
PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE





The first Badger drew away, but Hayes cut down the lead on the second man, and Bonney pulled away from the third. Jock Wright was last. As Bonney staggered across the line, a boy jumped out to catch him, and stood in front of Wright just long enough to make his sprint in vain, and Pacific took the relay as well as the meet.

The Bearcats evened the count on May 30, when, in the Independent Colleges' meet, they won over Pacific by almost the same margin.

Fighting Bill Vinson, Long-legged Logan, and Solid-old Stolzheise were the outstanding stars—Stolz winning his third letter for the year. Vinson vaulted, jumped, and hurdled; Logan ran the distances, and high jumped; Stolzheise heaved weights and javelin, and broad jumped for variety.



TENNIS

There is one sport in which Willamette has long ranked consistently high. Football and basketball have their ups and downs. Baseball and track usually find funds low and small time schedules in order. But in tennis Willamette takes off her hat to no one.

Last year was about the nearest to an off year, for Willamette was defeated once and won nothing except from Oregon and Pacific, and the Independent Colleges' title.

Huston, Emmel and Mickey proved themselves worthy successors of the mighty Nibs Moodhe and Doney.

Emmel did not lose a singles match all season.

Women's tennis came back for the first time since the days of Mary Findley. Elva Burris won from Miss Smith of Pacific. Burris and Rostein won the women's doubles and Emmel and Burris won the mixed doubles in the Independent meet.



The next game was in Washington again, against College of Puget Sound. A few panic-stricken moments cost two touchdowns—then the Bearcats rallied and raged all over, around, and through the Loggers. It was too late to win, however, and only six points came before darkness ended the game.

Another panic-stricken moment allowed Linfield to score, in the next game, but here W. U. was not to be denied and she rolled up 35 points, using her whole second team at the last. Next week Chemawa was taken down the line 36 to 0, and Albany failed to show up for her drubbing.




WILLAMETTE VERSUS WHITMAN

The Student Body voted, in spite of the action taken by the team at the time of the Whitman game, to give letters to all men regularly qualified to receive them.







It is a record of achievement in the face of great difficulties, of the building up of a team steadily growing stronger from game to game, losing, but never giving up, of the rebuilding of school morale, the utter routing of the brooding jinx, and the firm rooting of a triumphant, fighting spirit.


Patton and Logan have played their brilliant last, but Fasnacht, Robertson, Erickson, Hartley, and Steincipher, who was injured early in the season, are just hitting their stride. Guiding these and others, overcoming countless difficulties and enshrining himself more and more in the hearts of the Fighting Bearcats is Rathbun, beloved as coach and man.

While baskets and fixtures lingered on the road, the Bearcats struggled to prepare for their first games. Out of a gratifyingly enthusiastic but unfinished squad emerged the team which, although it failed to stop Oregon's march toward the championship, snowed Pacific under: Willamette's offense a proven reality. Whitman was too much for our inexperienced team. An alumni team took the dedicatory game in the new gym. Linfield was defeated. U. of W. proved her championship caliber conclusively, though she had to fight for her victory. Cheney Normal—an unknown quantity—administered another defeat, but the Bearcats came right back, crushing C. P. S. in two contests. Gonzaga outweighed and outplayed Willamette in the next contest, but Whitman won only by shooting a foul in the last fifteen seconds of play. A foul cost the Idaho game too, but Pacific was crushed again. Washington State's famous five man defense barely outbalanced the Bearcat's offense. Oregon broke away from a tie, at half time, to a final victory.





The rest of the sports have not been scheduled at the time of writing, but everyone is keen to see the outcome of the rivalry this year.



"The Ghost Story."


"The Dust of the Road."


"Enter, the Hero."

Eighteen per cent have not completed high school, while seven per cent have eighth grade only or less.


In the face of this need there is only one thing for Kimball to do: move forward eagerly, courageously, and as rapidly as possible to a new and enlarging program. We can and we will.



- 10. And finally, to remember every day the great debt we owe to the public and discharge that debt honorably and to the best of our abilities.

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Prospective students preparing to enter North Pacific College should include in their studies physics, chemistry and biology. The pre-medical course given by many of the colleges and universities is also recommended.

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
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
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
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
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
