

## Six Graduates Join Alumni On March 6

Six graduates will enter the ranks of Willamette alumni at an academic convocation in Waller hall March 6.

Dr. John O. Gross, secretary of the department of educational institutions of the board of education of the Methodist church and immediate past president of the National Association of Church Related Colleges, will address the convocation.

All six of the graduates will receive the bachelor of arts degree. They include Rosella Marie Bell (biology), Mary Edith Bennett (physical education), Jack Glasse (psychology-philosophy), Marian Beth Nordean (history), Robert Curtis Taylor (biology), and Kenneth R. Torgeson (history).

The graduation ceremony will take place on the morning of the second day of the new semester. The present semester ends February 17. A week of vacation will elapse between terms.

## V-12 Quota At Willamette Cut to 150

Nationwide curtailment of the Navy's V-12 college training program will leave Willamette approximately 150 apprentice seamen on the campus with the start of the new spring semester starting March 5. The new quota is reduced from 200 for the present semester and from 260 at the beginning of the program in July, 1943.

The Navy expects to discontinue the V-12 program at the end of the spring semester. It will, however, expand its present Naval ROTC to take care of those men now under V-12 who will not have completed their course by next July.

To the 24 colleges which now have NROTC, 26 will be added for a total of 50. The institutions which are to be selected for the expanded NROTC will be announced within a few weeks.

## Travel Ruling Bans Institute Of Citizenship

Plans for the annual Institute of Citizenship, begun in 1941, were canceled this year because of the order by the office of defense transportation banning conventions.

The institute brings high school juniors from various parts of the state to observe state government at first hand. Sponsored by Willamette university, it draws upon state officials for discussion and demonstration of government functions and includes visits to the various state institutions in and near Salem.

The date for this year had been set during the legislative session so that the program could be centered in the legislature.

## Chi Omicron to Go Nation March 17

Chi Omicron will hold their installation into Chi Omega national sorority on the weekend of March 17. A national officer will be here for the installation. Chi Omicron is a new group on the campus and next semester they will have Frederickson Annex as their chapter house. They are the third national organization on the campus, the others being Pi Beta Phi and Alpha Chi Omega.

## Election Kills Athletic Field Plans

### Alumni Pack Gym at Freshman Glee

### Sophomores Win Banner; Frosh Swim

For the 37th consecutive year Freshman Glee was presented at Willamette January 27 and proved once again to be the most firmly rooted traditional event on the century-old campus. Returning alumni who packed the gymnasium to witness the annual contest found no waning in rivalry and spirit, despite the pressures and disruptions of war.

The sophomores won the Glee banner, and in recognition of the fact, each member of the class will be awarded a miniature duplicate of the banner to preserve as a cherished memento.

The freshmen, unwieldy by virtue of their large number and lack of experience, went down fighting to take fourth place and a Monday morning swim in the icy waters of the Mill stream. The juniors, who had swum in their two previous ventures, took second place. Seniors placed third.

Prof. W. Herman Clark, '14, announced the awards and presented the banner to the winning sophomores, taking over the duties of the late Dr. James T. Matthews, '39.

A check of past Glee records reveals that seniors have won 11 Glee banners since the annual competition began in 1909. Juniors have won 10 banners, while sophomores have nine to their credit and freshmen seven.

The only class ever to have won four Glee banners is the class of 1936. Two classes, those of 1912 and 1940 have three banners each to their credit. Classes that claim two wins are 1924, 1926 and 1931.

As is customary, the Monday after Glee this year was set apart for the payment of bets by losers, and the campus for a while took on a bizarre and even fantastic appearance. One difference from other years, however, was occasioned by the fact that the state legislature was in session across the street. Among other spectacles to which legislators were treated was the appearance of a freshman Diogenes in their chambers, carrying his lantern and looking for an honest man.

## Journals Print Oliver Articles

Dr. Egbert S. Oliver, professor of English, has two papers on Herman Melville, 19th century novelist, scheduled for publication in College English. The first will appear in the March issue. Among other publications by Dr. Oliver is a study of Senator Wayne L. Morse in a recent issue of Advance, monthly magazine for the Congregational church, and an article on the background and derivation of words connected with Easter, to appear in the April number of Advance.

Recently elected to the Missions Council of the Congregational church, Dr. Oliver attended a meeting of the board in Cleveland, Ohio, late in January.

### Men's Housing Fund Reaches \$110,013; Goal Set at \$321,000

Gifts of cash and pledges amounting to \$110,013 for the Willamette dormitory fund were received by the university by the end of January. The committee of the board of trustees conducting the drive for funds is concentrating at present on solicitation of larger gifts, but expects to open a general campaign for donations of all kinds about the first of April.

### Will of Dr. and Mrs. Franklin Leaves \$8900 to Willamette

Bequests totaling \$8900 for Willamette university are provided in the will of the late Dr. Frank G. Franklin and his wife, Viola Price Franklin.

Dr. Franklin, for 17 years a member of the Willamette faculty and librarian emeritus since 1935, died last summer. Mrs. Franklin died several months later.

Largest gift to the university was a sum of \$4000 to be used for sophomore, junior and senior students of character and social vision. An emergency loan fund of \$1000 was provided for the use of students ineligible for existing financial aids.

### Smith Back From Capital

President G. Herbert Smith returned to the campus from the nation's capital late in January where he served on a special advisory committee appointed by the House education committee to study and report on conditions of independent colleges during the war.

The study completed, Dr. Smith's group submitted a 75-page report on the condition of 1702 colleges, universities and other institutions of higher learning in the United States.

In general the committee found that up to the present the situation does not justify federal action to save the colleges, since they have by curtailments, savings and other adjustments adapted themselves to the war.

The report indicated, however, that as the war continues, more colleges will face difficulties and that some federal program may be justified at a later date.

### Loyalty Fund Grows To Total of \$1493

With \$276.50 added during January, the Loyalty Fund has reached a total of \$1418. The fund was set up last summer by the Willamette Alumni association to be administered by a board of directors elected by the association.

The gift of a \$5 unit or more to the fund entitled the donor to membership in the Alumni association and a subscription to the Collegian.

A fund of \$321,000 is being sought to provide men's housing on the campus as soon as building is practicable. Included in the total sought is provision also for an infirmary.

The dormitory is part of a 10-year development program adopted by the board of trustees and is the measure earmarked for immediate expediting.

Purpose of the lectureship is to bring annually some prominent scholar to Willamette to lecture on the subject, "Demands of Social Progress and Justice." Coincidentally with the lecture fund is another bequest of \$2000 whose income will be used to purchase books for the Willamette library in harmony with and promoting the Frank G. Franklin lectureship.

Scholarship prizes are to be given from a smaller fund of \$400 and gifts of \$250 apiece were given to the campus YM and YW organizations.

### Meet BAGs, Distaff Counterpart of SAX

Unable to escape the title, a new sophomore women's honorary on the campus went ahead and adopted officially the name BAGs, or more formally, Beta Alpha Gamma.

The feminine counterpart of the SAX, alphabetical contraction of Sigma Alpha Chi, which was formed last summer, the women were dubbed BAGs even before their membership had been selected.

The SAX was formed last summer to take over various duties of the Blue Key, restricted to upper division men now scarce on college campuses. Members are chosen by student body vote from nominations submitted by faculty, student council and Blue Key on the basis of leadership, character and scholarship.

Membership in the BAGs is selected in the same manner with the Cap and Gown serving in the nominations instead of Blue Key.

### Soda Fountain Latest Addition To Expanding Bearcat Cavern

The ever expanding Bearcat Cavern has acquired a soda fountain which was being installed during the first week of February. Purchased with Cavern profits and a \$200 gift from the civilian men on the campus who won the money as first prize in the Sixth War Loan competition, the fountain will enable the Cavern to enlarge its menu and will increase the efficiency of its service.

### Bush Pasture Defeat Rules Out WU Site

Prospects of a satisfactory athletic field for Willamette suffered a serious blow February 9 when the proposal to acquire the westerly 43 acres of Bush's Pasture for a city park was defeated 2567 to 2110.

If the purchase had been approved, Willamette would have been given title to from seven to ten acres for an athlete field in the easterly portion of the pasture already deeded to the city by the Bush estate. The field would then have been available for high school and community sports as Sweetland field on the campus is now.

Plans for the future development of the campus hinged on the outcome of the election, since a new site for athletic contests would release Sweetland field for other purposes. After the election results were in Pres. G. Herbert Smith declared that the university has no immediate prospects for a satisfactory solution to the problem of providing an adequate athletic field.

Sweetland field has long been recognized as unsuited for modern athletics and is not physically adaptable to the demands except at great expense. Space, also, is limited, especially in terms of long term planning and the certain growth of the community.

Salem alumni worked hard in campaigning for the election under the leadership of Mrs. Floyd Utter, '12, president of the alumni association, with the assistance of Sybil Spears, '44, alumni secretary. The measure was enthusiastically sponsored by the Salem Chamber of Commerce, Retail Trade Bureau, Trades and Labor Council, school board, garden clubs, service clubs and prominent citizens.

Organized opposition, however, came from the north part of the city, and the opposing vote in that section was sufficient to defeat the proposal that would have meant a 100-acre park and playground in the heart of the city. The west 43 acres will now be subdivided.

Lieut. Comdr. Roy (Spec) Keene, Willamette coach now on leave, wrote an open letter to the people of Salem urging them to approve the purchase. Writing from San Francisco, he pointed to Golden Gate park there with its playgrounds, Keezar stadium, museum and recreation facilities as an example of far-sighted planning. Salem, he said, had an opportunity for just such a development, only on a smaller scale. He suggested it be made Salem's Living Memorial to veterans of World War II.

# What the Alumni of Willamette Are Doing

## 1893

**Frank W. Waters, '98**, died at his home, Wednesday, December 6, in Salem following several years of ill health. He made up the first set of abstract books in Marion county, served for four years as Marion county recorder and was for two terms mayor of Salem. He took pride in a number of progressive movements started and advanced during his two terms as mayor. Later he engaged with others in light, power, and railroad building. During World War I he pioneered in dehydrating fruit for the American armies at a plant he erected at Denver. His granddaughter, Patricia Waters, is a sophomore at Willamette this year.

## 1914

**Ralph W. Farris, '14**, was recently elected attorney-general of Maine by the Maine Legislature. Since returning to Maine in 1917 he has served in the Maine Legislature and as assistant attorney-general.

## 1917

**Russell Brooks, '17**, has been named United States consul at Lyons, France, and with his wife is now enroute there from Casablanca to open a new consulate. Mrs. Brooks, a native of France, expects to visit her mother in Bordeaux soon; the two have not seen each other for 12 years. Brooks, who has been American consul at Casablanca for nearly three years, had previously been in the consular service at Rotterdam, Newcastle, Ondon, Curacao, and Johannesburg.

## 1921

**William Chittick, ex '21**, vice president and general manager of the Western Supply company in Manila before the war, was one of the internees at Santo Tomas. In the camp he held the job of running the front gate liaison and supervising the "package line"—a system through which outsiders could send food and other things into the camp. Such things were sent in by friends, houseboys and other servants. Often the package line meant the difference between starvation and survival, but it was abolished by the Japanese army in February, 1944. In the early days of the camp, servants and outside friends threw packages over the walls to the internees. Later the Jap civilian administration inaugurated the line and inspected the packages. They examined the packages in conjunction with Chittick and his crew, representatives of the internees. In this position Chittick could build up a pipe line and send food and clothing orders out sub rosa. The Japs really didn't care so long as there were "no incidents at the gate." This line reached full flower in mid-1942 when 900 outsiders were sending supplies to internees. Most of the internees had unlimited credit. As the food situation in Manila tightened the package line traffic lessened and restrictions mounted. It finally grew into a smuggling business. Bribery and cajolery among the Japanese guards was the best weapon. Mr. Chittick's mother makes her home in Salem.

## 1922

**Ruth Schaefer Graham, '22**, retired from teaching in January and is busy keeping house for their small son, Verne Milo, while her husband is in the service. Mr. Graham is a purser with the U.S. Merchant Marine.

**Maj. Allan Carson, law, '22**, is now with the air corps intelligence unit of the U.S. army in India. Before entering the service he was practicing law in Salem and serving as a member of the State Legislature.

## 1923

**Bruce White, '23**, and **Grace Brainard White, '23**, make their home in Honolulu where he is Dean of Student Personnel at University of Hawaii. They have one son, Bruce, who is nineteen years old.

## 1924

**Capt. Robey S. Ratcliffe, Law '24**, is information and education officer with the army, stationed in the Pacific for the past year.

**Mrs. Wrenn, the former Kathleen La Raut, '24**, and their small son, Bobbie, are making their home in Salem while the commander is overseas.

## 1926

**Lt. Marjorie Christenson, '26**, visited her sister at Craig Field over Christmas. Both sisters are lieutenants in the WAC. They attended a large Christmas party for the last French detachment that arrived from North Africa and were restricted to the post. Everyone was so busy helping the French cadets who were spending their first Christmas of freedom for several years, that it was a gay party with French songs, a Christmas play for the boys, Santa Claus, favors, etc. Lt. Marjorie Christenson is in charge of recruiting in Birmingham, Ala. Prior to entering the service the sisters were teachers at Salem high school.

**Gilbert Wrenn, '26**, personnel planning officer for the advanced bases in the Pacific, will travel 10,000 miles by air as he visits all of the front line areas in that theatre to determine whether those plans produced at his headquarters in Pearl Harbor are workable in the battle areas. Before entering the service he was a professor of educational psychology at the University of Minnesota. He made the first lap of his trip from Pearl Harbor by plane which was equipped with eight seats and bunks to the Marianas. Aboard the plane, which stopped only for refueling and took 26 hours for the flight, was the crew of 10 men and 15 passengers, including besides himself, a navy captain, an army colonel, three Red Cross workers, a troupe of G.I. entertainers and other military personnel returning to their posts. Passengers slept atop baggage and sat any place they could find space. Most of the talking was done with their hands, their ears being plugged to prevent injury to them from the high altitude. Among the islands over which the plane flew were a number of those still in the hands of the Japanese but the height of the plane made an attack from ground installations an impossibility.

**Edith Mickey Mix, '26**, is making her home in Seattle where her husband is with Boeing Aircraft. Mr. Mix is the new lead man in the instrument panels and oxygen department in connection with the manufacture of B-29 Superfortresses. Mr. and Mrs. Mix formerly made their home in Salem while he was in the watch repair business.

**Daniel T. Schreiber, '26**, was recently discharged from the navy after being naval recruiting officer at Klamath Falls. He will now be the manager of Penney's store at Independence. Mrs. Schreiber, the former **Ethel**

**Adam, '35**, and their nine-months-old daughter, Catherine, will reside in Independence.

## 1927

**Loyal Warner, '27**, recently was elected president of the Salem Chamber of Commerce. He is the manager of the J. C. Penney store and has been prominent with the civic life of Salem for many years.

**Dr. Mary M. Erickson, '27**, is teaching Zoology at Santa Barbara, Calif., State College. Her parents, Dean and Mrs. Erickson, have sold their Salem Heights home and moved to Santa Barbara to be with Mary.

**Lt. Donald S. Haines, '27**, spent a two weeks leave in Salem recently with his wife, the former **Lillian Scott, '30**, and their two sons. Lt. Haines recently returned from a year and a half in the South Pacific. He reported to the hospital at Farragut, Idaho, where he had been assigned duty. Before entering the service, he practiced medicine.

**Eugenia Baker Allen, ex '27**, worked during 1943-44 in a Seattle shipyard as a journeyman marine wireman. Her husband is also in war work. After leaving Willamette Mrs. Allen did office work in San Francisco, Aberdeen, Portland, and Seattle. Her daughter, Nancy, is nearly eleven.

**Kathryn Rossman Bunn, ex '27**, now makes her home in Seattle. She attended the U. of California her junior year, and graduated the following year from the U. of Washington. For ten years she taught in junior and senior high schools of Vancouver, Washington. She took one trip to the orient one summer and another year went around the world on a British freighter. In 1938 she was married to **Holly E. Bunn**, now with the procurement division of the treasury department but formerly with the forestry service and the Alaska highway. Mrs. Bunn and their son Charles, accompanied him when his work took them all over the western states.

## 1936

**Major Carl Parker Gies, '36**, who first saw action in this war in the Philippines against the Japs and in October, 1943, left for duty in the European theatre of operations has for his meritorious service been presented the bronze star medal. The citation for this award made October 17th of this year reads: "Carl P. Gies, Major, Air Corps, 70th Fighter Wing. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy in the European theatre of operations as A-3 Staff Officer of the 70th Fighter Wing. In this capacity he directed the Fighter control center from June 6, 1944, to July 30, 1944, and maintained air control of all Allied Fighter Bomber missions over the beach-head during this period. The outstanding leadership, foresight, and tactical knowledge displayed by Major Gies in this assignment contributed materially and directly to the success of ground and air battles over the conti-

nent." Now stationed in Belgium as a wing commander of the 70th fighter wing with the Ninth air force, the major left for Europe last October with the fighter group to which the fighter squadron based in Salem the summer of 1943 was attached. Known as the Mustang group, it was first presented the presidential citation for its activities over Germany early in 1944. Gies had been in the Philippines a total of 9 months at the time he was transferred to Australia. In addition to the Bronze Star and the presidential citation Major Gies also wears the D.F.C. for part in defending the Philippines against the Japs. His wife and daughter, **Martha Frances**, are making their home in Salem while he is overseas.

**Lt. Thorne H. Hammond, law '36**, arrived in Salem in time to spend Christmas with his wife, **Helen Boardman, '33**. Lt. Hammond has been in the Mediterranean theatre for a year and has served at sea for 21 months, was cited for "outstanding performance of duty as commanding officer of a patrol craft during the amphibious invasion of southern France last August 15. The citation said: "With great skill and courage you brought your patrol craft through dangerous waters during darkness to establish a reference position off the invasion beaches to guide the assault convoys and later the incoming boat waves to the proper landing points for assault elements. With limited navigational facilities and in the face of enemy opposition from shore defenses, you accurately maintained the position until the assault had been effectively launched." Lt. and Mrs. Hammond will go to Florida where he will report for advanced training.

**Ph. M. I/c William Thome, '36**, is now stationed in a base hospital in the Admiralty Islands. He has been on the Admiralties since May, 1944, and helped the Seabees build the base hospital which was commissioned in June. He is now in surgery. Noting that nothing much happened at the base so far for entertainment they have an open air theatre where every night a different picture is shown. **Margaret Haight Thome, '36**, and their small daughter, **Sara**, are making their home in Salem while he is overseas.

## 1937

**Ens. Manfred Olson, '37**, visited in Salem with his wife, the former **Edna Savage, '37**, and their six months old son in December. Ensign Olson was enroute to his new assignment at San Francisco. He has been stationed at Camp McDonald, NY. Mrs. Olson and Manfred Robert will accompany him to San Francisco.

**Charles B. Perry, '37**, in a letter recently received by Marion Morange of the French department, described wartime Paris. Perry was in England for two years associated with a branch of the service known as the bureau of records. Soon after the invasion of Normandy he was transferred to Paris which he found much more attractive than the drab city of London. Perry said there is a tremendous shortage of coal in Paris. Electricity is used only during certain hours of the day and there are no public buses running. He says that he has fine quarters, that is if one likes walking across the street for hot water. One thing though that is plentiful and reasonably priced is perfume.

**Pauline Winslow Elgin, '37**, is being welcomed back in Salem with her husband, **Lt. Harrison W. Elgin, jr.** The Elgins have been away for the past three years while he was serving in the army. Lt. Elgin received his discharge the first of the year.

In the city of Noumea, there are sewers running along the side of the sidewalk, and there are trash cans standing about for trash, but mostly the people miss the cans, and trash just lies around on the ground. There are lots of mosquitoes, but none are dangerous. There are one or two fairly decent eating places. Nothing like home, of course, but they aren't bad. There is one hotel, The Pacific, which has good food. It has been turned into an officers' club."

**Mr. and Mrs. Jack Chapin, '42**, (the former Mary Barker) are parents of a month-old daughter, Joyce Arline. They are making their home on a farm north of Salem.

**Robert Blanding, '42**, has been assigned to a recently commissioned ship, the U.S.S. Granville. Lt. (jg) Blanding attended Ken Murray's "Blackouts of 1944" and while coming out of the theater ran into Dick Strellman, '45. Blanding has seen active duty in the South Pacific but has been in the states taking advanced training.
