

Largest Enrollment in History Exceeds 1000

Men Students Exceed Coeds By 5-3 Ratio

The largest enrollment in Willamette's history passed the 1000 mark during the second week of the fall semester, which opened October 1. With hundreds of veterans resuming their interrupted education, men students on the campus outnumber women by a ratio of 5 to 3.

Latest breakdown of registration figures reveals a total enrollment of 1018 students, of which 639 are men and 379 are women.

A further breakdown indicates a total of 855 enrolled in the College of Liberal Arts, 72 in the College of Music and 91 attending law school. In addition there are 35 enrolled as special students.

Although accurate figures are not yet available, it is estimated that at least 200 of the 639 men are married.

Former V-12s Organize, Plan Meet

A meeting was held on the Willamette university campus in August by the men attached to the university's V-12 unit during the navy program, who have organized themselves into the U.S. Lausanne organization. A general meeting will be held annually.

A constitution has been adopted and the following officers elected: R. Dale Hunsaker, Klamath Falls, commanding officer; Norman Willard, Jr., Chelalis, Wash., executive officer; Royal V. Hart, Jefferson, disbursing officer; Lyman F. Smith, Montpelier, Idaho, ship's secretary; and Bill B. Cate, Middleton, Idaho, chaplain. Dr. G. Herbert Smith welcomed the men during the organized meeting on the campus.

Fraternities Go National

Charters were granted in late summer to the three local fraternities on the Willamette campus by well-known national fraternities during their annual national conventions. Formal installations will be held on this campus January 3-4, 1947 for the new national chapters.

First of the three groups to receive their charter was Kappa Gamma Rho, whose new affiliation is Beta Theta Pi. The Kappas were represented by Ray Fedje at the national convention of Beta at Makinac Island, Michigan. Alpha Psi Delta was given membership in Phi Delta Theta during the convention also held at Makinac Island. Clarence Wicks, student body president, represented Alpha Psi at the convention in August. Sigma Tau will soon become Sigma Chi as a result of the convention held in Chicago in early September.

The three fraternities recently completed the fall rushing program and have announced the pledging of 36 new men.

Grid Tilt With CPS to Feature Return of Alumni to Campus

Full-scale Homecoming resumes at Willamette this year with all-out preparations under way to welcome returning alumni back to the campus the week-end of October 25 and 26. It will mark the first Homecoming in a fall semester since 1942, although the event was held during the summer semester of the past two years.

New Secretary To Welcome Alumni Back

Greeting guests at Homecoming this year will be the new alumni secretary, Mary Jean Huston, '44. She was appointed to replace Mrs. Sybil Spears McLeod, '44, who resigned July 1, after two years in the office.

Miss Huston took over the position August 1, and has charge of alumni arrangements for Homecoming, sending out 2500 letters to the alumni and planning the meeting scheduled for Saturday morning. Assisting her is Jessica Kinsey, '40, newly appointed vice-president, who is taking care of the reception.

After her graduation, Miss Huston taught a year in Canby high school in the department of English and social sciences and this past year attended business school in Portland and assisted in the office of the Capital City Transfer company in Salem. She now resides with her parents in Salem, having moved last year from St. Helens, Ore.

As part of her duties, the alumni secretary will be traveling through Oregon this fall contacting alumni for the organization of local alumni clubs, and would appreciate any suggestions or help given by members of the organization. Promotion of the Loyalty Fund, handling of alumni correspondence and funds, and assisting in the organization of local groups, constitute the main activities of this position.

Climax of this year's Homecoming will be the football game with the College of Puget Sound, starting at 2:15 on Sweetland field Saturday, October 26.

A meeting of alumni will take place at 11 o'clock Saturday morning in Waller chapel, and a reception will be held in Chresto cottage after the game.

In addition to celebrating the return of football as a major sport at Willamette, Homecoming this fall will bring resumption of the annual leaf rake, with freshmen turning out at 4 o'clock Friday morning to rake the fall leaves and tidy the campus for the welcoming of former students. The leaf rake, a memorable event in the college life of freshmen, was absent from the two previous Homecomings because the dates were too early in the year.

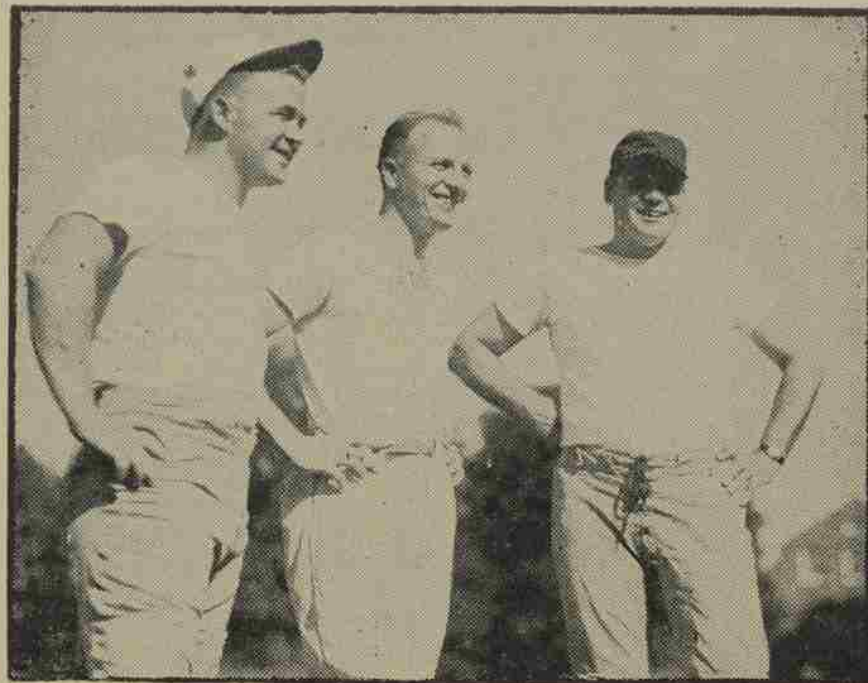

as has been the case for the past two years, instead of in front of the fraternity and sorority houses and the dormitories. Various living organizations will be assigned locations on the campus to erect their animated signs.

Another pre-war institution of Homecoming returns as the living organizations compete in a noise parade and rally at 7 o'clock the night before the game.

Managing the Homecoming for 1946 is Reid Shelton, music school senior and past Freshman Glee manager. He will be assisted by Larry Wills, Chuck Zerzan and Bob Fletcher.

Homecoming was suspended in 1943 with the advent of the Navy V-12 program and the change to a three-semester calendar which delayed the opening of the fall semester until November. The next year it was resumed during the summer semester with relatively few students, mainly navy men, on the campus. Travel restrictions kept many alumni away, but those who were able to attend pronounced the event a signal success. Last year's Homecoming was managed almost entirely by V-12 students, nearly all of them new to the campus that semester, but they too got into the spirit of Willamette Homecoming and provided an enthusiastic welcome to alumni.

Bearcats, Coaches Pointing To CPS Homecoming Game

While every game on the docket of Willamette university's Bearcats has been given their undivided attention this fall, the one that players and coaches alike are pointing for is the October 26 Homecoming struggle with College of Puget Sound.

C.P.S. president, Dr. R. Franklin Thompson, former Willamette university vice president and Dean of Freshman would like nothing better than to see the oft trampled loggers of former years turn in a win over the Bearcats this year. And to this end CPS dropped spring sports competition in the Northwest conference in order to concentrate on spring football preparations designed to cook up a bitter brew for the Bearcats this fall.

Being fully aware of this situation up Tacoma way the Willamette gridders and coaching staff are doing some cooking of their own these days, so when the two rivals get together on

Sweetland field October 26 things should pop. The 'Cats have looked much improved over their showing against San Jose State to whom they bowed before superior numbers 44 to 6, but they still showed hot and cold in defeating UBC 26 to 13, though they managed to remain warm enough throughout the game to hold the Thunderbirds to an insignificant 29 yards gained from scrimmage.

Willamette's backs, running from a formation entirely new to them, failed during most of the San Jose game to momentarily conceal their plays even from spectators in the remotest seats in Spartan stadium, but their deception improved in the UBC tilt and several 'Cat ball carriers reeled off lengthy gains against their opponent's befuddled defenses. Based on the hypothesis that Erickson's charges will continue to improve in handling the ball from his double-wing for-

Emily Parmenter Cornell, '78, died on June 19, 1946 in Portland.

1897

Floyd Field, '97, retired as a member of the Georgia Tech faculty after a tenure of 40 years, 26 of them in the capacity of dean of men, later changed to dean of students. A graduate of the old Oregon Institute as well as of Willamette, Dean Field holds A.B. and M.A. degrees also from Harvard. He taught in Allen high school in Massachusetts and at State college and Evanston academy, Pennsylvania, before becoming instructor of mathematics at Georgia Tech in 1906. Three years later he was head of his department. By 1921 he was dean of men, a title he held until his retirement July 1 of this year.

1912

France Pohle Utter, '12, was named president of the Salem branch of the American Association of University Women at their last meeting for the year until fall.

1921

Frank B. Bennett, '21, superintendent of Salem public schools, was an instructor for the six-weeks University of Oregon summer session in Portland. He taught classes in secondary education, principles of teaching and Oregon school law.

Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Davies, '21, were Salem visitors on their way to Seattle from San Francisco where Mr. Davies has headquarters for the New York Times, of which he is west coast representative.

rounding Tientsin as well as in Shantung province, where the country work of the National Holiness Missionary society is carried on. Mrs. Trachsel and their three small daughters hope to join him in China in the early fall. Mrs. Trachsel anticipates a fall opening of the Tientsin Bible seminary with which he has been connected since 1932. Mrs. Trachsel returned to the U. Pass defense, or rather lack of same, has been the most glaring weakness on the Willamette club to date, which is borne out by the fact that San Jose, though possessing a powerful ground attack, gained twice as much via the air, while UBC gained 154 of their 184 yard total through the Bearcat aerial defenses.

Night Courses Given at WU

Over 30 students have registered for night courses in business subjects for liberal arts credit at Willamette university, President G. Herbert Smith announced.

The courses being offered in the evening are: principles of business administration, principles of accounting and business law, with each course carrying a total of three hours of credit toward a B.A. degree. All classes are meeting in the college of law building.

Dr. Carl Folkerts is teaching the course in business administration and it will be an overview of business practices and procedure, which will include a summary of economics, finance, organization, marketing, merchandising, transportation, advertising and problems of business management. The course on principles of business law includes contracts, agency, sales, negotiable instructions, bailments and real and personal property.

All Students Find Housing

Willamette University is taking care of its students who are not Salem residents in various ways.

For freshmen and independent women are Lausanne and Fredrickson halls which house 169 of their number. Other upper-class women are housed in the four sorority living organizations.
