It is a record of achievement in the face of great difficulties, of the building up of a team steadily growing stronger from game to game, losing, but never giving up, of the rebuilding of school morale, the utter routing of the brooding jinx, and the firm rooting of a triumphant, fighting spirit.

Patton and Logan have played their brilliant last, but Fasnacht, Robertson, Erickson, Hartley, and Steincipher, who was injured early in the season, are just hitting their stride. Guiding these and others, overcoming countless difficulties and enshrining himself more and more in the hearts of the Fighting Bearcats is Rathbun, beloved as coach and man.

While baskets and fixtures lingered on the road, the Bearcats struggled to prepare for their first games. Out of a gratifyingly enthusiastic but unfinished squad emerged the team which, although it failed to stop Oregon's march toward the championship, snowed Pacific under: Willamette's offense a proven reality. Whitman was too much for our inexperienced team. An alumni team took the dedicatory game in the new gym. Linfield was defeated. U. of W. proved her championship caliber conclusively, though she had to fight for her victory. Cheney Normal-an unknown quantity-administered another defeat, but the Bearcats came right back, crushing C. P. S. in two contests. Gonzaga outweighed and outplayed Willamette in the next contest, but Whitman won only by shooting a foul in the last fifteen seconds of play. A foul cost the Idaho game too, but Pacific was crushed again. Washington State's famous five man defense barely outbalanced the Bearcat's offense. Oregon broke away from a tie, at half time, to a final victory.

The new day demands not only more preachers, but better prepared preachers. A study of 14,000 Methodist preachers by our Life Service Commission reveals this startling situation. Only forty-five per cent of our preachers have completed a college course, and only twenty per cent have completed both seminary and college. Eighteen per cent have not completed high school, while seven per cent have eighth grade only or less.

In the face of this need there is only one thing for Kimball to do: move forward eagerly, courageously, and as rapidly as possible to a new and enlarging program. We can and we will.

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# Willamette University College of Law 


#### Abstract

The College of Law was established, as a department of the University, in 1883. Its purpose is to provide a thorough legal education for students who are fitted by their maturity and previous academic training to pursue professional study under university methods of instruction. The curriculum covers three academic years and is calculated to afford an adequate preparation for the practice of law in any jurisdiction of the United States. Special attention is paid to problems of local law in the State of Oregon.


This school is fully accredited by the State and Federal authorities for the payment of benefits to those entitled to them under the returned soldiers, sailors and marines educational aid and vocational training acts.

The College of Law of Willamette University stands high in the estimation of the Supreme Court of Oregon as evidenced by the following extract from a letter written by the Supreme Court to the President of the University:
"In our examination of applicants to practice law in Oregon, we have always found the graduates of the Willamette Law School as fully and well prepared as the graduates from any of the law schools, including the leading colleges of the United States, and graduates of the Willamette Law School have repeatedly taken first honors in such examinations. We have also observed that many of the alumni of the Willamette Law School have taken high rank in the practice of their profession, and are among the prominent and useful citizens of the Pacific Northwest, thus reflecting credit not only on the law school, but on the Willamette University, which they regard as their alma mater."

The College of Law has several special advantages. It is located in the capital city where the Supreme Court is almost constantly in session. The Law Department has exceptional facilities in its nearness to the State Library which contains more than 40,000 volumes, to which the law students have free access.

The law classes are held in Eaton Hall which is centrally located upon the college campus, directly across from the State Capitol. Law students are members of the Student Body of the University and have the opportunity of engaging in the various student enterprises and activities.

## Requirements for Admission

Applicants for admission to the Freshman year must be at least 18 years of age and of good moral character. Each applicant must have satisfactorily completed a four years' high school course or its equivalent and one year's work amounting to 30 hours credit in the College of Arts and Science of Willamette University or its equivalent.

Tuition is $\$ 90.00$ per year. Student Body fee $\$ 10.00$ per year.
