'SKYLINE' TOUR SET

Under the direction of faculty members Erickson, Luther, and Lockenour, the all-school Skyline Trail fishing, hiking, and camping trip, originally dated for July 18, will leave the campus early Thursday afternoon, July 17.

At present twenty persons have signed up for the trip and all men and women interested in making it should secure registration cards by July 12. On July 11 a short briefing assembly will be held at 11:55 a.m. in the Waller hall chapel.

The trip will be made in autos and the personal cost will range from \$5 to

\$6 $\frac{1}{2}$. Transportation will cost \$1 $\frac{1}{2}$ for a cent a mile while meals will range up to \$1 $\frac{1}{2}$ daily for the three day excursion.

Mr. Erickson plans to take highway 222 up the North Santiam to Detroit and then to follow the Breitenbush river to the Breitenbush lake to camp by Thursday evening.

This camp will serve as a base for excursions by foot to surrounding lakes and Jefferson Park.

Each person going will be responsible for his own bedding, fishing tackle, and other gear. The party should be back here late Sunday evening.

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LARGE TROPHY DISPLAYED FOR AWARD

The trophy, standing 40 inches high, now on display in the president's office, is the Sigma Chi Foundation Scholarship award. It is to be formally presented to Willamette this coming fall by some member of the Sigma Chi. For the benefit of those who have not seen it, this elaborate piece of work is huge, and has 15 cut niches for inscription of Fraternities winning the trophy, covering a period of fifteen years.

The purpose of the trophy is to stimulate scholarship, and is to be awarded annually to some fraternity based on a full year's work.

Sigma Chi is giving a number of similar trophies to other universities, though Willamette is the first to be in possession of one.

STUDENTS COME FROM NEAR, FAR TO TOTAL 232

Registration figures had reached 232 students by last night, with 175 men and 51 women registered, the registrar's office reports.

The total registration figures show that there are 41 special students and 191 regular. 29 are registered in music school 16 in the law school and 187 in the college of liberal arts.

A geographical summary prepared by the registrar office shows 205 students from Salem and Oregon, 10 from Washington, 4 from California, 2 each from Michigan and Washington, D.C., and one each from Arizona, Canada, Alaska, Idaho, Illinois, Montana, Kentucky, Ohio and New Jersey.
