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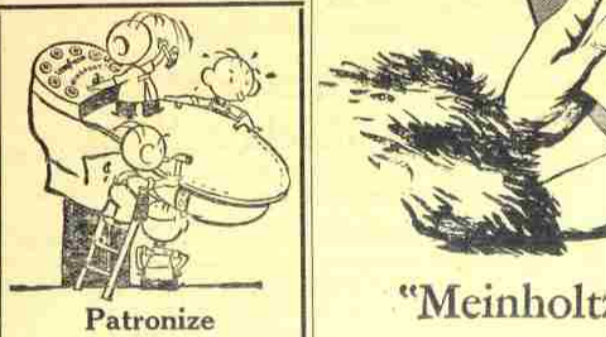

 Jumping over moons, milk pails and stage props is nothing in the lives of Fanchon and Marco's Sunkist Beauties in the "Cow Episode" of "Peasant" Idea at Fox Elsinore theater on Saturday. The cows are remarkably well trained bovines. They file on the stage to the strains of "K-K-Katy," sit down, rise to dance and roll over at a given signal. Before the act is over, bossy is milked and considerably "cowed" by milk maid Sunkist Beauties, whose roles are taken this time by a group of Belcher Dancers. Besides the cows, a goat balances himself obligingly on the back of a chair—then looks yearningly out over the audience for his appreciative nod. Barnyard animals graze lazily in the yard of the stable and present a picturesque picture for the stage setting.

Fanchon and Marco have picked a village that nestles close to the mountain side for their inspiration in "Peasant." Smocks, peasant embroidery and blouses in true village style are worn by the girls. Besides wearing lavishly embroidered clothes, and milking fractious cows, the Sunkists show ability in dancing and singing. One little peasant girl stands out from the rest because of her winsome smile and agile dancing feet. 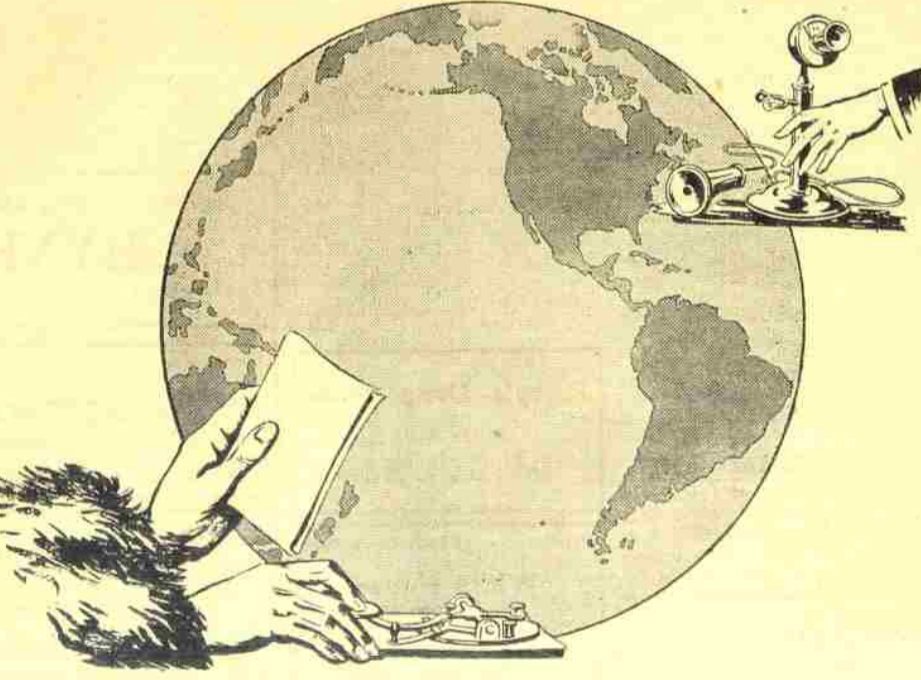
