

Knight Named As Assistant To President

Professor John L. Knight was named assistant to the president at the February 14 meeting of the University Board of Trustees in Portland. Prof. Knight came to Willamette in 1943 as an assistant professor of religion and has been assigned increasing administrative duties. For the past two years his title has been counselor of religious life.

Other action taken by the board was the appointment of Dr. Lawrence Riggs, professor of education, as head of the summer school session which will commence on July 8 and continue for an eight week session. Dr. Riggs came to the faculty in 1944 from Johns Hopkins university. His taking of responsibility for the summer session will allow Dean Chester F. Luther to take his first vacation since 1942.

Sophs Claim Glee Banner; Seniors Swim

Proud sophomores proudly claimed the banner at the annual 38th Freshman Glee with the seniors swimming, fresh third, and juniors second.

"Fight" was the theme for this year's Glee, and "Roar Willamette" was the winning song written by Sam Frickey with the words by the class.

Judging was changed this year with the evening performance counting 60 per cent of the judging in contrast with the third accounted in previous years. For vocal rendition the sophomores placed first, juniors and freshmen tied at second and seniors placed third. Formation gave the sophomores first place, juniors second, freshmen third, and seniors last. Juniors reached the top in the music competition with seniors second, freshmen third, and sophomores fourth. Freshmen took first place in words, sophomores second, seniors third, and juniors fourth.

Jerry Quillan, manager of the Glee, was assisted by Dick Spooner. The Glee was broadcast over KSLM for the first time since the war. The program was dedicated to Roy S. Keene, who served as athletic director at Willamette for 18 years.

Col. Willis, Alumnus, Dies

Col. Percy Willis, '85, trustee of Willamette since 1930, died at his home in Portland April 11 from a heart attack.

Holder of the M.A. degree as well as the B.A. from Willamette, Col. Willis is known to many generations of students at the university as the donor of the annual Colonel Willis prize given to "the student who throughout the school year has done the most real good to fellow students and the university by deeds of kindness and genuine helpfulness, coupled with steadfast devotion to high ideals and upright character."

He was a resident of Oregon since 1871 and had for several years taught in Marion county and Salem schools. He was later in the mercantile business which he left at the outbreak of the Spanish-American war to enter service as a member of the Oregon National guard.

Rising from a private to a major, he saw duty in the Philippines. He transferred to the regular army as a first lieutenant in the coast artillery and rose to the rank of colonel. During the first World War he served another tour of duty in the Philippines. Upon retirement from the army, Col. Willis returned to Oregon to make his home.

Spring Enrollment Totals 790

Summer Session to Open July 8

Registration Highest Since Peak in 1939

Enrollment of full-time students at Willamette climbed to just three short of the 700 mark this semester and reached a total of 790 including 93 special students who are enrolled for less than 12 hours of study.

Current registration is the highest since the peak semester in the fall of 1939 when 832 students in all categories were enrolled. An influx of veterans in March swelled the present totals from last semester's figure of 597 including 30 special students. Veterans this semester number 295.

In the college of liberal arts more than half the veterans are freshmen, with 138 men and four women. Sophomore veterans number 45 men, juniors 28 men, seniors 29 men and one woman, and special students 15 men and one woman.

Veterans enrolled full-time in the college of music total eight, including one woman. The college of law has 25 men veterans.

The preponderance of lower division students among the veterans is reflected in the student body as a whole, in which freshmen make up more than half the total, while juniors and seniors combined constitute less than one fourth.

H. B. Jory, '15 New Registrar

Harold B. Jory is the new registrar of Willamette University and director of admissions. Mr. Jory is a graduate of Willamette, having received his degree in 1915. He received his master's degree in education at Stanford in 1929. After teaching in Oregon high schools he became an administrator in the Everett, Wash., school system where he was principal before retiring in 1938 to engage in business in California. Mr. Jory took over his new duties on the first of March.

Mrs. Jory, the former Eva Hogue '16, accompanied her husband to Salem where they have purchased a home. The family is Willamette minded with one daughter, Elizabeth Jory Nicholson, graduating in March of this year and their other daughter, Evelyn, a sophomore in sociology.

Fall Semester Again to Start In September

An eight-week summer session, starting July 8 and ending August 31, will replace the full semester of work which has been offered at Willamette for the past three summers during the Navy V-12 program.

The shorter summer term will enable the university to return to a normal calendar with school opening at the end of September instead of the first week in November. Under the new calendar, semesters will be extended from the 16 weeks of the V-12 program to 17 weeks next fall. The following year will bring back the original 18-week term starting about the middle of September. Shorter terms were deemed advisable for next year, however, in order to allow four weeks of vacation between summer session and the new school year.

The summer session this year will offer two and three-hour courses, an eight-hour program being considered a normal student load. To avoid holding classes on Saturdays and yet crowd in a full semester's work in each course, class periods have been lengthened from the present 50 minutes to 60. Three-hour courses will meet five times a week to cover the same material usually dealt with in two weeks. Two-hour courses will meet four times a week.

A faculty of about 16 under the direction of Dr. Lawrence A. Riggs, will include two visiting professors. One is Dr. G. A. Werner, professor of history at College of the Pacific in Stockton, Calif. Having spent seven years in educational work in Latin America, he will teach a course in contemporary world problems and history of Russia.

The other visiting professor is Dr. Jerome C. Hixson of DePauw university. He will conduct two literature courses and will introduce a new course of living languages.

Complete announcement of courses to be offered awaits further findings on student needs and available faculty, but most departments will be represented.

Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam To Speak at Commencement

Commencement exercises will take place in the gymnasium on the Willamette campus Sunday, June 30, at 3:30 p. m. Forty-four seniors will receive their bachelor's degrees, and three law students their LL.B.

Speaker for the occasion will be Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam of New York. Dr. Oxnam, who is present of the Federal Council of Churches, was until he moved to his present area, bishop of the Boston area of the Methodist church. He had served also from 1936 to 1939 as bishop of the Omaha area, and for eight years prior to that had been president of DePauw university in Indiana.

A graduate of the University of Southern California and holder of the S.T.B. degree from Boston university, Bishop Oxnam has held faculty positions at both institutions. He has stud-

Kansas Coach To Join Staff At Willamette

New basketball and track coach, and assistant to Walter Erickson in football at Willamette this fall will be Elmer H. Schaaake, former assistant football and basketball coach at the University of Kansas. Effective July 1, the appointment will bring to the campus a coach who was assistant to one of the nation's top basketball mentors, Dr. F. C. "Phog" Allen at the University of Kansas.

After receiving his degree from Kansas in 1932, Schaaake, a letterman in football and basketball for three years and all-Big Six quarterback in his senior year, played a year of professional football and then turned to the coaching profession. In 1934 he was head basketball coach at Central Missouri State Teachers college. From 1935 through 1937 he held the position of Director of Athletics at Bethany college.

In 1938, he returned to his high school alma mater of Lawrence, Kansas, where he coached basketball and football for five years. During two of these years he produced undefeated grid teams in one of the toughest conferences in the state.

He was appointed to the post of assistant coach of football and basketball at the University of Kansas in 1943. He remained in this position until last winter until the health of one of his children forced him to bring his family to the west coast.

Walt Erickson Takes Over As WU Coach

With the appointment in February of Walter E. Erickson, '33, as athletic director to replace Roy "Spec" Keene, who retired after 17 years coaching to his credit, Willamette university took its first post-war step toward returning to top flight athletic standing in the northwest.

Much of Walt's football technique will be familiar to those who followed "Spec" Keene's colorful and successful 17 year career at Willamette, for Erickson is a "Spec" Keene prodigy, and in the latter's own words, one of the greatest players he ever produced.

While wearing the Cardinal and Gold into gridiron battles from 1929 until his graduation in 1933, Walt won more honors than have been accorded any other Bearcat performer. In addition to gaining the signal glory of being named all-Northwest conference back every one of his four years of participation, Erickson, in his sophomore year, became the first Willamette athlete to receive the All-American football board's card of merit, and the following year he became the first Bearcat player to receive mention on the all-coast all-star football team.

Erickson's feats on the gridiron and his energetic participation in student activities while at Willamette earned him membership in the Blue Key national honorary fraternity, and the Booth Athletic trophy, awarded annually to the outstanding athlete in scholarship and moral influence. His active part in student affairs was climaxed by his election as Willamette student body president.

Immediately upon his graduation from Willamette in 1933 Erickson was appointed head coach at Camas high school in Washington. During his six year tenure at Camas, he led the Papermakers from the gridiron doldrums to a position as one of the ranking medium-sized high schools in the northwest. His all-time coaching record at the Washington school lists 40 victories against only 16 losses. Among his victims were the perennially strong Salem high Vikings, the powerful Vancouver Trappers and the equally potent Kelso high school team.

In 1939 Walt yielded to the inclination to enter the field of administration in college educational work and resigned at Camas high school to accept the position of dean of freshmen at Willamette, which he held until February of this year.

Lestle J. Sparks, professor of physical education, who held the position of acting director of athletics during the 2½ years that "Spec" Keene was on leave of absence with the navy, and then shouldered the load of directing the destinies of the Bearcat hoop team this winter following "Spec's" resignation in November, will continue as head of academic work in the department of physical education.

Madison Lafayette Jones, '71, celebrated his 97th birthday dinner at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Mabel Cannon, Mr. Jones pioneered in the Lake Labish district. He has two granddaughters attending Willamette now, one under the GI bill who served in the marine corps.

1890

Olin F. Tower, '90, died at his home on December 21, 1945. Dr. Tower received his doctor's degree in 1895 at Leipsig, Germany. He taught for many years at Western Reserve University in Ohio and at the time of his death was making his home in Florida.

1891

James F. Ailshie, '91, is chief justice of the Idaho supreme court in Boise. Chief Justice Ailshie while at Willamette was one of the founders of the original Willamette Collegian.

Carrie Royal Mumford, '91, is living in Vancouver, Wash.

1893

Early E. Hewett, '93, died at his daughter's home in Eugene, May 2, 1945.

1895

Richard Harold Dearborn, '95, died in Portland in March. He was born in Salem in November, 1874. Mr. Dearborn received his early education in Salem schools and upon graduating from Willamette attended Cornell. From 1901 to 1914 he was professor of electrical engineering at the University of Oregon and head of the same department at Oregon State college from 1914 to 1935 when he was named dean of the school. He served as electrical engineer for the state public utilities commission from 1914 to 1917.

1900

William Albert Manning, '00, is a professor of mathematics emeritus at Stanford university. He received his master's degree in '02 and his Ph.D. in '04 from Stanford.

1904

George M. Hunt, ex '04, was recently appointed to succeed Carlisle P. Winslow as director of the U.S. forest products laboratory at Madison, Wis., largest organization in the world devoted to research in utilization of wood and related products. Mr. Hunt graduated in 1911 from the University of California and entered the forest service. He transferred to the Madison laboratory in 1914 and was assigned to the wood preservation lab. By 1926 he had through his research at the laboratory, industry in this country and in Europe, and his writing and reports, become recognized both here and abroad as an authority on the subject, including preservation of wood by physical and chemical means, fireproofing glue, laminated construction, use of sawdust for molded products, glues and plywood and wood finishes.

1909

George W. Booth, ex '09, died at his home in Piedmont on March 25 following a stroke which he suffered in his San Francisco office. Mr. Booth was an executive of a San Francisco construction firm at the time of his death. He is survived by his wife and three children.

1913

Frank Meek, LLB, '13, is a lieutenant colonel in the army and in Manila as chief of prosecution in the court which tried Lt. General Homma.

1914

Benjamin C. Neustel, '14, who has been on loan to the U.S. army in the chemical division recently returned to his position as professor of science at Whitworth college.

Lola Cook Bellinger, '14, visited in Salem this spring. Mrs. Bellinger, who has been in charge of the children's department of the Tacoma Public Library, has resigned her position. 1916

Beryl Holt, '16, regional fellowship chairman of the American Association of University Women, was fellowship discussion leader of the 21st annual conference of the Oregon division of AAUW which was held in Forest Grove. Miss Holt recently journeyed to Spokane where she spoke to the chapter there and then came by plane to Portland. Miss Holt is head of the math department of Salem high school.

1917

Allan A. Bynon, LLB '17, died at his summer cottage at Agate Beach following a two months' illness on May 4. He died of a heart attack. He was a former state legislator and assistant United States attorney. After serving overseas as a captain during the first World War Mr. Bynon returned to Portland and in 1922 was appointed United States attorney for Oregon. He held the post until 1926. Active in political affairs for many years the Portland attorney served as state representative from 1928 to 1932 and as state senator from 1932 to 1936. He retired from politics in 1938 to devote full time to his law practice. His son, Allan Bynon, Jr., was killed in an automobile accident in March. He is survived by his wife, the former Florence A. Hofer, and his daughter, Ailsa.

1919

Helen Goltra Bagley, '19, and her husband, Frank Bagley, are living in Twenty Nine Palms, Calif., where he is owner of a large grocery store, is postmaster, bank director, and Standard Oil distributor in the interesting desert settlement. Mr. and Mrs. Bagley live in a house built for Jack Benny.

McCullough held membership in the American Society of Civil Engineers, Society of American Military Engineers, Tau Beta Phi and Sigma Tau, honorary engineering societies and Delta Theta Phi, an honorary law fraternity. He is survived by his wife, and his son, John Rodan McCullough, LLB '40.

Big Grid Season in Offing

The crack of horsehide against hardwood has been mingling with the thud of toe against pigskin for the past few weeks on Sweetland field where football coach Walt Erickson has been putting his charges through spring drills and acting baseball coach Bill Hanauska has been grooming diamond candidates who made their debut in a doubleheader with the University of Oregon April 6.

Since receiving his appointment as head football coach and athletic director at Willamette February 15, Erickson has been hard at work preparing for Willamette's return to full scale intercollegiate gridiron competition next fall for the first time since 1942.

The former Camas high school mentor and more recently dean of freshmen, registrar and director of admissions at Willamette, has prepared an offensive based on Pop Warner's double wing-back system with sparkling variations in plays and shifts which should prove second to none in razzle dazzle and downright results. Of almost equal interest to the spectators is the fact that Walt's warriors will be clad in uniforms of a design and color combination which should prove not only unique but just a bit confusing to the opposition; credit for the color designing going to Constance Fowler and her art department.

Among the 30 odd varsity football aspirants who greeted Erickson at the initial spring practice call March 18, were 12 lettermen who served with Keene's '41 and '42 powerhouse elevens, champions of the Northwest conference, before donning GI garb. Among these were Teddy Ogdahl, Little All-American full-back, Marshall Barbour and Bill Reder, all-conference ends, and Spec's '42 passing duo, hula-hipped Bob Douglas from Hawaii, and Cecil Conner, speedy Indian boy from Pendleton.

With a total of 18 lettermen expected to be on hand by next fall Erickson anticipates having the nucleus for a club that will carry out Willamette's traditional position as kingpin of Northwest conference football circles. With the first three week practice period ending April 5, Erickson has turned his attention to coaching the Bearcat thinclads who go to the post in their first meet since 1943 on April 19 in a three-way engagement with Oregon State college and Portland university at Corvallis. Several other dual and triangular meets are booked for Willamette's trackmen before the Northwest Conference championships at Walla Walla May 25.

Initial opposition for the Bearcats come next September will be the San Jose State Spartans, who will entertain Willamette on September 28. Returning north the Erickson men will jump to Vancouver to initiate the University of British Columbia into Northwest conference football circles October 5. Back in Salem on October 11, the 'Cats will collide with their traditional foes, Linfield College. On the 18th the College of Idaho will be the visitors and on the 26th Willamette will conclude its home schedule with College of Puget Sound furnishing the opposition. The remainder of the gridiron slate finds Willamette at Portland university November 2, at Pacific University November 8, down California way at Whittier November 16 and guests of Whitman on turkey day, November 28.

Spring Sports Get Under Way; Three Coaches Aid Erickson

Willamette university's spring sports program got off to its first roaring start since 1943 this spring with the announcement of the appointment of coaches for three spring sports to assist Athletic Director Walter E. Erickson.

Bill Hanauska, former member of the class of '44 returned to the campus from service with the Navy last month to complete his work for a degree, and was shortly appointed acting baseball coach for the current season pending the appointment of a full-time member of the coaching staff to assist Walt Erickson. Hanauska, who hurled for Spec Keene's diamond teams in 1941 and '42 before signing a Brooklyn Dodger contract, was one of the outstanding pitchers developed during the 17-year reign of Willamette's former athletic director.

Coaching the Bearcat net team this spring is Bud Gilmore, '42, who returned from the service last winter to join the faculty of Willamette as assistant instructor in the history department and part-time member of the physical education staff. During his undergraduate years at Willamette Gilmore became the greatest tennis player ever produced at the university, winning the Northwest conference singles crown for three consecutive years in addition to garnering laurels in championship net play in the state of Oregon.

Mentor of the Willamette golf team is Rich Wicks, '45, one of the school's topflight golfers during his undergraduate days, who is currently attending the college of law.
