. There shall be three judges on each of the following: words, music, rendition, adaptation.

Article IV. The judges shall be selected from a list previously submitted by each class by a committee consisting of the manager of the Glee and a member from each of the other classes.

Article V. Judges shall judge according to the following: 25 per cent on words, 25 per cent on adaptability, 25 per cent on music, and 25 per cent on rendition. No judge shall give any class a score of less than 15 per cent except as provided in Section III, Article I.

At the discretion of the management, a form of ballot shall be included in the printed program whereby the public may express its choice of winners.

The Association conducts a training class for Willamette students in gym practice, boys' work, and boy leadership.

Section III.

Article I. The student body shall decide upon the type of song to be submitted at the beginning of the school year. Types other than the one selected shall receive a score of zero on adaptability.

Section IV.

Article I. It shall be the duty of the president of the student body to see that these rules be carried out.

GREEN CAP REGULATIONS

Section 1. All freshmen boys shall don green caps not later than the third Monday after the opening of the school year.

Section 2. Green caps shall be worn exclusively by all freshmen boys while in the city of Salem.

Section 3. The freshman class shall discard their green caps publicly at the May Day festival, making the discarding of the caps the subject of an original stunt.

Section 4. It is further recommended that the two upper classes be made the final court of appeals for any difficulties arising over the carrying out of the rules laid down.

INTERCLASS RIVALRY RULES**Article I.**

Section 1. There shall be an interclass rivalry committee elected each year, consisting of the following members: one member elected by each of the classes and chairman elected by the Student Body.

Section 2. The class elections shall take place within the first two weeks of school; the chairman of the committee shall be elected at the first regular Student Body meeting.

Section 3. The chairman shall be chosen from the two upper classes.

Section 4. There shall be an advisory committee consisting of the athletic coach and the professor of public speaking.

Article II.

Section 1. The duties of this interclass rivalry committee shall be to regulate and control all forms of interclass rivalry and activities. These duties shall include the regulating of numeral painting and settling of interclass disputes.

Section 2. Each class represented is entitled to a vote on the committee and the chairman in the case of a tie.

Section 3. The following interclass activities shall be held each year: basketball, tennis, baseball, track, forensics, and any other activities that the committee shall decide upon.

Section 4. The following shall be the system of awarding points: first place in any activity, five points; second place, three points, and third place, one point. Also the class contributing the largest percentage of its members to the varsity teams shall receive five points; second, three, and third, one.

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Article III.

Section 1. The class having the largest number of points at the close of the year shall be declared interclass rivalry champion, and shall receive a suitable reward.

Section 2. The following number of credits shall be required for eligibility to represent each class: seniors, at least 88; juniors, at least 56; sophomores, at least 24.

Section 3. Men who have been in the service and desire to affiliate with their old class shall be considered an exception to the above rule.

Section 4. Students registered for less than twelve hours shall not be eligible to represent a class in a contest.

Article IV.

Section 1. The committee shall have power to formulate any new rules not herein stated and regulations as to the conduct of the various contests.

SCHOLARSHIP DISTINCTIONS

At the end of each year, following the graduation exercises, prizes are awarded to those students in the University who have shown distinction in some line of study or branch of activity.

Oratory—Prizes of \$15 and \$10 for first and second honors in oratory.

Latin—For the best work in Latin \$10 is offered.

Debate—For first and second honors in debate, \$10 and \$5 is given.

University Prizes—The University offers the following prizes to winners in any University contest in public speaking, to be applied, except when won by seniors in their last semester, on any semester following the one in which the contest takes place:

1. Five dollars to the winner in a local contest.

2. Ten dollars to the winner in an intercollegiate contest.

3. Fifteen dollars to the winner in an interstate contest.

No person may receive more than one prize in any college year. (A winning team in debate will divide the University prize.)

Albert Prize—Based on the record of faithful study and scholarship, an award of \$25 to the student making, during the year, the greatest progress toward the ideal in character, service and wholesome influence. Three students are nominated by the faculty and voted upon by the student body two weeks before commencement.

Senior Scholar—On the basis of scholastic standing and fitness to profit by the appointment, a limited number of departments may appoint certain juniors, majoring in their department, as student assistants for the next college year.

Domestic Art Prizes—Mrs. B. L. Steeves offers prizes of \$10 each to the two students who, through the year, show the greatest progress and the greatest interest in sewing and in cookery, respectively.

Honorary Senior Fraternity, Alpha Kappa Nu—Election to membership is based on scholarship and character and not more than 20% of any graduating class can be elected.

The Colonel Willis Prize—Col. Percy Willis, '85, offers a prize of \$25 "to the student who throughout the school year has done the most real good to fellow students and the University by deeds of kindness and genuine helpfulness, coupled with steadfast devotion to high ideals and upright character."

English Prize—Representing the Oregon Authors' League, Mrs. Frank Franklin announces a prize of \$25 to be awarded to the English student who submits the most outstanding work in the department.
