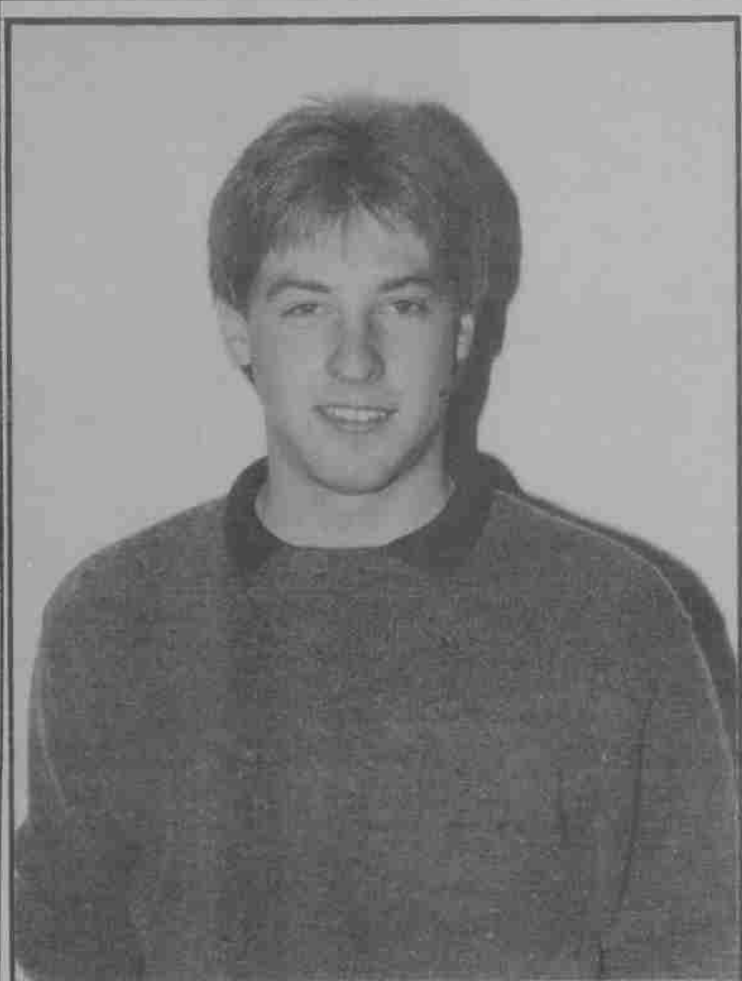

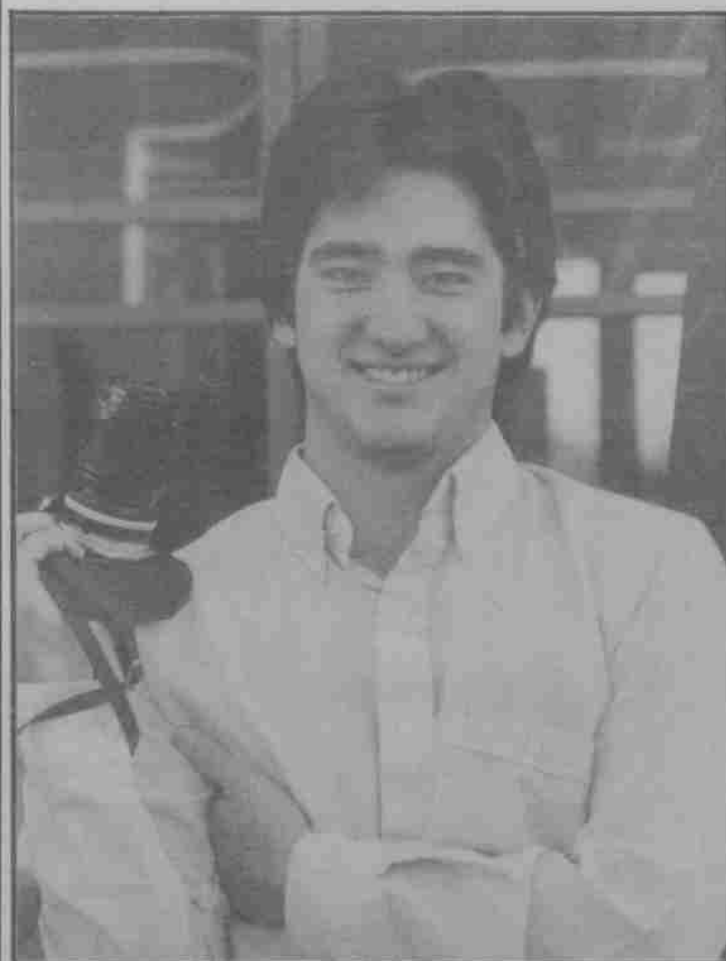

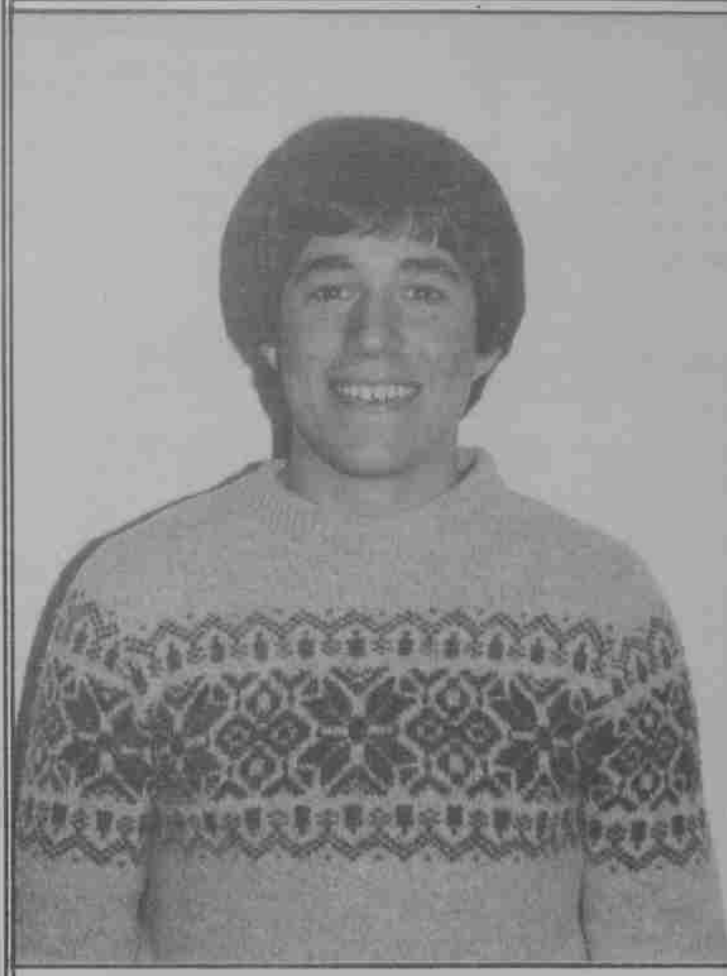


#### Who is Ed Spicknall?
