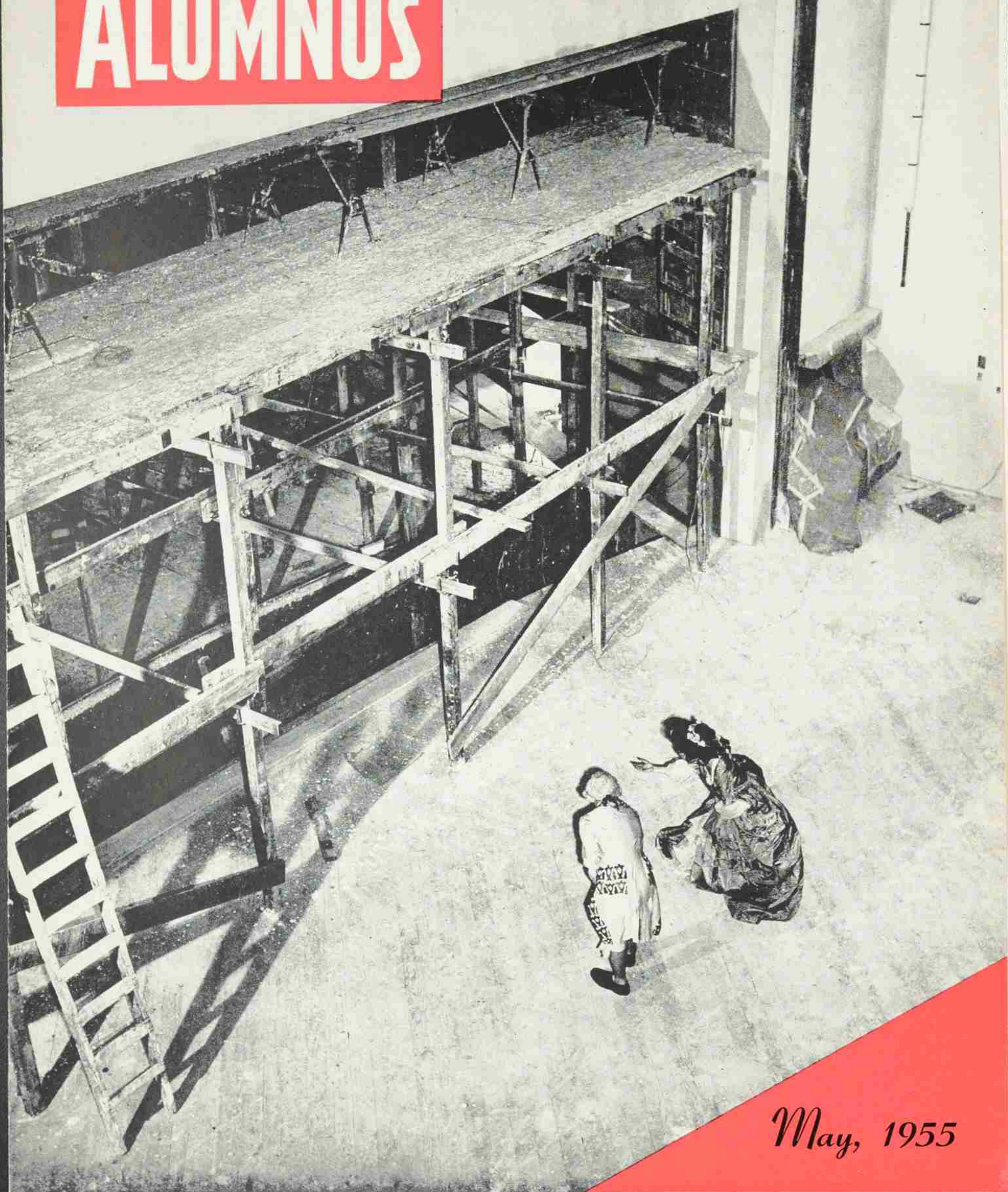

## Summer Session Registration Set For June 20

Registration for Summer Session will be held Monday, June 20, in the University library from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. Students may register for a total of eight semester hours of work during the session which runs until August 12.

Study in excess of the eight hours is possible through permission of the scholarship and petitions committee granted before registration.

Courses at the summer session will be offered in the fields of Biology, Chemistry, Economics, Education, English, History, Physical Education, Political Science, Speech and Drama, Music and Applied Music. A summer workshop in voice, sponsored by the National Association of Teachers of Singing, will be held on campus August 1 to 5.

## Dr. Pearce, Prof. Brown Retire After Combined Total of 69 Years Service

Next month, two professors who have been on the Willamette scene for the past three and a half decades will leave Eaton and Collins Hall, taking with them a wealth of memories covering the University's greatest period of growth and development. They will leave behind them a singleness of purpose which has been dedicated to the instruction and enlightenment of the hundreds of men and women who have been members of their classes and seminars — the hundredfold men and women who have benefited immeasurably through the close professor-student relationship and friendly atmosphere which pervades Willamette's teaching.

Dr. Helen Pearce, who has been head of the English department since 1939, is a product of the University Academy and a 1915 graduate of the Liberal Arts College. Appointed to the faculty in 1920, Dr. Pearce rose from the rank of instructor to full professorship in 1942.

She earned her MA degree at Radcliffe College and was granted a Ph.D. from the University of California. She bears the distinction of being the first Willamette woman graduate to earn the PhD degree. Only five other Willamette women have been conferred the doctorate degree.

The educator is responsible for the complete editing, from beginning to printed form, of two published works by Dr. Carl G. Doney and Prof. James T. Matthews. After three years of detailed work, wedged between teaching duties, Dr. Pearce saw publication of Dr. Doney's "Cheerful Yesterdays and Confident Tomorrows" and Prof. Matthews' "Turn Right to Paradise", both printed in 1942.

Dr. Pearce served as president of Zonta International in 1938-40. She has been international chairman of the resolutions committee of that organization since 1948. She was recently appointed to the board of trustees, for the third time, of the First Presbyterian Church.

Serving as a member of the fellowship awards committee of AAUW since 1929, Dr. Pearce is past president of the Salem branch of the national group. She is a member of the Modern Language association, College English association and National Council of Teachers of English.

Dr. Pearce, who has been a student and teacher under six administrators at Willamette, has a major assignment following her retirement. She and her sister, Dorothy, must move from their lifetime home on N. Winter Street to make way for the Presbyterian Church's catty-cornered move to the Pearce residence site. The church's change of location is prompted by the state's expansion of the capital mall. Dr. Pearce and her sister tentatively plan a trip to the East in early winter.

Prof. Earl T. Brown has been professor of physics at Willamette University for the past 34 years. Prof. Brown has maintained a full professorship in the physics department since 1921, the date of his appointment here.

A graduate of the University of Washington in 1918 with a B.S. degree, he continued his studies there to receive a M.S. degree in 1924. He has taken graduate study at both Stanford University and the University of California at Berkeley.

Prof. Brown's wife, the former Lida Fake, shares teaching honors at Willamette with her husband, having been on the staff as professor of home economics from 1919 to 1922.

Since coming to Willamette Prof. Brown has witnessed several advancements in the physics department — the greatest one probably being the move into Collins hall, its present location on campus.

The Browns have two children, a daughter Nancy and a son John T. who is a 1950 graduate of Willamette.

"The services of Dr. Pearce and Prof. Brown, together," said Pres. Smith, "total the biblical three score and ten — a normal lifetime. Willamette has profited richly through their contributions to the lives of succeeding generations of students.

"Dr. Pearce has served over and above her teaching duties," he pointed out, "by giving direction to the University through her long service to the policy committee and chairmanship of that committee.

"Prof. Brown has seen Willamette expand its influence through the development of the 3-2 year program of engineering," Dr. Smith said, "in which the physics department has played an important role."

## Olds and Hatfield to Address Commencement, Baccalaureate Services

Two Willamette University graduates, Dr. Glenn Olds and Dean Mark Hatfield have been selected as speakers for the 113th annual commencement and baccalaureate ceremonies.

Dr. Olds, director of United Religious work at Cornell University, will address the 1955 graduating class June 5 at McCulloch Stadium. Graduated magna cum laude from Willamette in 1942, Dr. Olds held fellowships at Garrett Theological Seminary where he earned a BD; Northwestern University, an MA in philosophy; and Yale University, a PhD in philosophy. He did a year's research in psychology at the Oregon State Mental Hospital on religion and health.

The educator was a member of the American Seminar to Europe under Sherwood Eddy in 1950. He also spent two summers' study in the International Iota Sigma Seminar in Ontario, Canada.

Dr. Olds is former chaplain and associate professor of religion at the University of Denver.

Hatfield, associate professor of political science at Willamette and state senator (R) from Marion County, will speak at baccalaureate services May 29 at Salem's First Methodist Church.

Dean of students at Willamette since 1953, Hatfield received his BA degree from Willamette in 1943. He was conferred an MA from Stanford University where he also completed his residence for a doctorate.

The young educator was named Salem's Junior First Citizen for 1954. He is a former member of the Oregon House of Representatives and was a delegate to the National Republican Convention in 1952.

He is a member of the state advisory board of Crusade for Freedom and an advisor to the Order of DeMolay for Boys.

Hatfield was speaker at the seventh annual Easter Sunrise Service April 10 in the Pasadena Rose Bowl. He spoke before 8000 Easter worshippers and a nationwide radio audience.

## NY Giants to Hold Coaches Clinic Here

A football coaches clinic open to all mentors of the state will be held here this summer in conjunction with the training program of the New York pro Giants, it was announced this week by Coach Ted Ogdahl.

The Giants will hold their training camp at McCulloch Stadium for the second straight year.

The clinic will be held the week of August 1 to 6. Morning sessions will be conducted by the university staff and afternoon activities will be correlated with the drills of the Giants. The coaching staff of the Giants will handle the

entire clinic program on Friday, Aug. 5.

Ogdahl announces that coaches wishing to enroll in the clinic for credit can earn one semester hour by paying the regular tuition fee of \$17. Those not attending for credit will be assessed \$5.

Coaches, both high school and college, planning to attend the clinic should notify Ogdahl at the earliest possible date.

Giants president John B. (Tim) Mara has notified President Smith that rookies will report on the Willamette campus July 21 and veteran players are slated to appear July 24.

The entire Giants training camp party is expected to number not far from 100 persons. As was the case last year, the squad will be quartered in Baxter Hall.

While on the west coast, the Giants will play several exhibition games. They will be in Spokane August 10-14 and in Seattle August 19-21. The club will conclude its training stay here Sept. 4, Mara told Dr. Smith.

## World Famous Sculptor Gives Demonstration

Avard T. Fairbanks, consultant in fine arts at the University of Utah and world renowned sculptor, gave a demonstration lecture at Willamette May 16.

Dr. Fairbanks designed Oregon's territorial centennial seal in 1948 which was used on the commemorative stamp issued by the U. S. Post Office Department. The stamp was distributed to all states and many countries of the world.

Commissioned by the Greek City of Sparta, the artist most recently completed a heroic study of Lycurgus, ancient Greek lawgiver and founder of constitutional government. Dr. Fairbanks' work will be dedicated this summer during a celebration by the Hellenic people, commemorating events in 480 B.C. The early date marks Greek and western world assurance of the democratic form of government and culture advanced by the Greek people.

## Collegian Rates "All-American"

The Collegian has been awarded an "All-American" rating for the fall semester of publication, it was revealed this week. Notification of the high award came from the Associated Collegiate Press, an agency which rates college papers throughout the country.

Under the editorship of Charles Ruud, senior from Mollala, The Collegian was one of 15 papers selected for top award from 52 entered in the competition of 751-1250 circulation.

The Collegian polled a total of 1685 points, 35 above the minimum required to be in the top category.

Only one other honor, the "Pace-maker" is more highly regarded in college newspaper circles. This award is presented only after several consecutive semesters of All-American publication.

The paper scored superior in two categories, editorial page features and sports coverage. A number of departments were rated "excellent."

## Baseball Nine Wins Crown, NCAA Bid

A sizzling nine-game winning string carried Coach John Lewis' Willamette baseballers to the 1955 Northwest Conference crown and also earned them a coveted spot in the regional NCAA play-offs.

The Bearcats were picked to engage in a sub-regional playoff with Fresno State, Pepperdine and San Jose State at Fresno, Calif. Winner of the double elimination tourney was slated to face the Pacific Coast Conference champion for the regional title and a berth in the national finals.

Willamette wrapped up the Northwest Conference crown at Portland's Vaughn Street Park on Monday, May 16, by twice defeating Lewis and Clark 2-0 and 7-4.

The Willamettes actually needed to win only one of the pair with L-C to clinch the pennant. The Bearcats' final record for the loop campaign included 12 wins and but three setbacks.

Dave Gray, the veteran righthander from West Linn, pitched the 2-0 victory which nailed down the flag for WU. It was Gray's fourth win of the season against one loss—the setback, to Linfield, being the only one of Gray's entire WU career.

Fred Butler was credited with the second game win after relieving Brad Lucas in the sixth inning. Feature was a two-run homer over the right field wall by Pete Reed in the eighth and extra inning. It was one of the few times a collegian has poked a ball over a fence at Vaughn Street.

The torrid Willamette string which carried Willamette to the flag saw them whip Pacific in three games, take one each from College of Idaho, Whitman and Lewis and Clark before winding up with the final double victory over the Pioneers.

In addition to Gray, the WU pitching burden was carried by such men as Lucas, Butler, Dan Feller and Gino Pieretti. Lewis said the ability of the second-line hurlers to come through was a major factor. Willamette fortunes looked dark at the outset of the season when they lost No. 1 pitching ace Andy George through injury.

## AFROTC Merits "Excellent" Rating

Willamette University's AFROTC detachment was appraised as "an excellent unit" at the completion of the department's fourth annual federal inspection in April.

Col. Lewis H. Kensinger, AFROTC liaison officer and chief of the three-man inspection team, was particularly "impressed with the esprit of the cadet corps and keen interest of the cadet staff." He emphasized the outstanding quality of cadet initiative and responsibility for the leadership laboratory program.

Colonel Kensinger further cited University administrators and staff for their support and interest in the AFROTC program. He said that the cadets' public re-

lations efforts were very commendable.

The three-man inspection team, comprised of Lt. Col. Leo G. Fradenburg, University of Purdue; Lt. Col. Ross E. Bodenhamer, University of Missouri; and Colonel Kensinger, inspected the various aspects of University AFROTC operation.

Lt. Col. Norman W. Todd, commander of the Willamette AFROTC unit, was on a similar five-week inspection tour of detachments in the Southeast and Puerto Rico during WU's inspection.

## Two Law Grads Named Clerks

Two law students who will graduate June 5, Eldon F. Caley and Arthur A. Franzke, have been appointed clerks to judges in state and federal courts.

Caley, Salem resident, has been named clerk to Judge James Alger Fee, U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the Ninth Judicial District in San Francisco. The district includes seven western states. Caley left Salem May 19 to assume his new duties.

Franzke, of Portland, has been assigned clerk to Justice Walter L. Tooze, Oregon State Supreme Court. He will begin his assignment July 1.

Top man in his graduating class, Caley has been named to the Dean's List five consecutive semesters. The honor is reserved for scholars in the upper ten per cent of their class.

Caley is on the editorial staff of the Willamette Legal Handbook Series and is a member of Phi Delta Phi, honorary legal fraternity. He received his BA degree from Willamette in 1952 and was selected for membership in Alpha Kappa Nu. He is a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, social fraternity.

Franzke, who is third man in the 1955 graduating class, has achieved placement on the Dean's List three semesters. He is a member of the Legal Handbook Series and Delta Theta Phi. Franzke was granted his BA degree from Willamette in 1952. He is a member of Sigma Chi, social fraternity.

## WU-SITA Sponsor European Tours

The University has an agreement with the Students' International Travel Association, providing for Willamette's sponsorship of three student groups for study in Europe during the summer months. The school will sponsor French, Spanish and political science tours.

The political science study group, headed by Dr. Chester C. Kaiser, associate professor of political science, will feature a study of contrasting forms of European government with emphasis upon the various contrasting forms found abroad. Governments will include constitutional monarchies (England, Holland, Greece), parliamentary republican (France, Italy, Germany), leftist (Yugoslavia), rightist (Spain), as well as socialism, occupation government (Vienna), and the Swiss form of canonical government. The group will leave June 24 from New York, returning Sept. 13 to Quebec.

The Spanish study, under the direction of Dr. Clarence Kraft, associate professor of Spanish, will attend the summer session at the University of Santander in Spain. The session will be held in August, and students may combine this group with the French or Italian study programs. The University of Santander is located on the Atlantic coast. The tour will depart from Montreal July 16 and return Sept. 16 to New York.

This summer marks the sixth in Willamette's French study tours which feature study at the University of Grenoble. Dr. Paul Beal, associate professor of Romance languages, will be in charge of the group. All courses are given in French and students live with French families during the stay in Grenoble. The group will sail from Quebec June 18 and return to the Canadian port Aug. 8.

More than 12,000 students and teachers have participated in SITA trips from all 48 states and 39 foreign lands.

Sixteen schools are participating in the 1955 international program. They include University of Copenhagen, University of Florence, University of Hawaii, University of Mexico, Miami U, Columbia, Brigham Young, University of Munich, Ohio Wesleyan, University of Santander, University of Washington, Fordham, Occidental, Lafayette, University of Grenoble and Willamette.

## Holmer Elected Poly Science Vice President

A. Freeman Holmer, associate professor of political science, was named vice president of the Pacific Northwest Political Science association in May.

The educator will serve with newly elected president, Linden Mander, University of Washington.

## Bearcats Nab Golf, Net Titles; Benson Tops Mark

Willamette University's cinder men failed to do any better than a tie for third place in the annual Northwest Conference meet at Walla Walla on May 21—but the squad was cheered by two record-breaking hurdle performances by Dean Benson.

Two other WU spring sports editions did get in on the title-grabbing, however. Coach Jerry Frei's golfers romped to No. 1 honors in the tourney held at Walla Walla on May 20 and in tennis action held the same day Bud Mull of Willamette earned the singles crown for Coach Les Sparks' forces. The WU doubles entry of Chuck Carter and Ron Butler failed in its bid to retain the tandem title for their school. Mull won the singles by topping College of Idaho ace Dick Hahn, 6-2, 8-6 in the finals.

Bearcat golfers had an aggregate score of 645 for 36 holes in capturing honors. Second was Pacific with 667. Medalist

was Willamette's Bill Sundstrom with 157 and teammate Ward Sligh was a close second with 158.

In the track tourney, Coach Ted Ogdahl's cinder men tied with Linfield for third place, each having 51 3/5 points. Winner was host Whitman, which piled up 76 1/5 points with the help of sterling work by distance stars Harold and Edgar Parrott. Lewis and Clark was second with 67 1/10.

Benson, rapidly getting a name as one of the land's best hurdlers, smashed conference marks in both the high and low hurdles. The junior from Bend ran the highs in 14.4 to tie his own personal best mark and snapped the low stick record with a 24.2 time. Benson was far under the 15.0 flat mark he made last year in establishing a loop high hurdle record. The previous low hurdle mark was 24.3, made by Caley Cook of Lewis and Clark last year.

A reception for faculty, seniors, parents and alumni will be held in Lausanne hall immediately following graduation. The Faculty Women's Club will be hostesses of the affair.

## Polya Delivers Math Lectures

## Dr. Oliver to Lecture in India During Summer

**Dr. Egbert S. Oliver**, former professor of English at Willamette and now associate professor of English at Portland State, has been named a guest lecturer at Ahmednager College, India, for the summer. The city of Ahmednager is approximately 100 miles east of Bombay.

Dr. Oliver will be the first occidental teacher to lecture at the college which maintains an enrollment of 750 students. The college has an all-Indian faculty, headed by Bhaskar Hivale who received his Ph.D from Harvard University. It was Dr. Hivale who invited Dr. Oliver to be a guest lecturer.

Dr. and Mrs. Oliver will be in India during July and August. The educator will lecture on American culture, literature and other facets of American life.

The couple will leave Portland the first of June, arriving by plane in London June 11. From there they will emplane to India via Vienna, Jerusalem and Bagdad. Their return journey will include Thailand, Java and Australia, with a side trip to several South Seas islands.

They will return to the United States late in September.

## Gregg Appointed To National Chamber

**Robert D. Gregg**, dean of liberal arts at Willamette, has been appointed to a second term with the foreign policy commission of the National Chamber of Commerce.

**Erwin D. Canhan**, editor of the Christian Science Monitor, is chairman of the committee which studies international problems and helps develop Chamber policies and programs to meet these problems.

**Dr. Gregg** is one of three academic men on the committee, composed largely of business executives. He will attend a meeting of the group in Washington, D.C. in September.

**Dr. Gregg**, former chairman of the history department at Carnegie Institute of Technology, was director of the Foreign Policy Association of Pittsburgh during 1944-48.

## Parker Writes For Swiss Journal

**Dr. Reginald Parker**, professor of law at Willamette, is author of an article to appear in the summer edition of Schweizerische Juristen-Zeitung, largest law review in Switzerland.

Requested by the Swiss publication, **Dr. Parker** has written a 3800-word treatise on American Labor Law. The article compares American labor law with European social legislation. The educator, who is probably the only native American to practice law in Austria, has written the text in German.

**Dr. Parker** has published works in both Austria and Germany. He received his JD degree from the University of Vienna School of Law and Political Science.
