The Office is in receipt of your letter of June 24, suggestin Mr. Charles Larson and wife, employees at the Tulalip Indian School, for transfer to the positions of Industrial teacher and assistant matron, respectively, at the Tongue River School.

You are advised that Mr. Larson has no status that would permit of his transfer to the position of Industrial teacher irrespective of the fact that it is considered inadvisable to make him an offer, inasmuch as he is now receiving \$720.00 a year, whereas the position of Industrial teacher at Tongue River pays only \$600.00 a year. The Office records do not show Mr. Larson as being employed at the Tulalip School, neither is there anything of record to show her qualifications.

The office will, therefore, endeavor to fill these vacancies by September 1, in another manner.

When I was at Busby about ten days ago, your wife told me that I could reach you at Great Falls, where I wrote you. Not having heard from you, I think that you must not have received the letter, hence I am sending this to Great Falls, Billings, and to Busby.

We have a vacancy here in disciplinarian which I believe you could fill, and I do not believe you would find it so trying as the work with the Cheyennes, and we would appreciate your help with the band. The position pays only \$660, but if you have no regular employment, it would be better than irregular labor and high expense outside the Service.

I have delayed making any other attempt

to fill the place until I heard from you. If you receive this word please let me know promptly. In the event that you should come and prove satisfactory, there might be openings at better salaries than that position pays, though there is nothing definite in view at this time.

Dear Mr. Larson,

I have again an opening in position of disciplinarian at this school and I write asking if you would accept same if it were offered to you. The position pays \$65.00 per month with the 10% increase in addition until June 30, this year, making \$71.50 per month. It is likely that the same increase will be continued for the next year. I could likely give your wife a position, in fact I will have a vacancy as baker about the 15th of April which pays \$40 per month, and with the 10% increase would be \$44. There will likely be a vacancy in position as boys' matron at ~~\$280~~ \$580 per year, 10% additional, by the first of July.

Have a fine location here, right in town. Plenty of opportunity for amusement in band and orchestra, I have a city band of twenty pieces.

Let me know it once if the proposition makes any appeal to you.

As soon as I could I located another job and this time I signed on as a HELPER at the Skinner & Eddy Shipyard in Seattle. When I reported to duty and upon entrance to the yard I, with a group of new workers, found ourselves facing a group of men waiting for us- one of these fellows looked at me and said "Come along Bud" and I followed him to a tool room where I was issued a hammer- "Followme" said my boss and I followed him. We went to a ship under construction and my boss never told me what we were supposed to do so I just followed him. He would walk along the hull, inside, tapping bolt heads and me following just tapping because I couldn't see just what he was doing. The third day he failed to show up- I got my hammer and just went around hitting anything and everthing until I got disgusted. That week end I went over to Tacoma and contaced Mr. Johnson Williams and he told me to come on over to Tacoma and he was sure he could get me a job at the Todd Shipyard. He was one of the timekeepers. When I reported at this yard I was shown a desk and on that desk was a pile of reports- time keepers reports that had not been completed- I was told I was a distribution writer. I soon learned what this was all about and completed the work and then was assigned to the job of one of the timekeepers- there were three of us. I was given the names of about fifty men- my job was to find these men and since there were several thousand men in this yard I was in doubt as to whether I could deliver the goods- my men were ship-fitters- I couldn't find any of them and about the end of the third day I was ready to give up but a group of these men were working right under our office- I stopped to talk with them and they soon discovered that I was their lost time-keeper. They put me onto the works- pointed out my men- working in groups from two to five men in a group. All of these men had numbers and carried brass zchecks with their numbers and when leaving the yard they put their checks on the board at the main entrance. From here on I could see my men and get their numbers, the hull they were working on and the kind of work they were doing by them pointing to the hull and indicating by signs just what they were doing. While working here we went through two strikes and when the third strike came along I quit and we moved back to Indianola Beach. During the time I worked in Tacoma we rented a house on E 32nd Street.

During the time since we left Busy Mr. M.W.Cooper had been transferred to Klamath Agency and we received word from him to come down and work there. Mrs. Larsen took charge of the kitchen and dining hall while I was assigned to the office. We arrived at Klamath on Feb.13, 1918, during a heavy snow storm. Mrs. Larsen stayed until school was out An June and then she and Vivian left for Indianola Beach. I lasted until November 22, 1918 when the doctor told me I had better leave there because of the altitude. While at Klamath Agency I was appointed as Registrar for registration of Indians for draft.

While at Klamath I received two offers for employment- first, Supt. C. R. Whitlock at Pawhuska, Oklahoma offered me position of disciplinarian and Mrs. Larsen the position of baker and later the position of boys matron. This offer we refused. The other offer was from Supt. John B. Brown, U.S. Indian Industrial School at Phoenix, Arizona who offered me position of band instructor and assistant disciplinarian- this we refused.

On October 22, 1919 was offered clerkship at Wernsprings by telegram but refused. On Oct. 24, 1919 I received letter from Edwin L. Chalcraft, Superintendent, Siletz Indian Agency, Oregon that there was a vacancy there as clerk. On Nov. 13, received telegram asking if I would accept position at Siletz. On Nov. 22 my appointment was made. We entered on duty at Siletz on Dec. 3, 1919. We arrived at Toledo, Oregon late in the afternoon and went to Siletz, ten miles distant, in the mail truck- the last trip for the truck that winter- the road was rough and muddy.

Dear Mr. Whitlock:

Your letter of the 20th of March received and am sorry to say that we are but recently located at this Agency and that our salaries are about the same as you offer. You will understand the situation better after you read of our adventures since leaving Tulalip Jan. 1, 1915. We stayed at Cushman until September 1st, 1917, and thought we would try Montana but I failed in health there and gave up the work of discipline and returned to Seattle until I received an offer as Property Clerk at this Agency. Mrs. Larsen is cook at a salary of \$45.85. We have been here a little over two months- no, only six weeks. So after traveling about as we have done we cannot afford to make anymore moves and again, there is prospect of advancement here. I can not stand discipline any more. It got the best of me.

I am anxious to get into the music game and think that we have a good chance to work up something here.

I appreciate the fact that you remembered ~~me~~ us and hope that you will be successful in getting a good man for the place. Kindest regards to the Mrs. and Pauline, in which Mrs. Larsen and Vivian joins. Sincerely,

NOTICE REGARDING REGISTRATION.

Advice has been received from the Commissioner of Indian Affairs that legislation extending the present draft ages will probably soon be enacted by Congress, and that while it cannot be stated with exactness what ages will be subject to draft it is generally believed that the ages will be from 18 to 45, and that registration day will be early in September.

The registration of Indians will again be carried out by the Superintendent and Indian Service employes; and all Indians, both citizen and non-citizens, between the ages to be fixed in the pending legislation must register with one of these registrars who will be as follows:

You should watch the newspapers for notice of exact date of registration as no other notice will be given. You should also keep in touch with the registrars as they will be advised as soon as the date has been fixed.

Registration of an Indian does not mean that he will have to perform military service but that a list or special census is to be made of all male persons in the United States coming within the specified ages. After the census is taken the persons registering are to be divided into classes in accordance with their availability and liability, to be called upon to perform military service. There are a number of conditions which are considered in determining the class into which a person is to be placed. Those who have no dependents and are the best specimens of physical manhood are of course most desired to make up the army. Under the previous laws non-citizen Indians have not been called into service.

DO NOT FAIL TO REGISTER. Such failure may cause you to lose valuable rights in the way deferred classification etc., and renders you subject to fine, imprisonment or immediate induction into the Service, or all three. If you are expecting to go away on a trip be sure to register before you leave. You may register before the date to be set but it may cause you much trouble to register after that date.

Disposition of registration cards.

July 18, 1918.

To Superintendents:

Your attention is invited to that part of Section 78 of Registration Regulations No. 2 relative to the disposition of the registration cards of persons registered on Indian reservations, and you are now instructed as follows:

The registration cards, original and duplicate, of citizen Indians and all other persons, except noncitizen Indians, should be sent directly to the nearest State local registration board in the jurisdiction in which your reservation belongs. If your reservation comprises or is a part of more than one county, it will be necessary to segregate the cards by counties and mail them accordingly.

In the case of noncitizen Indians, the duplicate cards should be sent to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs and the originals retained by you.

Under the first registration there has been considerable correspondence as to what Indians are citizens. The question of citizenship, as a general rule, is an individual one to determine which the facts in each individual case must be considered. The following general rules, however, are given herewith as a guide to Superintendents to determine this question in the cases coming before them:

1. Indians whose trust or restrictive fee patents are dated prior to May 8, 1906 are citizens by virtue of Section 6 of the Act of Feb. 8, 1887.

11. Indians whose trust or restrictive fee patents are dated May 8, 1906, or subsequent thereto and who have received patents in fee for their allotments are citizens by virtue of said section 6 of the Act of Feb. 8, 1887 as amended by the Act of May 8, 1906 (34 St. U.S. 182).

111. Section ~~3222a~~ 6 of the Act of Feb. 8, 1887, both before and after its being amended by the act of May 8, 1906, provides that:

"Every Indian born within the territorial limits of the United States who has voluntarily taken up, with said limits, his residence separate and apart from any tribe of Indians therein, and has adopted the habits of civilized life, is hereby declared to be a citizen of the United States, and is entitled to all the rights, privileges, and immunities of such citizens*****".

IV. The Solicitor of this Department has held that when Indian parents became citizens upon allotment their minor children became citizens with them, and that children born subsequent thereto were born to citizenship.

Where it becomes necessary to submit the question to this office, full information should be given on the above points, together with any other facts and circumstances which enter into the particular case. Some jurisdictions have special circumstances which enter into the question, but these can not be gone into here, and they are generally known to the locations involved.

Noncitizen Indians are entitled to deferred classification. Therefore where the registration of the Indians was handled by the State authorities in this second registration, you should confer with and advise the boards as to which of the registered Indians are noncitizens. You should also advise your Indians, who have so registered, in regard to their rights to deferred classification on the ground of noncitizenship and on such other grounds as they may be entitled to under the law and the President's regulations.

Under the regulations, claims for exemption or discharge may be made by any person by or in behalf of another person. As Superintendent in charge of and responsible for the welfare of your Indians you should therefore exercise this right wherever the circumstances warrant such action, and especially in view of the fact that in many cases the rights of the Indians may not otherwise be protected. Further, it is not advisable to have Indians drafted and sent to camp only to be discharged on account of claims for exemption, etc, thus involving annoyance to the Indians and expense to the Government. The Indians should be advised and they are entitled to waive their rights to exemption or deferred classification.

In the case of Indians now classified as noncitizens and who later become citizens, you will follow the instructions issued in Circular No. 1305-H, dated April 27, 1918. The same procedure will be followed in the case of any who it is found have been erroneously classified as noncitizens and whose cards have been sent to this office

My dear Mr. Commissioner:

I returned last night from a two weeks official trip and found your telegram of April 22nd relative to Mr. Charles E. Larsen being transferred to Greenville School, California, which had not been answered pending my return. Mr. Larsen entered on duty here December 3rd, last, at \$720 per year, the salary having been reduced from \$900. He was at considerable expense coming from the state of Washington with his family, and while feeling disappointed at the reduction in salary he feels that should he accept transfer to Greenville at \$900 per annum the expense in making the change would be greater than the benefit derived from increase in salary; and a greater consideration is the effect the higher altitude may have on his health. He was property clerk at Klamath Agency in 1918 and had to resign and go to his home for this reason.

I should like to have Mr. Larsen remain at Siletz because he is capable to handle the land sales we are just beginning and of which there will be a large number before the work is completed. The authorized salary here is entirely too low for a man of his ability and if funds available will permit it should be restored to \$900 as originally authorized.
