## POLITICAL - MEN ARE HOT AFTER COUNCIL POSTS

### Women Also Vie for Offices; One Candidacy Changed

While eight of the fourteen Willamette political aspirants tussle for the three posts of prexy, Collegian editor and Wallulah editor, six more lads and lassies are anxiously watching the antics of their "toppers" thrown in the candidate ring. Since the last edition of the Collegian there has been one change in nomination for the office of first vice-president. This will be explained in the activity sketch following. For first vice-prexy, the candidates:

Edith Sidwell has withdrawn in favor of Nova Hedin. Nova during her sophomore year acted as vice-president of the class. She has continued to be active in promotion of class and Y. W. C. A. functions. Nova is a member of Beta Chi sorority.

Rose Naef is also a Y. W. C. A. worker. She is affiliated with Delta Teth Gimmel and Alpha Phi Alpha sororities. Rose is a regular contributor to chapel organ music and well known to students. She has also been active in class functions.

Two candidates for the second vice-presidency are also in the middle of the political mill race struggling to reach the firm ground of election. This job carries with it the responsibility of conducting student body elections and the balancing of the general fund budget. The candidates:

Talbot Bennett, running for second vice-president, is treasurer of the sophomore class, and is a member of the forensic squad. This year he traveled to Palo Alto to enter the oratory event at the P. F. L. tourney. He has been top man on the tennis team for two years. He is a member of Sigma Tau.

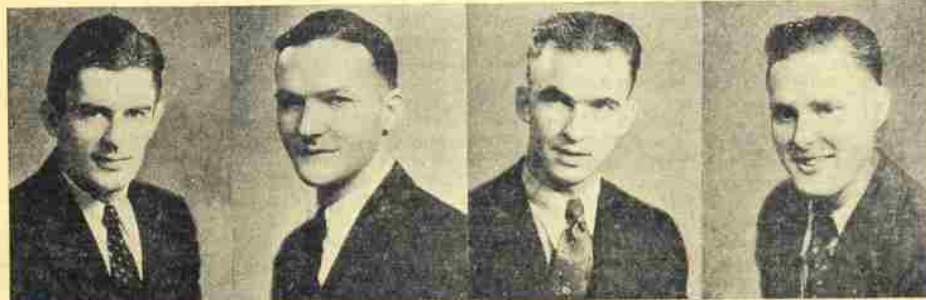
Kenneth Manning, running for second vice-president, has had a good deal of executive experience. He was president of his freshman class, and has taken an active part in campus activities. He has won his letter in baseball and basketball, and is associated with Alpha Psi Delta, serving as first vice-president of that house.

And to wind up the schedule of position chasers comes the two young women who have submitted their names to the voters for the office of S. B. secretary. Any one knows the duties of a secretary (this is purely business, not a private secretary). She will monotone the minutes of the previous meeting and record the doings of official A. S. W. U. The candidates:

Anna Jo Fleming, the Bearcat song queen is one of the aspirants to the S. B. pen pusher's position. She has been in the middle of Class affairs since her vice-presidency of the Freshman class. Anna Jo has also been active in the Christian Endeavor and the

## CONTEST FOR PRESIDENCY AND PUBLICATION EDITORS WARMING

The political cauldron continues to simmer as the day of reckoning draws near. Friday the student voters name the recipients of six important student body posts. Hottest competition has as usual centered about the offices of president and editor of the Collegian. Since the last edition of the Collegian one more candidate has cast his bid for the Wallulah position. All of these offices are of prime importance in the promotion of the yearly activities of the council and student body at large. The candidates:

Mike Balkovic, candidate for the presidency, came this year to Willamette from Southern Oregon Normal school. At normal school, Balkovic was twice elected to the student body presidency, was captain of the Sons football squad, and distinguished himself as a public speaker. While at Willamette he has taken a prominent part in student activities, and held down varsity tackle position on the Bearcat eleven. He is associated with Alpha Psi Delta.

While at Southern Oregon Normal school, Balkovic won the distinction of being charter president of that institution's chapter of Theta Delta Phi, national normal school scholastic honorary. He was also captain of the baseball squad for two years.

Garfield Barnett, another prexy candidate, has won distinction as a forensic man, and was a member of this year's championship debating squad. He was a president of the junior class this year, and headed the Cub organization last year. He is a member of Kappa Gamma Rho.

Richard Lucke is an economics major who has made a name for

himself both scholastically and as a member of the forensic squad. This year he was one of Prof. Rahe's ablest speakers and helped the boys bring home the Linfield honors earlier in the season. During the present semester he has acted as president of the Junior Class and is scheduled for a part in the class play May Weekend.

Reo W. Young, candidate for the presidency, has been editor of the Collegian during the past year. The year before he was co-manager of the Collegian, and he has held class offices. Young has also been prominent in forensic activities, last year making the southern trip with Lawrence Brown and Dave Moser, and this year taking second place in the state extemporaneous speaking contest. He is a member of Sigma Tau.

These four candidates round out the political roster for office of Student Body Prexy. In event of a no majority vote a re-poll will take place on Monday of next week. The two highest runners will be on the special ballot if the election is not determined on the regular sticker.

The Collegian editorship has captured the spotlight secondary only to the presidential race. The editor of the campus paper serves for the whole college year, determines the policy of the paper and is responsible for its operation. He also recommends a business manager who according to constitutional provision is given the official OK by the executive council. The candidates:

Paul H. Hauser, candidate for Collegian editor, has been managing editor of the Collegian during this year. He was president of

the sophomore class the first semester. Last year he was Freshman Glee manager, and Freshman representative on the executive committee of the student body. Paul has also been active in dramatics on the campus. Last year he held down an important role in "As You Like It." He has been Oregonian correspondent for Willamette during the year. He is a Sigma Tau.

David Johnson, running for the office, is this year's sports editor of the Collegian, and was first semester treasurer for the sophomore class. Johnson has taken an active part in campus affairs, and is at present campus correspondent for a Portland newspaper. He has had newspaper experience as city editor of a southern Oregon daily, and was engaged in newspaper work for two years previous to his attendance at Willamette. He is a member of Alpha Psi Delta, and served as first semester secretary of that organization.

Completing the line up of competitors for "head man" positions on the University publications are the candidates for Wallulah editor. This job calls for close attention to details and a sense of artistic originality. The manager is as in the case of the Collegian appointive upon recommendation from the editor. The candidates:

Esther Black has been photography editor of the current year book. She has also been active in other campus affairs. Last year she was a class officer and has this year been one of the outstanding pepsters on the Pop club. Esther is a member of Delta Phi.

Kenneth Peterson is the second candidate aspiring to the Wallulah

## CANDIDATES TO ASWU OFFICES OFFER PLEDGES

### Expanded Social Program Features Campaign Platforms

According to Hoyle, the fourteen candidates for the six student body political prizes have stated their campaign pledges in approved style, some short and some long, but all promising to fulfill the duties of office as capably as ability will allow. The fourteen campaign platforms follow:

#### Prexy Pledges

**Mike Balkovic:** "I will support all student activities equally, doing my best to insure student and faculty cooperation. I favor an enlarged social program. I favor the program increasing Chresto's value as a campus center; I favor enlarging Willamette's intramural program, and completing the proposed field for intra-mural athletics. I believe chapel can be made more interesting through increased sponsorship of student programs. I would like to see a permanent Greater Willamette organization on the campus. Cooperation with the Pop Club is needed, and I favor any program that will increase student enthusiasm. Representation based upon social group standing is the criterion of Willamette political activities. I favor modification of this system."

**Garfield Barnett:** "If elected president of the student body I shall endeavor to promote the most desirable relationships between the students and the new administration. I am in favor of an extension of the intra-mural athletic program and a revision of the student program along popular demands."

**Richard Lucke:** "Willamette may look forward next year to the fullest success in sports in forensics and intra-school activities. Realizing this I believe that a more comprehensive social program and a more complete unity of spirit among the student body as a whole should be built around this success. It shall be my purpose, if elected, to take all the steps possible toward realizing that program."

**Reo W. Young:** "The Greater Willamette drive began a year ago. Results have been gratifying. This year's student social committee is personally cooperating with the Board of Trustees. This mutual study of campus problems has made for broader understanding and bright prospect of progressive expansion of the student program. Let's be ready for it; ready to identify ourselves in a positive, not a negative way, with an expanded Willamette: increased social activity and intra-mural athletics and forensics. If elected to the presidency, I pledge myself to this program."

#### Collegian Editor

**David Johnson:** "Since Willamette has the best college weekly in the Pacific Northwest, I be-

**Kenneth Peterson:** "If elected editor of the Wallulah I shall endeavor to maintain the high standard of former Wallulah's, and shall endeavor to edit a year-book fully expressive of campus life."

**Vice-President**  
**Nova Hedin:** "I will, if elected, do my best to serve the student body in the capacity of vice-president."

**Rose Naef:** "Bigger and better musical games and I'll play the piano."

**Second Vice-President**  
**Talbot Bennett:** "If elected to this office I shall see that ample funds are provided in the general budget for expanded social activities and I shall supervise official A. S. W. U. elections with precision and fairness."

**Kenneth Manning:** "I am in favor of a greater appropriation for intra-mural sports, and the pushing to completion of the proposed intra-mural athletic field. I will do my best in conducting university elections, and will maintain an efficient management of the ballots."

**Secretary**  
**Anna Jo Fleming:** "If I am elected to the office of secretary of the A. S. W. U. I shall endeavor to fulfill that office to the best of my ability, and as capably as former secretaries."

**Frances Stewart:** "If I am elected I shall endeavor to execute the duties of the A. S. W. U. to the best of my ability, and I shall give my full service to the fulfillment of any secretarial duty which may arise."

### JUNE BANQUET SCHEDULED FOR JUNE 9

At a meeting of the Alumni Executive Committee April 21, the time for the annual June banquet for alumni was set for Saturday, June 9, at 5:30 p. m., in the Willamette gymnasium. An interesting program has been planned and will be announced later. Special recognition will be given the classes of fifty- twenty-five, twenty, fifteen, and ten years ago.

At the June business meeting last year it was voted to increase the dues from one dollar to a dollar and a half, with special rate of one dollar to additional members of the same family, for a year or for as long as necessary in order to pull the organization out of the hole financially. Sending the Collegian free to those who paid dues and inviting the Seniors in past years to the alumni banquet without charge have been the large contributing factors to the deficit. It is probable that, with the loyal support of alumni in payment of dues for the coming year, the organization will be able to erase the Collegian debt in less than two years. The Collegian will be sent free again during the coming school year to those who pay dues for the year June, 1934-June, 1935.

The annual June letters will be sent out from the office of the Secretary-Treasurer the first week in May.

Brown, who, prior to his retirement a number of years ago, was engaged in extensive wool and mohair operations.

Mrs. Brown was the mother of the late Clifford Brown, well-known Salem Legionnaire who was drowned in Alaska waters several years ago while on a fishing expedition. In addition to her widower, she is survived by two grandsons, Werner and Chandler Brown; her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Clifford Brown; a great granddaughter, Vivienne Brown; and two sisters, Mrs. Rudolph Prael and Mrs. W. H. Eldridge, of Portland.

Percy L. Brown of Silverton died April 14 following an illness of several months. He was born at Silverton in 1876, the son of J. M. and Edna Eastham Brown. His father came to Oregon with his parents in 1846, settling on a donation claim in the north end of what is now Silverton.

Mr. Brown attended Willamette university, and in 1896 was graduated from Oregon institute. He purchased the electric light plant at Silverton in the same year, and in 1898 acquired the water works, both of which he sold later. In 1904 the Interurban Telephone company was established by Mr. Brown and he was manager of this at the time of his death. In November of 1908 Mr. Brown was married to Ethel P. Lemmon, a native of Marion county. He was a charter member of the country club, served as major of Silverton in 1911-12, and at the time of his death he was a member of the water commission there.

Mr. Brown is survived by his mother, Mrs. E. J. Brown; his wife, Esther Brown; and three children, Lowell of Corvallis, Delmar of Portland, and Virginia of Silverton.

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# BEARCATS TAKE TRACK ATHLETE VICTORY IN 13 INNING GAME HAS ACCIDENT; FALLS ON ARM

## Schwab and Manning Knock Home Runs; Erickson Pitches

CORVALLIS, April 21.—(Special)—Making up for erratic field ball by hard and consistent slugging, the Bearcat baseball nine turned in its second victory today over the Oregon State team with a score of 9 to 7 in an exciting 13 inning contest. In the ninth inning, Willamette had the game virtually clinched, leading six to four with two out, and three and two on Dan Mitola, batter. Mitola, however, came through on the next pitched ball with a home run, scoring George Hibbard to make the tally 6-6.

Three scoreless innings followed before Woerner, Beaver pitcher, loosened up and yielded two hits and walked in two runs. In their half of the 13th the stagers scored one run, with the tying run streaking it for home, but Don Burch, relieving George Erickson, threw the runner out with the aid of a spectacular catch on the part of Johnny Oravec.

Ken Manning and Orville Schwab hit home runs for Willamette. Manning also figured in a spectacular double play. Regardless of their seven errors, the Bearcats played heads up ball all the way, hit hard, and did a good job of base running.

This was the last pre-conference game for Oregon State which opens its conference season against University of Oregon next Friday.

## Claude Cook Breaks Wrist and Arm In Serious Mishap

Claude Cook, captain of the Willamette University track team, suffered a serious compound fracture of his left arm Friday night when he slipped and fell in attempting to leap a small fence in Bush's pasture. Cook had been to the house of a friend, and was returning home through the pasture. He took a running jump at the fence, cleared it, but fell on his left arm. His wrist was fractured, and the forearm bones were broken, tearing the flesh of the arm severely. At first it was thought that he would lose his hand as a result of the mishap, but at late reports, he was getting along nicely, suffering a great deal of pain, however.

As a result of the accident, the Willamette track team suffers an overwhelming loss. Cook was the outstanding athlete of the team, and was Willamette's star man in the mile and two mile runs. He was the guiding spirit of the team, and much of the organization work of this and previous seasons was done by him.

Cook is in the Salem General hospital.

# WILLAMETTE IS UNDEFEATED SO FAR IN TENNIS

## Oregon Staters Drop Two Games to WU Racquetees

Willamette university's tennis team Saturday defeated Oregon State racquet-men for the second successive time, by winning four matches to two on the Willamette courts. A week previous, the Bearcats took a 4-3 match at Corvallis.

The Willamette team is undefeated so far this season, and is unbeaten by any Oregon college team in two seasons. Last year they met their only defeat at the hands of the University of Washington.

Saturday's matches were featured by a three-set win for Leidig of Oregon State over Hagemann, and Harvey's narrow victory for Willamette over Miller. The second doubles match was

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eliminated, as the Bearcats had already taken the victory.
