

Campus receives summer facelift; Waller bell retires

Like a boxer getting refreshed between rounds, the Willamette campus is receiving much attention this summer.

In between and during the variety of summer conferences, workshops, institutes and stroll-through visitors, crews are busy preparing for the return of about 1,700 students this fall.

A wave of nostalgia swept the campus when the huge bell in Waller's cupola was removed in June to reduce by seven tons the weight on the roof beams. The old bell was a gift from the Sunday school of the Methodist Church in 1866.

"Its silvery tones have summoned the students to morning prayers, and

have added to the musical chimes of this city for a week," was one contemporary report after the installation. The bell crashed to the basement when fire gutted Waller in 1919. It was eventually returned to the cupola to ring out football victories until the early 1950s. It hasn't been rung since the mid 1950s and will remain silent until a decision is made on what to do with it. Any suggestions?

Elsewhere on campus, the quadrangle is being assaulted to replace the underground steam line to Doney; roofs on the Fine Arts wings and Gatke Hall have been fixed along with the ceiling in the Health Center and floor in Matthews. New drapes are going into Doney and Lausanne; the circulation desk at the library is getting a facelift; and nearly every building is receiving some interior paint.

Enrollment for the fall is expected to be about the same as last year.

Some 450 new students will be checking in for the orientation program "Opening Days" on Aug. 29. Undergraduate classes resume Sept. 1.

Freshmen to explore energy constraints

On the academic scene, the Experiment in Freshman Education will encompass the social implications of energy constraints under the title "Exploring the Limits."

Participants will receive two credits in the interdisciplinary study.

A religious studies major will be available this fall. It will be an interdisciplinary approach in the study of religion as part of the total human existence. Courses from religion, English, history, philosophy and the social sciences comprise the major.

The faculty abandoned an experimental hourly schedule of classes used last year and voted to return to the class schedule originally adopted in 1966.

Following an early summer workshop involving about 40 faculty and students, program plans for use of funds from the \$165,000 Lilly Endowment, Inc. grant were being formulated. The plans must relate to the general study of "Alternative Futures." Economics professor Russ Beaton is serving as overall project director. Specific plans will be announced later.

New deans among recent appointments

New faculty and administrative appointments are nearly complete for the 1976-77 year. Most of the newcomers are replacements, although one full-time and two part-time positions have been added.

Replacements for five administrators and six faculty members have been appointed. In addition, six full-time and three part-time faculty will replace faculty on leave during the year.

Replacements for reference librarian Gertrude Johnson and music professor Charles Heiden were pending at press time. Mrs. Johnson died Feb. 29 and Dr. Heiden resigned.



Bearcats schedule five home games

On the sports scene, football coach Tommy Lee expects to improve upon a 4-5 record from last year with 34 returning lettermen. The Bearcat grid schedule: Sept. 11, Alumni; Sept. 18, Nevada-Reno; Sept. 25, at Puget Sound; Oct. 2, Whitworth; Oct. 9, at Pacific Lutheran; Oct. 16, at Pacific; Oct. 23, Whitman (Parents' Weekend); Oct. 30, at Lewis & Clark; Nov. 6, Linfield; and Nov. 13, at College of Idaho.

Willamette women won the WCIC All-sports trophy for the third straight year while the men were second to PLU in the Northwest Conference all-sports standings. Willamette's District champion golfers finished 14th in the nationals and Bearcat distance ace Dan Hall finished second in the 5,000-meter run in 14:10.9. His three-mile time of 13:43.6 in that race is a new 'Cat record.

Parents reveal high feelings for WU

Parents of Willamette undergraduates generally have a high regard for the University. Over 98% would recommend Willamette to prospective college students.

Ninety-five percent rate Willamette's academic reputation as excellent or good; 88% feel that Willamette is superior or better than the average small college; and 86% feel that, even accounting for the price differential between private and public universities, Willamette is still worth the difference in cost.

These are among the findings of a survey of parent impressions and attitudes conducted by three students for the *Willamette Scene*.

Nearly 40% of the 1,286 parents receiving the mailed questionnaire responded to 21 opinion questions on various aspects of campus life. All respondents were also given an opportunity to answer three open-ended questions. Parents were asked how they would describe the positive and negative aspects of Willamette to someone. And "what would you like to know more about at Willamette?"

The most frequently mentioned positive aspects are small classes and small college atmosphere (251); general reputation as a quality school (138); location and facilities (89); faculty-student ratio and interaction (72); and general quality of teaching (51).

On the negative side, 80 parents cite high cost. A distant second is limited number of courses (29), followed by poor food (23), inadequate advising (17), and such residential concerns as excessive drinking and smoking in dorms (9), coed dorms (8) and insufficient security (8). The comments range widely, one parent noting that Willamette is "ultra conservative" and another expressing concern for "too much change."

In the area of wanting more information, parents list career counseling and placement, general student activities, financial aid information, faculty profiles, progress of son or daughter, and semester abroad programs.

Some 85.7% of the parents feel they are adequately informed about the campus in general, but 29% believe they are poorly informed on social life, 26.3% on academic life, and 12.6% on finances.

In rating Willamette's academic reputation, 55.5% list excellent; 39.8% good; 4.4% fair; and 0.3% poor. Compared to small colleges with which parents are familiar, Willamette rates superior (34.5%); better than average (54.3%); average (10.7%); and inferior (0.5%). The academic atmosphere is described as rigorous (16.1%); hard (62.3%); adequate (20.3%); and easy (1.3%).

The image most descriptive of Willamette as a whole: "with the times" (84.6%); "ahead of the times" (7.3%); and "behind the times" (8.1%).

Over one-third of the parents believe that the spiritual dimension of life at Willamette is not emphasized enough (34.2%). Some 64.6% feel it is about right and 1.2% say the spiritual dimension is over emphasized.

In the matter of finances, 85.8% believe the cost of Willamette's education is "still worth the difference" in comparison to public higher education, but 71.5% favor a guaranteed tuition program (same tuition all four years).

Willamette's disbursement of financial aid is on the basis of need, and 45.4% of the respondents have students receiving aid. 71.7% favor having the University set aside some scholarship money to be awarded on a merit basis for academic or special talents and skills regardless of need.

53% suggest that between 10 and 25% of scholarship funds be set aside for merit.

In a financial aid package of work-study and loan funds, 45.5% would prefer an equal balance between the two; 36.4% favor more work-study and less loan; 14.2% favor more loan and less work-study; 3% no loan and 0.9% no work-study.

Willamette's Parents' Council has an identity problem. Only a third of the parents are aware of the council. If a parents' group were organized "in your home area," 27% would participate, 16.7% wouldn't, and 56.3% "maybe."

Will parents contribute financially to Willamette after their son/daughter graduates? 18% said yes, 23.3% said no, and 58.7% "maybe."

What will become of the survey results? The three student statisticians from Portland, John Di Lorenzo, Jr., David Haines, and Thomas Woodworth, cautioned users about conclusions. "The most obvious concern is that those who take the time to respond (to a mailed questionnaire) may not necessarily reflect a random sample of attitudes of Willamette parents as a whole." They also noted that "many of the questionnaires were received by parents during spring vacation. The question therefore arises as to whether students 'helped' parents in responding to the questions."

Teresa Hudkins, Director of Alumni/Parent Relations, and Bob Woodle, Editor of the *Willamette Scene*, plan to take the survey into account in dealing with the information concerns. "We can see some areas where we need to communicate better, and we appreciate the time it took the 500 parents to respond and the effort of the students to compile the data."

JOHN S. AMBLER '53

An understanding of the political systems of the world powers is an important part of an individual's total education these days. Those who elect to study the politics of France undoubtedly will be influenced by the work of Dr. John S. Ambler, professor of political science at Rice University.

Since earning his bachelor's degree from Willamette in 1953, Dr. Ambler has spent many months in France studying, twice with prestigious Fulbright awards. In 1954-55, he received a Fulbright scholarship and earned the Certificat d'Etudes Politiques at the University of Bordeaux. In 1969, he received a Fulbright Research Grant. He has authored two books on French politics: *The French Army in Politics, 1945-1962* (1966), republished in paperback under the title, *Soldiers Against the State* (1968), and *The Government and Politics of France* (1971).

Dr. Ambler received a master's degree from Stanford University in 1954 and taught social studies for a time at Portland's Grant high school. He returned to graduate study at the University of California-Berkeley and in 1961, did doctoral research in association with the University of Paris. After earning the Ph.D. from UC Berkeley in 1964, he joined the political science faculty at Rice. This past year, he has been the Speaker of the Rice University Faculty Council.

He is married to Joyce Hill, WU Class of 1958, and their family includes two daughters and a son.

LAURA P. CORNER '26

There is a lovely library these days in Bothell, Washington, serving the needs of residents of that suburb of Seattle, and standing as a tribute to the dedication and perseverance of Laura P. Corner.

When she was asked to become the city librarian in 1956, the Bothell library was in a noisy, small room in the city hall over the fire department. It didn't take long for this self-described "unorthodox librarian" to expand the library's influence. Within three years, the library had outgrown its initial location and was moved to new, and larger, quarters in the back room of the city hall. Then came the passage of a successful bond issue and the move to the present 8300 square foot building. Through each of these moves, a special section of the library, known as "The Corner Shelf" was continued and "no book went on it unless I had read it; books selected had to be clean, and above all interesting." That special section is still featured.

While not realizing that one of her postgraduate careers would be as a librarian, the 1926 *Wallulah* had this prophetic statement to make about Mrs. Corner, "If Laura stopped doing things it would take two or three others to fill her place." When she became city librarian, the staff consisted of two; when she retired 18 years later, the staff numbered 12. The growth was necessary to meet the increased use by city residents. Mrs. Corner is also justifiably proud of her first full-time career. She and her

husband Ivan, WU Class of 1921, raised 10 children to enjoy meaningful careers of their own. Her brother, Paul, WU Class of 1925, was the recipient of an Alumni Citation last year.

FRED H. PAULUS L'26

At a time when the fiscal policies of many government agencies are under attack, one must be impressed with the tradition of sound fiscal management which has existed in the State of Oregon. Much of that tradition is due to the significant work of Fred Paulus, who served for 33 years as Chief Deputy State Treasurer for Oregon.

Many of the Oregon laws relating to state and municipal finances have been written by Paulus. He authored the constitutional amendments relating to reforestation and to higher education self-liquidating building projects. He was the co-author of the original legislative act authorizing first mortgage loans to veterans and he has written many school bond manuals. Widely respected, he often was called on to assist municipalities in refinancing their outstanding debts.

Paulus also served as ex-officio secretary of the State Bond Commission, which invested most of the funds of the state that were subject to investment in securities. It is significant that even including the period of the depression of the 1930's, the state suffered no net loss on its investments while he was secretary of the commission.

Undoubtedly he is now watching with interest the expansion of the state capitol building. Paulus wrote the financing plan for the present Capitol after fire destroyed an earlier building in 1935. The State Treasury Department lost none of its securities in that fire since, at his suggestion several years previously, all the securities had been transferred to vaults at other locations.

Paulus first entered the Willamette College of Law in 1916, leaving to join the armed forces for World War I. Through special examination, he was admitted to the Oregon State Bar in 1918, but nonetheless he reentered the College of Law in 1924 and graduated summa cum laude in 1926. He continues to be active in the practice of law in Salem.

INA V. POTTER '21

As any one who has tried will agree, there is a special art to conducting a successful meeting, whether it be a large convention or a small club gathering. Speaking ability, organizational talent, patience, a sense of humor, and a knowledge of parliamentary procedure all are essential. Ina Potter has devoted her lifetime to helping individuals and groups run more successful meetings.

A Professional Registered Parliamentarian, Mrs. Potter now works as a parliamentarian for conventions and as a personal consultant and lecturer in the field of parliamentary law. She has even been called to

testify in a court case "where a group was challenging the election of officers and the decision depended upon an interpretation of their bylaws and Robert's Rules (of Order)."

Her present career in parliamentary law is a natural extension of her interest in public speaking while at Willamette, her first career as a teacher and her lifelong interest in the work of the International Toastmistress Clubs.

Justifiably, she is very proud of her work with International Toastmistresses. She is a Past International President of that organization and has received awards both in this country and abroad for her work. She has written a number of educational materials in the field of speech for the organization. Mrs. Potter taught classes in English and speech and for 20 years prior to her retirement, she taught in the Long Beach (Calif.) Adult Education program and at Long Beach City College.

In addition to her degree from Willamette, she holds a master's degree from the University of Southern California. Mrs. Potter has one son.

SCOTT D. THOMSON '51

If one were to list the most influential secondary school administrators in the country at this time, Dr. Scott Thomson's name would be at or near the head of the list. For a little more than a decade now, he has been responsible for some of the nation's finest secondary education programs in Palo Alto, California, and Evanston, Illinois.

Now the Associate Secretary for Research for the National Association of Secondary School Principals, Thomson began his career as an administrator in 1962 as vice principal of the new Homestead High School in Sunnyvale, Ca. He was named principal at Cubberley High School in Palo Alto where his work attracted national attention. And then, in 1968, he accepted one of the nation's most prestigious administrative positions, that of superintendent of the Evanston Township High School District in Illinois, regarded by many experts as the nation's finest high school. He remained in Evanston until 1974 when he moved to his present post.

His achievements have earned him considerable recognition. Ten years ago, he was named the Outstanding Young Man in Palo Alto. He is now on the steering committee to revise evaluative criteria for the National Study of School Evaluation. He has been a member of the Task Force on Youth and Compulsory Education and a member of the Policy Planning Committee for the Education Professions Development Act. He has lectured on school administration at both Stanford and Northwestern Universities.

Dr. Thomson earned a master's degree in curriculum and a doctor of education degree in administration from Stanford. After receiving a Rotary Foundation scholarship, he also did graduate study in Asian

History at the University of Malaysia.

Dr. Thomson is married to Margaret Guice '51 and they have one daughter and two sons.

RUSSELL TRIPP '50

Community pride evolves from long hours of volunteer service on the part of many. Too frequently, not enough recognition is given for the hours spent in making one's community a better place in which to live. The City of Albany has twice honored Russell Tripp for his community service—first in 1958 as Junior First Citizen and then in 1970 as First Citizen. He is the first person to receive both awards and they have been justly earned.

Having been a senior scholar in political science and student body president at Willamette, one would assume there has been a continuing interest in politics. He served three terms as mayor of the City of Albany and he is a past treasurer of the League of Oregon Cities.

He is past chairman of the Albany Library Board, member of the official board of the Albany First United Methodist Church, past president of the Albany Kiwanis Club, past president of the Albany Tennis Club, and past president of the Linn County Chamber of Commerce.

Tripp has taken a lead role in the community college movement in the state of Oregon. He was a founding member and still serves on the Board of the Linn-Benton Community College. Currently, he is President of the Oregon Community College Assembly. While taking on all these voluntary responsibilities, he has maintained a successful real estate business in Albany and has been honored by his fellow professionals as the Albany Realtor of the Year. He earned a master's degree from Stanford University. He has also done graduate study at the University of New Zealand through a Rotary Fellowship.

Tripp is married to Barbara MacDuffee '49 and they have three daughters, one of whom—Wendy—is presently a student at Willamette.

WILLIAM M. McALLISTER L'28

Selecting the first recipient of the Distinguished Law Alumnus Award was no easy task. There are many former students of the College of Law who have "by their careers since graduation achieved eminence in the legal profession." In honoring William M. McAllister, Willamette recognizes a gentleman who has distinguished himself as an attorney, a legislator and a member of the judiciary. For the past 20 years, Justice McAllister has served on the Oregon State Supreme Court. He was elected to four consecutive six-year terms after initially being appointed by Governor Elmo Smith, and he served as Chief Justice from 1959-67.

As a member of the judiciary, Justice McAllister has been chairman of



the Conference of Chief Justices of the United States, chairman of the Section of Judicial Administration of the American Bar Association and chairman of the ABA Special Committee for Effective Judicial Representation in the Association. In February 1973, he was elected the first judge to fill a new member-at-large position on the prestigious American Bar Association Board of Governors.

Justice McAllister graduated from the Willamette College of Law in 1928 and was admitted that year to the Oregon State Bar. In 1929, he earned admittance to the Washington State Bar. From 1931 until his appointment to the State Supreme Court, he was an attorney in Medford. As an attorney, Justice McAllister served on the Oregon State Bar Board of Governors from 1948-51 and on the Board of Bar Examiners from 1954-56.

In 1937, he was elected to the Oregon State House of Representatives from Jackson County and during the 1943-44 legislative session, he was Speaker of the House. He later served a term as a State Senator from Jackson County.

Justice McAllister is married to Jean Middleton, '31 and they have two children.



Memories translate into a warm hug for Dean Emeritus Melvin Geist by one of the several hundred alumni who returned for the May 8 Alumni Day. William MacDougall '52 captured many of the fond feelings in an address recalling the virtues of his Willamette education.



An academic reunion, it has been said, should reunite, renew, remind, reinvigorate, recharge and rededicate.

On that score, the '76 version of Alumni Day/Commencement Weekend was particularly rewarding.

Over 500 alumni reunited May 8 to remember their common roots and relive the intervening years. The elder members of the Willamette family were largely dispersed among 10 specific reunions that Saturday. Their recollections blended nicely with the warm glow of beaming graduates and parents who assembled the next day for commencement.

Some of the highlights of the busy weekend are captured in the accompanying photos. Some other activities deserve mention. Over 30 alums turned out for a tennis tournament, a substantial increase over the three entrants of two years ago! Law grad Walt Barrie '60 sweated off the court with the men's singles title; Bob Powell '65 and Phil Marsh '66 combined for the doubles win; Barbara Pitts Bowles '44 prevailed in women's singles and teamed with Elizabeth Ameling '57 for the doubles title. Milt '49 and Marjorie Lundahl Baum '51 were the mixed doubles champs.

Receptions of one sort or another kept conversation going. Of particular note were the former students who greeted art professor Cameron Paulin

and music professor Josef Schnelker upon their retirement.

The "sold out" assembly for the Alumni Banquet enjoyed a superb testimonial on a liberal arts education from William MacDougall '52, senior editor of *U.S. News and World Report*. He recounted how Willamette had prepared him "for the phenomenal past two decades of reporting wars, moon landings and social upheaval far better than a specialized study program at a big school would have done."

He provided examples from his interviews with such famous world figures as the Prime Ministers of Great Britain and Israel, the Shah of Iran, Werner von Braun, Neil Armstrong, Dwight Eisenhower, Robert Kennedy, Martin Luther King, and others.

"I have had to use just about every facet of my liberal arts education in ways I never would have guessed," he said. "These have been extraordinary times for us all, and I believe that a general education was the best way to approach a substantial number of the changes."

Sharing the spotlight at the banquet were five of the Alumni Citation recipients (see pages 4-5) and members of the 50th and 25th anniversary classes.

Thirty-six members of each class were present to receive Matthews Medallions (50th) and Luther Medal-

lions (25th). Ann Silver Allee traveled the farthest—from Bridgewater, Conn.—to join her '26 classmates. Ray Pearson of Knoxville, Tenn. came the farthest in the 25-year class.

The newest alumni of Willamette—375 in all—left the campus with words of wisdom on how to cope with an “unpredictable” and “alarming world.”

Both Baccalaureate speaker Cynthia Wedel and Commencement speaker Harlan Cleveland addressed the uncertainties mankind faces in the wake of rapid change.

Mrs. Wedel, one of six presidents of the World Council of Churches, said

that wisdom will come from a life-long commitment to education and an exploration into new value systems for better moral leadership.

To bring about the necessary changes will take courage, she said, adding that “the source of courage is hope—a belief and trust in God who cares about and has a plan for His

creation. We can trust His plans . . . He is a living, active, loving God who said ‘I will be with you always.’”

Cleveland drew upon his career as a public executive, diplomat, educator and author on public administration and U.S. foreign policy to encourage Willamette’s graduates to become “alarmists in action.”

The present Director of the Aspen Program in International Affairs in Princeton, N.J. said a third attempt at world order is necessary and Americans must decide “whether, how and for what purposes they choose to get back into world leadership.”

The League of Nations failed and the United Nations can’t cope, he said, and he detailed four tasks that must be tackled by Americans to regain the shared sense of manifest destiny.

The tasks he cited were to make industrialized democracy work better, accommodate global demands for fairness, support a global defense of global environment, and keep the international system of peaceful change peaceful.

Squinting into the sun in front of a packed McCulloch Stadium, Cleveland said there is little doubt the world is an alarming place, but he asked the graduates to become optimists. He defined an optimist as “an alarmist in action.”



Looking for his departing “brothers” is Ed, the SAE mascot. There were several among the 375 who joined alumni ranks. The total represented 107 B.A.; 107 B.S.; 120 J.D.; 31 M.Ad.; 6 B.M.; 1 B.M.Ed.; and 3 Bachelor of Theatre Arts. A survey of the undergrads revealed that about 38% intended to continue their schooling at the graduate level, slightly below the seven-year average of 42%.


