Fort Held By Lone Spaniard Against Majors

A survey of the graduating class at Willamette University for 1933 shows that approximately 82 students have chosen majors in the field of social science. There are 20 majors in Letters and 15 in Natural Science. In the Social Science department there are 12 majors in Home Economics, six in Political Science, Physical Education, History and Sociology, and three each in Economics and Psychology, and one in Religion.

The department of Letters has 10 English majors. Latin leads in the foreign languages with three majors, while French and German have two and Spanish one.

In the department of Natural Science, two students are majoring in biology, three in chemistry, one in physics, three in mathematics and four in music.

UNIVERSITY DAY BEGUN BY SOPHS

Special Chapel, Collegian, and Class Vaudeville Are New Tradition

Students Invited To Convention

University of Washington To Be Locale of International Conference

The University of Washington invites interested students to attend the Fifth Annual Northwest Students' International Relations Conference to be held there November 25-27. The purpose of this conference is to increase the interest and study in international questions.

Small round table groups will encourage individual discussion. The visiting delegates will be housed free at fraternities, sororities, or other organized houses of the campus; and cost of meals at the campus commons should not exceed \$1.00 a day.

Enoch Dumas, president of the campus Y. M., urges students to accept this opportunity and make plans now for attending the conference.

TEST WILL BE ORAL AND PENNED

An experiment will be carried out this year in presenting the Senior Orals, examinations in a senior's major, which all graduating students must take. Previously, the Oral has lasted about an hour and a half. This year, a plan has been formulated in which the seniors will take a written examination of about three hours, to be followed by the regular Oral. It will not be a harder examination, but will cover the students material to a much larger extent than the Oral was able to do.

An enlargement of this plan, in which from 15 to 30 hours are spent in the written examination has been so successfully carried out in larger colleges than Willamette, that it was thought wise to try the plan here. If the plan proves successful, the written examination will be adopted here, along with the Oral, giving the students more of a chance to prove the extent of their knowledge to their professors.

Students Hunt for Cephalic Indexes

Using the callipers from the state penitentiary, Joseph White and Harold Rose are measuring the cephalic indexes of Chemawa and W. U. students respectively. Along with the study of the shape of the heads, a survey of the color of hair, eyes, and complexions is being made.

PIANO STUDENTS INVITED TO MEET

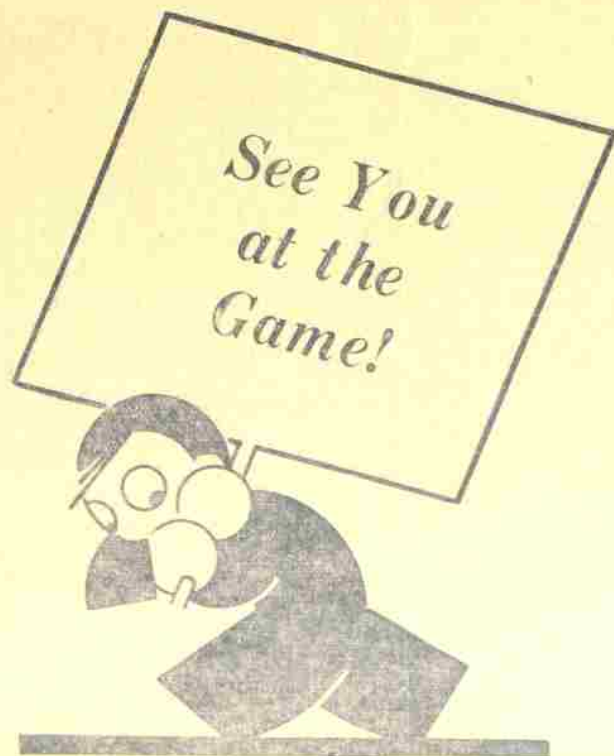

BADGERS BLAST W. U. TITLE HOPE

Freak Play Gives Pacific 6-2 Victory In Hard Fought Game Saturday

A forward pass which bounced from the hands of first a Pacific man, then a desperate Willamette player, and finally into the arms of a second Badger gave Eldon Jenne's Badgers from Forest Grove a 6-2 victory over the Willamette University-Bearcats in the Multnomah stadium in Portland, last Saturday.

This upset, which practically hands the championship to the College of Puget Sound, is the second consecutive time that Pacific has blasted the Bearcats out of the running for the conference title. Last year on Sweetland field a much weaker Badger eleven downed Willamette 7-6.

The winning play came late in the first period after a sustained Pacific drive which started from their own 19 yard line, and, with Weiser and Holland doing most of the ball carrying, was not stopped until the touchdown had been made. Pacific was in possession of the ball deep in Willamette territory when Killits returned a short kick by Franz from behind his own goal line to the Bearcat 11 yard mark.

After the first two plays had netted a loss of two yards, Al Weiser faded back and shot a pass which was intended for Parberry, the Badger right-end. Parberry stretched for the ball, but just succeeded in knocking it higher in the air. Franz, the Willamette wing-back who was guarding Parberry, then desperately batted at the elusive pig-skin, but only knocked it a few yards farther into the arms of a very much surprised Blaine Johnson, Pacific quarterback, who had gone down with Parberry on the play. Johnson then had only to stumble a few steps unimpeded across the goal line for the decisive touchdown. Weiser's pass to Holland for the extra point was incomplete.

The Bearcats received their only two points of the game when Weiser, standing in the end zone to kick, fumbled the ball and was tackled by Clark for a safety. In a way this was a break for Pacific, as they got to kick out from the 20 and were never again seriously threatened by the Willamette attack. When the game ended Pacific had a first down on the Bearcat 5 yard line.

For Willamette, Grannis, Clark, Boyd, Jones, and Weiser all played outstanding football on the line. In the backfield, Olson, Erickson, Oravee, and Cannady while he was in the game all reeled off some good gains. During the last half the entire Willamette team were fighting tooth and nail to put over the touchdown which would have given them the game.

The teams were fairly even, with Pacific's successful passes making up the difference in yardage. The Badgers registered 10 first downs to 8 for the Bearcats. There were very few penalties, none for more than five yards.

George Cannady is very versatile in his calcium formation. Everything held, even though Pacific did their best to remove bits of the precious stuff via the "pull apart" route.

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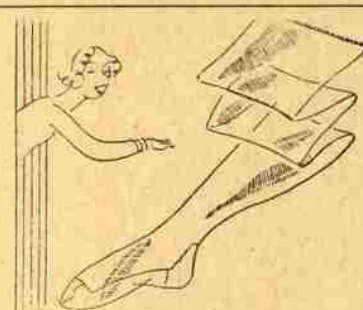
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
