Atkinson students receive federal internships

ATKINSON students, at right, Phillip Doolittle and Grace Crunican, have been named Presidential Management Interns.



Two students at the Geo. H. Atkinson Graduate School of Administration, Willamette University, are among 250 Presidential Management Interns to be placed this year in a federal department or agency.

The purpose of the Presidential Management Internship Program (PMIP) is to attract to federal service men and women of exceptional management potential who hold masters' degrees in public management.

Grace Crunican and Phillip Doolittle will receive the Master of Administration degree (M.Ad.) in May, upon completion of the two-year program of the Atkinson School of Administration.

Crunican attended Aloha High School in Beaverton and graduated in political science and criminal justice from Gonzaga University. She is currently an intern in the office of the Salem city manager. Before entering the Atkinson School, she worked two summers in the office of Portland mayor Neil Goldschmidt.

After completing high school in San Bernardino, CA, Doolittle majored in political science at the University of Redlands. After graduation, he remained at the University of Redlands for a year as assistant director of campus programming. He held a summer internship with TRW, Inc. during the summer of 1978.

Presidential Management Interns may receive assignments as budget analysts, personnel specialists, program analysts, procurement, contact, and loan specialists, and other management positions. Interns are eligible for promotion after one year (to grade 11) and further at the end of two years (to grade 12).

Interns who successfully complete their two-year, noncareer appointments under the program may be granted career status with the federal civil service without further competition.

Crunican is seeking an assignment in financial management in which she will be able to apply knowledge and skills acquired in specialized courses taken at the Graduate School of Administration.

Doolittle is interested in applying skills in quantitative modeling and cost analysis to public sector programs. Expressing "enthusiasm" about the internship, he is "confident that the education received and the analytical skills acquired at the Atkinson School" have prepared him to meet the "challenges" of government service.

MSU members share cultural differences at Expressions V

Sharing cultural differences through the arts was the focus of this year's Expressions, an annual program sponsored by the Minority Student Union (MSU). Instead of one day of events as in previous years, activities were spread over three days—April 11, 12 and 13.

Some of those activities included an MSU production of "The Amen Corner" by James Baldwin, a play set in a small storefront church in Harlem, and a talk about black women writers of the Harlem Renaissance by Deborah E. McDowell of the Africana Studies and Research Center at Purdue University.

Juanita Lyday, a junior from Portland and MSU member, said this year's events, which included two all-campus ethnic dinners, offered a time for students of different histories and cultures to come together to share views, outlooks and also gain a better understanding of each other.

Robert Lisensky elected president of NASCUMC

Willamette president Dr. Robert P. Lisensky was elected president of the National Association of Schools and Colleges of the United Methodist Church (NASCUMC) at its annual meeting last month in Washington, D.C. The association represents 106 Methodist-affiliated educational institutions, including secondary schools, colleges and universities.

As president, Dr. Lisensky will become an ex-officio member of the Board of Higher Education and Ministry of the United Methodist Church, and will be responsible to establish closer bonds between member institutions of NASCUMC and the church.

Last year, Dr. Lisensky, who has been a member of the board of directors since 1976, was vice president for the association and chairman of the Committee on Education-Church Relations. Prior to that, he was chairman of the Committee on Missions, Goals and Priorities. Both of these committees have had as their main task helping the organization prepare a program strategy for the 1980 General Conference of the United Methodist Church. One of the critical issues for the association at that conference will be church support of higher education.

Some of the purposes of NASCUMC are to clarify the mission, goals and priorities of Methodist-related schools, to communicate them to the various publics of these institutions, to assist the church and its agencies to become more aware of the role of the affiliated schools and to provide helpful information and fellowship for the leaders of the educational institutions.

Dr. Lisensky, whose total educational career has been with Methodist-related institutions, has been president of Willamette University since 1973.

Alumni Day/Commencement 1979

Six to receive WU Alumni Citations; four, honorary degrees

William E. Stafford, Colin W. Williams, Yasuo Kaneko and Arno H. Denecke will receive honorary degrees when Willamette University conducts its 1979 commencement ceremony on the afternoon of May 13, 1979. Stafford, nationally-honored Portland poet, will deliver the afternoon commencement address and Williams, dean and professor of religion at Yale University, will speak at the morning baccalaureate service.

Approximately 225 students will receive undergraduate degrees, about 140 the doctor of jurisprudence and 35 the master's of administration. Five students are expected to receive the first joint law-administration degrees.

As usual, the weekend festivities will begin with Alumni Day on May 12 with alumnus Gregory Nokes, senior economist writer for Associated Press in Washington, D.C., delivering the dinner address. Six alumni, including Nokes, will receive the alumni citations.

The now-traditional reception on the football field after the ceremony at McCulloch Stadium will conclude the weekend festivities. In case of rain, the commencement ceremony will be in Sparks Center—as it was for the first time last year.

Stafford, the Oregon Poet Laureate, is retiring from teaching at Lewis and Clark College this year. A former National Book Award winner, he has long been a friend of the University and has participated in Willamette poetry and writing sessions.

Williams, born in Australia, is a Methodist minister and the author of three books.

Kaneko, vice president of Willamette's sister college, the International College of Commerce and Economics, has been closely involved in the association between ICCE and the University.

Denecke is serving as Chief Justice of the Oregon Supreme Court after a distinguished career in teaching, private practice and other judicial posts.

As a service to graduates, their parents and others, Willamette has retained a photographer to get photos of all degree recipients as they receive their diplomas.

At the annual Alumni Banquet, a somewhat unusual occurrence will take place: instead of the usual five Alumni Citations being granted, six will be awarded this year. This has occurred on one previous occasion and has required, by unanimous vote, a waiver of the regulations by both the Alumni Board of Directors and Willamette University Board of Trustees.

The reason for this expanded group had to do with a husband and wife team. Evelyn High Grant (1931) was nominated and elected on the basis of her active community work in the San Francisco Bay area. A former president of the Family Service Agency and the Community Council of San Mateo County, Evelyn also has served as trustee of the San Mateo Union High School District and a board member of the San Mateo County United Fund.

The "surprise" citation winner is her husband and long-time member of the

Willamette University Board of Trustees, Don Grant (1929). For years, Don served as George Atkinson's "right-hand man" and at times, even his alter ego. It was the opinion of the Alumni Board of Directors that probably no person has given more time and energy for the betterment of Willamette University than Don Grant. His winning this citation was kept a secret, even through the board meeting he attended! Just prior to the vote, Don was "called out" for a telephone call, and while he was away, his name was presented to the Board of Trustees and unanimously accepted.

Among the citation winners to be recognized at the annual Alumni Day Banquet is Walter Erickson, graduate of 1933. Erickson has had a varied career which includes being football coach, registrar and director of admissions at Willamette University—all at the same time! He went on to serve as a counselor at Franklin High School and principal of Woodrow Wilson High School, Benson High School and Franklin High School. Throughout his long career, Walt Erickson never forgot Willamette and he personally was responsible for many students coming and graduating from his alma mater.

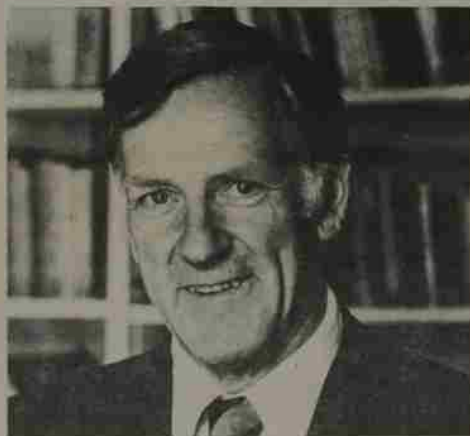
Another winner is Alice Rose Jones (1947). Mrs. Jones is currently department chairperson and instructor of vocal music at McNary High School in Salem. She received both her bachelor of music and master of music education degrees from Willamette, and has produced six, full-length, musical comedies that received widespread local acclaim. Active in many civic affairs, she was honored as Woman of Achievement for the City of Salem in 1970, and was First Citizen of Keizer in 1978.

Greg Nokes (1959) will also receive an alumni citation. Currently senior economic writer for Associated Press, Nokes' headquarters are in the U.S. Treasury Building Press Room in Washington, D.C. Nokes started as a member of the staff of the Medford Mail Tribune, later joined the Associated Press and spent two years in the Salt Lake City bureau. From there, he had assignments in Latin America, Panama, and Puerto Rico, the Caribbean, Buenos Aires and Uruguay. In 1972, he won a Nieman Fellowship to Harvard, the most prestigious scholarship open to journalists. After a year at Harvard, he joined the Washington, D.C. Associated Press bureau. He recently returned from a trip to Europe, Saudi Arabia and Israel with former Secretary of the Treasury Simon. He currently is in China, but plans to return in time to be the Alumni Day speaker at the annual banquet on May 12.

The sixth citation winner is Ancil Payne (1943). Payne, a well-known and respected businessman in Seattle, Washington, where he serves as president of King Broadcasting Company, the largest radio-television holding company in the Northwest, has had regional and national positions in radio and television, but always looks for a chance to return to Willamette, "where it all started." In 1967, Payne was the featured speaker at the annual Alumni Banquet.

A SPECIAL RELATIONSHIP

WU and sister college ICCE celebrate fifteen years of growth

You've heard it said before. Overseas study programs are enlightening, broadening, the source of lifelong memories and lasting friendships. But none of these hackneyed phrases says enough about the relationship between Willamette and the International College of Commerce and Economics (ICCE); this one is special. The sister-college relationship between Willamette and ICCE has grown to where each college seems to be an extension of the other.

The relationship began in the summer of 1964 when Dr. Taizo Kaneko, owner and founder of ICCE, personally escorted the first group of visitors from his school to the Willamette campus. Since then, an increasing number of Japanese students has

visited Willamette each summer, learning more about American studies, American-Japanese relations and our language. Last summer, 150 Japanese students and faculty came to visit us—and not everyone who wanted to make the trip could be accommodated by ICCE.

At first, Willamette began visits to Japan with faculty only. Current faculty members who have gone to the ICCE campus at Kawagoe City include professors Wilbur Braden, Charles Derthick, Richard Gillis, James Hand, Thomas Hibbard, Richard Lord, Kenneth Nolley, Howard Runkel, Theodore Shay and R. A. "Buzz" Yocom. It was the fall of 1973 before Willamette students went to Japan, 23 undergraduates going to ICCE with Dick Gillis that year. The first trip was so successful that an every-other-year fall semester in Japan has become a regular part of the University's expanding off-campus study program. Tom Hibbard took a group in 1975, Buzz Yocom in 1977, and next fall it will be Professor Paul Duell with a contingent of 29 students.

With the arrival of Dr. Robert Lisensky as president, the sister-college relationship took on a broader and deeper meaning; the academic portion of the experience was strengthened significantly to the satisfaction of both schools. Dr. Lisensky also visited the ICCE campus, the first Willamette president to do so.

The summer visit by Japanese students has been extended to three weeks and probably will occur every other year. However, during the alternate spring semesters, 30 to 35 Japanese students are now coming to Willamette for an even longer stay—seven weeks. This semester, 33 Japanese students are living on campus and are active in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Many participated in Freshman Glee and a Japanese group sang for the Glee audience. The longer spring program provides considerable opportunity for the visitors to learn more about American political systems, American culture and heritage and the English language. And an increasing number of ICCE students are coming to Willamette for a two-year period, receiving Bachelor of Arts degrees (mostly in economics or political science).

Meanwhile, offerings relating to the Far East have been expanded at Willamette. Nihongo, the Japanese language, can be studied for four semesters and courses have been added in the history of the Far East.

The above are the basic facts about Willamette and Kokusai Shoka Daigaku, which is the Japanese name for ICCE. But facts don't tell the story. Ask Willamette men and women who have been to Japan or who have been involved with the Japanese here, and you learn that true learning comes from exposure to a culture totally different from ours. Going to Japan isn't like going to Europe and meeting Japanese is not like meeting Europeans. They're different from us; we're different from them.

Americans and Japanese confront each other and aren't sure what to do: Do you open a gift immediately or not? What does that "ah, so" really mean (it means something close to "is that right?")? How do these casual Americans really view their families? When is it proper to bow? In Japan, American students, amidst all that gentle friendliness, run into Japanese inscrutability, men dancing with men, people who seem to be waving goodbye but really are indicating they want you to come to them. However, the differences melt when Americans meet the courteous, ever-polite Japanese.

American students also encounter a crush of people, subways where young men are hired to push people into the packed cars and temples and shrines

where piles of sandals are seen at the entrances. They see a country whose beauty is only hinted at in postcards, whose remarkable determination and adaptability has enabled it to cope without the natural resources of a country like the United States.

Perhaps the most remarkable aspect of the whole relationship is that there seems to be no bad experiences. Willamette and ICCE get along very well. Of course, those who have watched the program between the schools grow wonder how Americans could help but like these people whose conversation is dotted with "dozo" (please) and "arigato" (thank you), who address many Americans with titles of respect (Smith-sensei and Jones-san).

Willamette has partially expressed its

appreciation of ICCE by awarding an honorary degree to Dr. Taizo Kaneko in 1969 and this year to his son and director of the college, Professor Yasuo Kaneko. Willamette students have shown their love for the Japanese in their own way: Barry Duell, a 1974 Willamette graduate, teaches at ICCE and Ted Shay and Laurie Freeman, two 1979 graduates, will head for Kawagoe City to teach English at ICCE in 1979-80 and 1980-81.

The Willamette-ICCE relationship is not one with a phony facade of friendliness. It goes much deeper than that. Americans and Japanese are learning about each other in-depth and, the more they learn, the better they like each other.

NOT-SO TRADITIONAL entertainment was provided by visiting ICCE students during the annual talent program for the home-stay families. Painting comic faces on dancing students was new to the usual karate and dance demonstrations.

New center at Atkinson School adds excitement and innovation

The two words one hears most in discussion about the Center for Business-Government Studies are "excitement" and "innovation," and this is most appropriate because the Center is the new research and service arm of the Geo. H. Atkinson Graduate School of Administration. The Atkinson School teaches administration for future managers in both the public and private sectors; the Center's specific charge is to work with faculty, students and friends in opening new channels of communication and facilitating effective working relationships between the public and private sectors.

Dr. Barbara Karmel, director of the Center and Associate Dean of the Atkinson School, says it this way in the first issue of *The Intersector*, a quarterly newsletter published by the Center:

The Center's role, symbolized by the title of this publication, is: To focus on the uneasy and uneven terrain that exists between business and government; to document problems that have been solved creatively and the means by which resolution has been achieved; to chart pathways for innovative and cooperative resolution of problems of the present and the future. The increasing interdependence of business and government holds potential for both conflict and cooperation. At the Center, we believe that these forces can be channeled in constructive directions and that we can provide leadership by initiating problem-solving efforts. We stand as an independent and impartial source of information, mediator and facilitator. The Center will commission basic and applied research, speak in language that is meaningful and helpful to manager, assemble interagency and interdisciplinary teams, provide forums for effective dialogue, and offer needed educational programs.

The Intersector itself is one of the key means of communication; Dr. Karmel calls

it the voice of the Center. It will notify readers of the results of Center research studies and the availability of complete reports published as *Center Papers* as well as notes on conferences and forthcoming events. The first issue contained a questionnaire to learn about reader interests and preferences and thus provide guidance for the content of future issues. The first issue of *The Intersector* also featured articles by C. Morton Bishop, Jr., president of Pendleton Woolen Mills and a Willamette trustee, and by Victor Atiyeh, Governor of Oregon, commenting on perspectives from the private and public sector.

To date, there are six research studies sponsored by the Center: "Effectiveness of Regulation of Utility Prices; A Cost of Capital Study" (Stephen Archer); "Evaluation of Financial Ratio Data in Not-for-profit Hospitals" (Marc Choate); "Effect of Expected Inflation on Debt Quantity and Maturity Decisions of Firms" (Marc Choate); "Differences in Motivational Profiles of Public and Private Sector Managers" (Barbara Karmel); "A Demographic Study of Change in Political Structures" (Stephen Maser)—funded by a grant from the National Institution of Child Health and Human Development; and "Validity of Professional Licensing: An Empirical Study in Real Estate" (Earl Littrell). In addition, a number of new research proposals are under consideration: Publication of a 1979 Legislative Review authored by the Willamette Law Review staff and including comment on ambiguities of new legislation, implications for businesses and managers, and legal evaluation; impact of regulation on decision-making in nursing homes; outside directors on corporate boards; regulatory decision-making; and public and private sector arbitration decision concerning overtime compensation.

Educational activities of the Center include a conference on "The Private Sector Use of CETA." Sixty participants and conference faculty came from across the country last October to discuss ways

to implement the newly-adopted Private Sector Initiatives Program designed to increase private sector utilization of CETA funds. The conference was the first to be presented following Congressional adoption of this legislation.

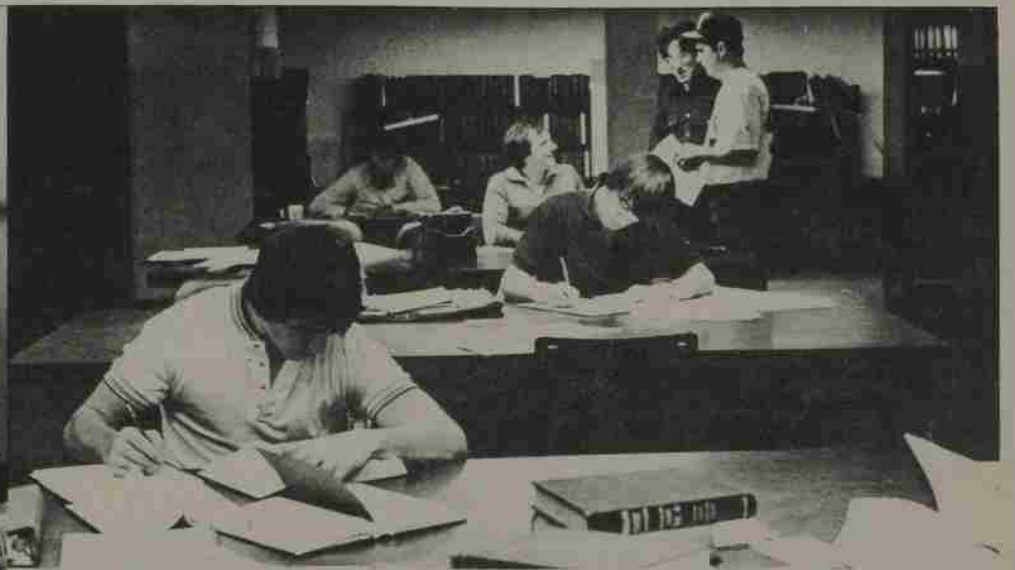
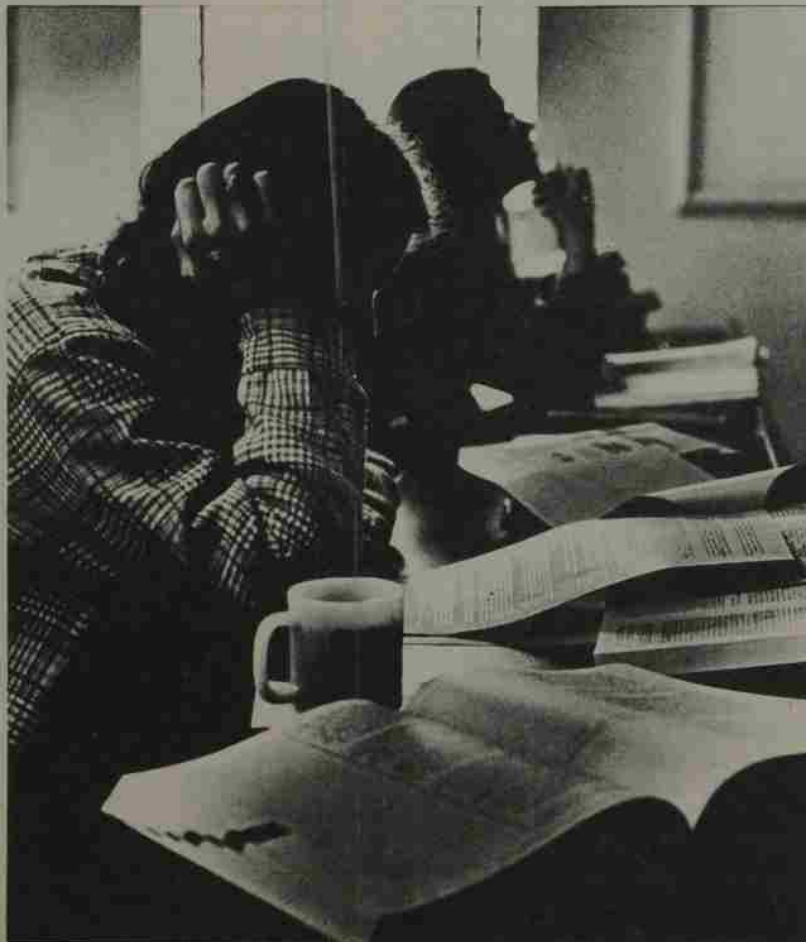
Forthcoming conference plans include management briefings on professional licensing, financial decisions in not-for-profit hospitals, the effect of regulation on cost of capital in electric utilities, a short course on financial planning and a major conference on regulation and deregulation.

The Center for Business-Government Studies was made possible by a two-year development grant of \$350,000 from the M. J. Murdock Charitable Trust. Dr. Gene Leonardson is the Center's Continuing Education Director, and Eileen Rygh serves as Research and Conference Coordinator. Both Karmel and Leonardson are also members of the Atkinson School faculty.

Important in the Center's success to date, and a necessary ingredient to continued progress, is the involvement of the campus community in its external environment. Faculty members, students and business and government representatives are all an integral part of Center programming. For example, one objective of the Center is to bring together representatives of the public and private sectors in a neutral environment so that energy can be focused on creativity and problem-solving rather than confrontation. In pursuit of this objective the Center has established two groups, each composed of representatives from business and government and each intended to improve communications between the sectors. 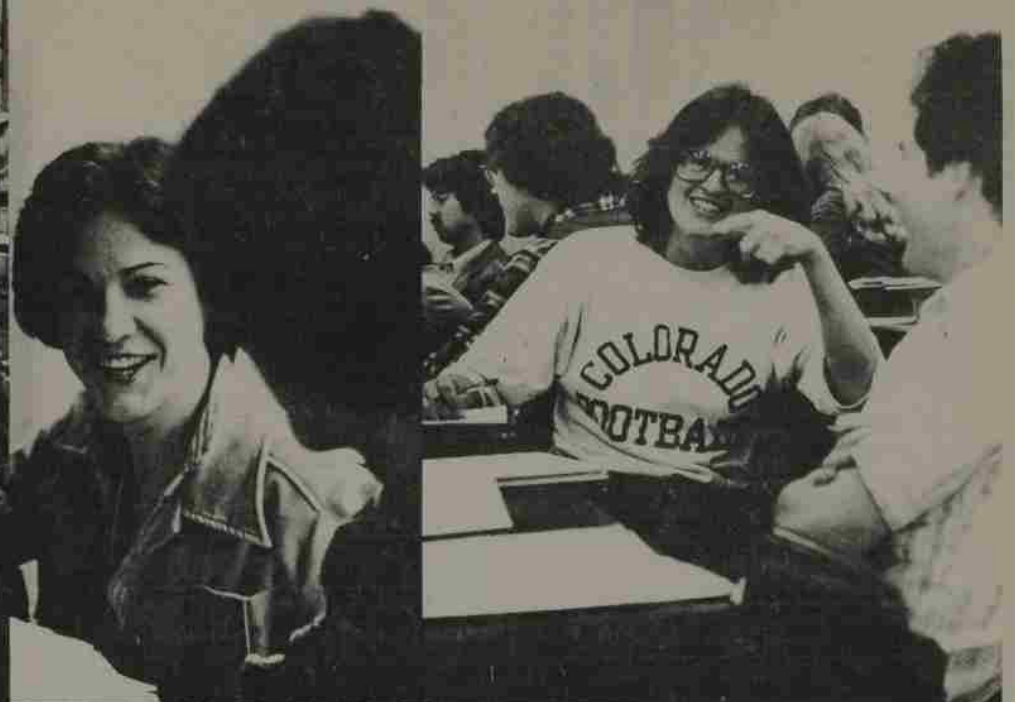
It's been an exciting year for students and faculty with the addition to the curriculum of a trial practice course designed to give future attorneys practical experience in trying cases; a two-day visit to campus by Raoul Berger, a recognized scholar in constitutional law; and for the first time in recent years, representation by Willamette at the National Mock Trial Competition in

Houston, TX.

Dean Leroy Tornquist and J. Richard Creatura, assistant professor of legal research and writing, coordinate the trial practice class. It was initiated fall semester and has proven to be popular; three-quarters of this year's graduating class has taken the course, which is taught by local judges and lawyers.

Two special activities planned later this year by law students are the first issue of the *Legislative Review*, a supplement to the annual *Law Review* (formerly *Law Journal*), and the Ninth Regional Conference on Women and the Law, to be hosted in October by the Willamette Women's Law Caucus.

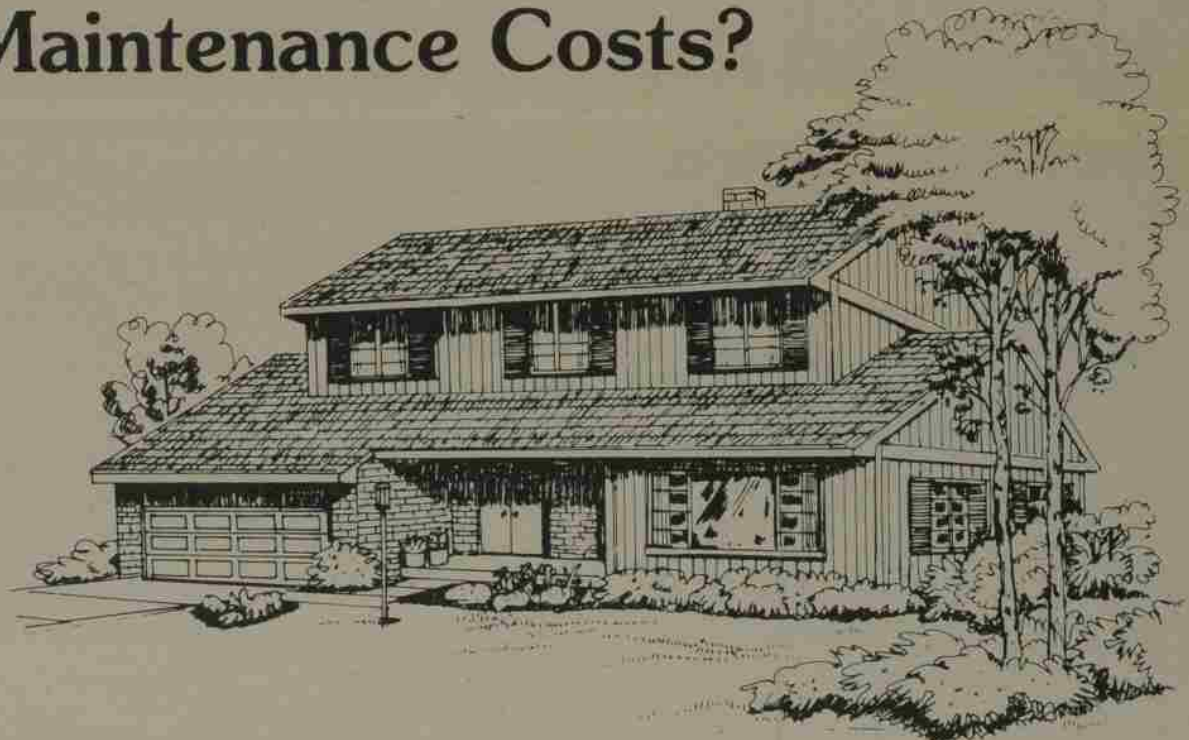
